

Bribery rules kidney instt

Patients have to pay Tk 500-5,000 for non-paying bed

Patients at the 100-bed National Institute of Kidney Diseases and Urology have to pay to hospital employees for a non-paying bed. The payment ranges between Tk 500 and Tk

5,000. Sometimes it goes beyond that. The hospital is indulging in such malprac-

tice in utter violation of the government rule that says that a government hospital must have 40 percent no-paying beds so that poor people are not deprived of treatment.

"I got a non-paying bed for my father after waiting for long three months. I had to pay Tk 500 to one Imran who sits at the counter and demanded the money," said Sayeed Wazed, a homeopathic doctor.

"I myself have seen Imran taking Tk 5,000 from a poor chap with the promise of managing

a non-paying bed," he said.

Some of the doctors said, as the hospital couldn't accommodate the increasing number of patients the corrupt employees take full advantage of it.

When asked, Director of the institute Dr Firoz Khan said he had never received any complaint from the patients about it.

"If any patient files complaints and it is proved, the employee concerned will certainly lose the job their next day," he said.

In addition to that, this top kidney diseases hospital has shortage of nurses that hinders the activities of Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and round-the-clock dialysis of poor patients.

There is no CT scanner at the institute and the unfortunate patients have to go to another hospital for CT scan. Patients sometimes have

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Forest Dept starts first-ever 'bird ringing'

For the first time, the forest department has started bird ringing and strapping satellite transmitter to migratory birds to carry out a study on them.

The study will be conducted to determine if migratory birds spread avian influenza virus from one country to another. It will also be able to locate their migration routes.

Experts of US Geological Survey will follow the migration routes of these birds and provide information to the forest department officials.

A team of experts catch migratory birds by using mist net and wire funnel traps and attach this small satellite device to their backs and rings to their legs at Hakalooki Haor of Kulaura, Moulvibazar.

The expert team has so far strapped such devices to a ruddy shell duck, a garganey and a gadwall. Three kinds of **SEE PAGE 15 COL 6**

Ministry okays rental power plant changes

The power ministry has conditionally approved changing rental power plant configuration as proposed by two local rental power companies last month after winning the contracts.

Although such proposals are considered as violation of contractual terms, local companies Rahimafrooz and Otobi last month sought to change the configuration of their Thakurgaon 50MW and Noapara 105MW power plants.

Upon receiving their applications, the Power Development Board (PDB) forwarded those to the power ministry for approval.

The ministry last week approved the two proposals but said the change in plant equipment would be acceptable as long as it did not affect the power plants' heat rate or require extra land to install the plants or the deadline to begin commercial operation and would not cause a hike of power tariff.

Rahimafrooz bagged a 30MW power project in Jamalpur for five years and a 50MW diesel-fired project in Thakurgaon for three years. But after winning the deals, Rahimafrooz backed out from the Jamalpur project by paying a penalty.

The company signed its contract for the Thakurgaon project on February 4. But on February 17, it wrote to PDB about changing its diesel engine generator.

CU prof confined as BCL's choice not recruited

Bangladesh Chhatra League activists of Chittagong University (CU) kept one of its teachers confined in an office room yesterday for around 45 minutes as a candidate after their choice was not appointed as teacher.

Later, the CU authority rescued Professor Dr Hasanuzzaman Chowdhury of sociology department, also a member of the recruitment committee.

Sources said that five candidates were appointed lecturer at the sociology department through a recruitment test held at the university on March 4.

Munshi Tania Afser Champa, joint secretary of BCL CU unit, also appeared at the test, but was not appointed.

Angered by the news of their leader, a group of BCL activists went to the office of sociology department's Chairman Professor Dr Indrajit Kundu at around 12:30pm. Failing to find the chairman as he was outside of the office,

they directed Professor Hasanuzzaman to leave the room in a bid to keep it under lock and key. As the teacher refused, the BCL men left the room locked

confining him inside at around 12:45pm. The CU authority with the help of police rescued him break-

ing the lock open at around 1:30pm, said CU Proctor Professor Dr Mohammad Jasim. The BCL activists later submitted a memorandum to CUVice

Ansar-like force can be formed for CHT peace

Justice Rabbani says at public hearing on CHT incidents STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A force with members from indigenous communities should be formed on the model of Ansar to establish peace in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, Justice Mohammad Golam Rabbani said yesterday.

It is essential to implement the CHT peace treaty without any delay to bring back peace in the hills, Rabbani said at a "public hearing" on the Chittagong Hill Tracts at the Cirdap auditorium in the capital.

"Peace cannot be restored in the hills unless a congenial atmosphere is established there allowing people to make decisions for their well-being. A fully-functioning local government system can create that atmosphere," he said.

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Iraqis vote defying threat, bomb attacks

38 people killed in rocket strikes, bombing

Iraqis defied waves of bomb, mortar and rocket attacks that killed 38 people to turn out yesterday in huge numbers to vote in elections seen as a test of the war-shattered state's fragile democracy.

Polls closed at the end of a day that saw long queues at polling stations in Baghdad, in Sunni towns that mostly boycotted the 2005 parliamentary vote, and in other centres across the conflict-ridden country.

Partial results were not due until Thursday,

with full results expected on March 18, according to the United Nations.

But most observers said it would take at least a couple of months of political horsetrading before a new government was formed as no political bloc was set to emerge dominant from the vote.

The capital bore the brunt of Sunday's violence, with around 70 mortars raining down on mostly Sunni areas as people voted in the second parliamentary ballot since US-led forces ousted dictator Saddam Hussein in 2003.

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
