Marseille keep on track

Marseille kept alive their hopes of winning the French title on Sunday with an impressive 3-0 victory over

bitter but ailing rivals Paris Saint Germain which saw visiting fans boycott it because of what they saw as over the top security measures.

Goals by Hatem Ben Arfa, record-signing Lucho Gonzalez and Benoit Cheyrou handed Marseille an easy win which sees them in fourth place in the league, three points adrift of leaders Bordeaux, though they have played a game more than the champions.

Aside from Marseille coach Didier Deschamps,

another man who would have been delighted would have been France handler Raymond Domenech as he included both Ben Arfa and Cheyrou in his squad for the friendly against Spain on Wednesday.

Montpellier are on the same number of points, after beating Rennes 3-1 on Saturday, as Bordeaux but trail on goal difference and have played two more matches as the leaders game with relegationthreatened Le Mans was called off due to severe weather conditions.

Earlier Lille had missed a chance to keep the pressure on Bordeaux and Montpellier when they slipped to a 2-1 home defeat by Auxerre. The Lille management

probably would have preferred that the referee had had his way and called the match off at its original kick-off time because of a water-logged pitch. However, it was judged to

be fit for play at the delayed kick-off time and the hosts bore the look of a team that was still weary from its impressive 1-1 away draw with Turkish giants Fenerbahce on Thursday which saw them progress to the last 16 of the Europa League.

Auxerre's Roy Contout was the standout of the match as the 25-year-old French Guyana-born striker grabbed a double to give the visitors the three points and move them into sixth in the table, six points off Bordeaux, though having played a game more. Lille's highly-rated teenage

Belgian international midfielder Eden Hazard had pulled them level but the hosts were unable to repeat the trick once Contout had restored Auxerre's lead in the 72nd minute.

Torres scores

Fernando Torres marked his first English Premier League start of 2010 by hitting the winner as Liverpool triumphed 2-1 in a bruising encounter with Blackburn at Anfield on Sunday.

Torres has endured an injury-interrupted season but the Spain striker made a telling contribution as Rafa Benitez's side maintained their push to qualify for next season's Champions League. Keith Andrews scored a

shock equaliser for Rovers from the penalty spot to cancel out Steven Gerrard's 10th goal of the season before Torres struck in the 44th minute - his 13th Premier League goal of the season - to leave Liverpool fifth in the table, one point behind fourth-placed Tottenham.

Inter scrape past Udinese

Inter Milan survived a late scare and depleted resources to win 3-2 at Udinese and maintain their four-point lead at the top of Serie A on Sunday.

AC Milan beat Atalanta 3-1 at home thanks to a brace from Brazilian Pato to remain second but third-placed AS Roma dropped two points in a 2-2 draw at Napoli, despite having led 2-0. Inter travelled to the north east with

coach Jose Mourinho and four players suspended, forcing the Portuguese to play two midfielders in defence.

If ever Inter were going to be stopped this season, this match appeared to be their most likely banana skin, but Inter proved their resilience.

Just 72 seconds in it seemed as if Inter were going to pay for their troubles as Udinese crafted an excellent goal with Serie A top scorer Antonio Di Natale's clever little pass putting in Simone Pepe behind the make-shift defence to shoot past goalkeeper Julio Cesar - although it was regular right-back Maicon who was at fault in failing to track Pepe's run.

If anyone thought Inter would be rock-

ing, they would be sadly disappointed as on six minutes the champions were level when Mario Balotelli took a pass from Maicon and hit the bouncing ball from 22 yards as he slipped only to catch it sweetly, leaving Samir Handanovic unsighted in the Udinese goal.

Inter's second was simply stunning as Maicon fed Diego Milito wide on the right and he played it inside to Goran Pandev who flicked the ball over the defence for Maicon to continue his charge into the area and lash home a fierce volley from eight yards into the top corner, giving Handanovic no chance. On the stroke of half-time Inter left no

doubt as to their dominance as Wesley Sneijder played the ball out to Balotelli on the left and his brilliant in-swinging cross found Milito running across the defence to glance home a header from seven yards. Udinese pulled a goal back on 52 min-

utes through Di Natale from the spot but although they pushed hard they couldn't find the equaliser. They came closest with the last kick of

the game but Swiss international Gokhan Inler's deflected effort hit Julio Cesar's bar. Milan had a largely comfortable afternoon thanks to Pato's two first half strikes.

On the half hour Ronaldinho's back heel freed captain Massimo Ambrosini down the left and he crossed for Pato whose volley bounced over goalkeeper Andrea Consigli's mis-timed dive. Ronaldinho turned provider again as

his delectable inswinging cross found Pato on the edge of the six yard box and as the young forward took the ball around Consigli, Thomas Manfredini slid in to tackle him only to clear the ball off the Brazilian's knee and in. Atalanta pulled a goal back from Valdes

early in the second period but then Marco Borriello clinched the victory when he followed in Ronaldinho's saved penalty. Roma went 2-0 up in Naples through a

Julio Baptista penalty and a crisp Mirko Vucinic strike. But their hosts hit back through a

German Denis volley and then a Marek Hamsik penalty, awarded for a very dubious handball against Philippe Mexes, leaving Roma seven points behind Inter.

Palermo leapfrogged Juventus to go fourth after winning 2-0 away at their rivals thanks to goals from Fabrizio Miccoli and Igor Budan.

Miccoli curled home a sumptuous effort on the hour mark before making way for Budan, whose first touch was to pounce on a woeful Zdenek Grygera back pass, round goalkeeper Alex Manninger and slot home nine minutes from time.



Dunga sticks to his guns Football incarnations, especially since Ronaldinho, 29, has finally recaptured

Brazil coach Dunga hopes Tuesday's friendly against the Republic of Ireland in London will underline his conviction that his side can be successful at the World Cup without Ronaldinho.

Dunga has gradually nudged Ronaldinho into international exile since taking charge of the Selecao in 2006 after opting to construct a team in his own nononsense image.

Instead of indulging the whims of supremely gifted but undisciplined stars like Ronaldinho, Dunga has put his faith

in the more prosaic midfield talents of Felipe Melo, Gilberto Silva and Elano. His decision has frustrated fans and pundits used to Brazil's more flamboyant

some of his old verve in recent months.

An influential display in AC Milan's Champions League defeat against Manchester United showed he can still torment the world's best defenders.

But Dunga has shown no signs of changing his philosophy and delivered one final snub to Ronaldinho when he left the playmaker out of the squad for this week's clash with Ireland at Arsenal's Emirates Stadium.

"I guess it's normal (for Ronaldinho's exit to cause controversy) because the players who are absent are always the best and everyone wants to talk about who is not part of the national team," Dunga

While Ronaldinho remained in exile for much of Brazil's successful campaign to reach the finals in South Africa, Dunga knows World Cups are not won on perspiration alone.

The man who captained Brazil to victory at the 1994 World Cup is fundamentally a pragmatist, but he will allow the likes of Real Madrid attacker Kaka and Robinho, the Manchester City forward on loan at Santos, to add some glitter to his team in Brazil's last match before the World Cup.
