Fabio Capello has warned his pampered England players that they cannot afford to let their privates lives get in the way of his World Cup prepara-

Capello has grown weary at fending off a barrage of questions about the late-night liaisons of England defenders John Terry and Ashley Cole and he delivered a brief but emphatic statement of intent to his squad when they met up for this week's friendly against Egypt.

With the World Cup in South Africa less than 100 days away, the England coach is concerned that the vast amount of money and power enjoyed by the country's top players has led some of them to lose focus and he expects nothing less than total concentration on football over the next three months.

He will not tolerate any repeat of Terry's alleged affair with the former girlfriend of international colleague Wayne Bridge - that forced Capello to strip the Chelsea defender of the England captaincy - or Cole's string of extra-marital flings that led to his separation from pop star wife Cheryl.

Speaking before the Egypt match, Capello made it clear that sort of behaviour could cost a player his place at the World Cup.

"You have to be careful in every moment in your life. I think the next three months will be ok for all the players. If there is a problem and it is the private life we have to decide about what will happen," Capello

"They are important players. They have to make an example for the children and all the fans. They have to stay careful in every moment

and sacrifice something in their life. "They are young players and young rich boys. This is the problem. It is not only here, in

Since being axed as captain, Terry has suffered an alarming slump in form and has been at fault for a host of goals conceded by Chelsea in recent weeks. The centre-back still has Capello's support

however and the Italian, who admitted he had yet to speak to Terry about his form and morale, insists he sees no problems with his club dis-"I saw two games that he played against

Inter Milan and Man City. He played a normal game. The form of John Terry is good. He played without problems," Capello said. "I followed him during training and he was

good. He is absolutely not affected. I haven't spoken to him. I have another 24 hours to speak to him.

"Usually I speak with a lot of players individually. I have to decide whether to speak or not to

speak. It depends on the moment. "Always the teams wins together and loses together. It is possible to do some mistakes during the game."

While Capello will hope Terry can revive his clearly dented confidence over the next few months, far more important is the form and

fitness of Wayne Rooney. The Manchester United forward is enjoying the best season of his life and took his goal tally to 28 with the winner against Aston Villa in

Sunday's League Cup final. Capello believes his tactic of using a big striker alongside Rooney will help the smaller man continue to shine in South Africa but he

refused to promise a place to out of form Villa striker Emile Heskey. "My style is always two forwards. In my

style it is important to have two forwards with the other one really close to the other," he said. "Is Heskey safe? No. We play Rooney with another one."

PSG won't sell away games tickets

Paris Saint-Germain announced on Tuesday that they will no longer sell tickets for away games to the club's fans and will not appeal if they are forced to play home matches behind closed doors.

"We will no longer sell tickets to our supporters for away matches until further notice," said PSG president Robin

Leproux. "We will not appeal to the league in the case that we are forced to play behind closed doors. We have to take responsibility for the image we

are presenting today."

PSG's 3-0 league defeat at home to fierce Thiriez. rivals Marseille on Sunday was marred by violent scenes both inside and outside their Parc des Princes ground.

Marseille fans boycotted the game in protest at stringent security measures but the PSG supporters fought amongst themselves after the match, leaving one man in an artificial coma following an attack by a rival

fan group. Regularly punished over the behaviour of

their fans, who launched flares onto the pitch in the second half of the Marseille defeat, PSG are already facing the prospect of playing two games behind closed doors due to events ear-

backtracked on Sidat's statelier in the season. ments and said negotiations "It's a very grave decision in the history of

the club but I am obliged to take this kind of decision to guarantee everyone's safety," added Leproux, who was due to meet with officials from the Ministry of the Interior on Tuesday evening to ask for help from government authorities.

"I cannot live with the image of a man covered in his own blood at the foot of the Parc des Princes.

"We've had one death, Julien Quemener, a few years ago (in November 2006) and we have one man who has been between life and death for two days. Do we have to wait to have 10 deaths before we really address the issue?"

"I completely approve the measures that have been announced," said French Professional League (LFP) president Frederic

"The situation provoked by these irresponsible groups has become too serious. The club, the league and the authorities must do everything to bring a definitive halt to this disastrous

spiral." Former Sports Minister Marie-George

Buffet called on the LFP to condemn the violence. "We can't keep increasing the number of police officers every time there is a PSG match,"

she told RMC radio.

"The league and the club president must have the courage to say loud and clear that they condemn these violent supporters, who still think that they are above the law, that they are supported by the club."

Brazil kill off Ireland

Brazil warmed up for the World Cup in impressive fashion as the South Americans defeated the Republic of Ireland 2-0 in Tuesday's friendly in London.

Dunga's side were playing their last serious match before kicking off their World Cup campaign against North Korea in Johannesburg on June 15 and, after a slow start, they gradually turned on the style at Arsenal's Emirates Stadium.

An own goal from Ireland midfielder Keith Andrews put the five-time World Cup winners ahead just before halftime and Robinho added the second after the break to cap a magical move. For Ireland, facing Brazil

was a painful reminder of what might have been as they returned to action for the first time since Thierry Henry's infamous handball set up the goal that sent France to South Africa at the expense of Giovanni Trapattoni's men. It was also an historic occasion as goalkeeper Shay

Kilbane made their 103rd

appearances for Ireland -

taking them ahead of Steve

Staunton as their country's

most capped players. While Ireland were hoping to exorcise some demons,

Brazil were looking to conclude their World Cup preparations by sending a warning to their rivals for the title.

Brazil had given England a lesson in smooth passing during their friendly win over Fabio Capello's side in Qatar last November.
