DMCH Director Brig Gen Shahidul Haque Mallik told The Daily Star.

The speaker may direct any member whose conduct is in his opinion grossly disorderly to withdraw immediately from the House, and any member so ordered to withdraw shall do so, forthwith and shall absent himself [for such a period of the day's sitting as may be decided by the Speaker]," says section-15 of the rules of procedure. According to section-16 of

the rules of procedure, the speaker may, if he deems it necessary, name a member who disregards the authority of the chair or abuses the rules of the House by persistently and wilfully obstructing the business thereof.

"If a member is so named by the speaker, the speaker shall, on a motion being made, forthwith put the question that the member [naming him] be suspended from the service of the House for a period not exceeding the remainder of the

session," says section-16. A member suspended under this rule shall forthwith withdraw from the precincts of the

House, it says. According to the rules of procedure, the speaker shall call the sitting to order. The speaker shall preserve order and decorum, and in the case of disturbance or disorder in the galleries, may cause them to be cleared. The speaker shall have all powers necessary for the purpose of enforcing his decisions. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the speaker, there shall be appointed a

In the case of gross disorder arising in the House, the speaker may, if he deems it necessary, suspend any sitting for a time to be specified by him, says the rules of procedure. A number of Awami League

They said Libyan employers are disappointed at the delays in attesting. Since they needed workers urgently, they had finalised all processing for the Libyan embassy in Dhaka recruiting agent. to issue the visas.

"Now that the visas have been issued, the Libyan embassy does not feel the need to attest the job contracts," said a recruiting agent.

Mustafa said the recruiting agencies are now in trouble, as the Bureau of Manpower Employment and Training (BMET) is not issuing emigration clearances against the visas since the demand letters were not authenticated either

receiving the affidavits of workers' jobs, salaries and other facilities from recruiting agencies, the BMET can issue emigration clearances, explained Baira in a letter to the Ministry of Expatriates Welfare and Overseas Employment.

## Bank payback plan faces failure as Iceland votes

Icelanders headed to the polls in drizzling rain yesterday in a referendum expected to reject a bank repayment deal worth billions that many here consider a foreign diktat.

"I will vote 'no' simply because I disagree very strongly with us... having to shoulder this burden" from the 2008 collapse of the online Icesave bank, Ingimar Gudmundsson, a 57-year-old truck driver, told AFP. The issue is whether

Iceland should honour an agreement to repay Britain and the Netherlands 3.9 billion euros (5.3 billion dollars). This would be to compensate them for money they paid

## Greece as parliament approves austerity cuts

Greek police yesterday fought protesters angered by tough new austerity measures, as European heavyweight Germany rebuffed suggestions cash-strapped Athens needed a

financial bailout. Strikes disrupted air and ground transport, as well as schools and hospitals, hitting economic activity hard two days after the government unveiled sweeping tax hikes and spending cuts that parlia-

ment approved yesterday. A demonstration by several thousand protesters was marred by clashes after unknown assailants beat the head of Greece's main union, Yiannis Panagopoulos, as he delivered a speech.

Panagopoulos' union, the General Confederation of Greek Workers (GSEE), later said it was an "organised" attack and that some of the assailants carried the flags of a small leftist group.

Another prominent protester, 87-year-old war resistance hero and former deputy Manolis Glezos, was hospitalised with breathing problems after a riot policeman sprayed teargas in his face.

Five people were arrested in Athens and a handful of shops and banks along with a ministry building had their front windows smashed, police said. Around a dozen protesters and police were injured, according to reports.

Several dozen interior minstry staff occupied the Greek National Printing House to prevent the latest austerity measures from being published in the government gazette, police said.
