The first Test of the twomatch series between Bangladesh and England gets underway at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium today under scorching heat. 
not his heart when he takes any decision," he added.

## Germany in final

## 'BCB didn't pay me any attention'

A day after shocking the country with his sudden retirement, batsman Rokibul Hasan confirmed that his grievances against the cricket authorities drove him to this end. But he denied that his emotions got the better of him.

Rokibul, who walked out on the team hotel in Chittagong Wednesday afternoon having announced his decision in front of the Bangladesh team, said that he had taken enough time to come to this conclusion.

He was dropped from the team for the only Test in New Zealand earlier this year after failing in the first one-dayer. Since then, he says, he felt largely deprived.

"I was taken to New Zealand but was not picked for the Test match. Then I was not picked in the one-day side [that played England at home] and I am not in the World Twenty20 probables," said Rokibul outside his Mirpur residence yesterday evening. He delayed his return by a few hours after learning of the media's presence.

The 22-year-old right-handed batsman scored an unbeaten 107 and a half-century in the practice match against England only last week that hastened his return to the Test fold. But he claimed that this was a part of his plan that can only be called a sort of revenge on the cricket board.

"I felt that I wasn't getting enough attention from the cricket board and so I decided to make voluntary retirement once I was back in the team on my merit," said Rokibul in his initial monologue.

"I couldn't secure my position and was always on the fringe of the squad.

"It was my wish to retire at this time," he said before refusing to comment on whether it was

### Beanibazar fined Tk one lakh

Beanibazar SC were handed a TK one lakh for the lapse in organization and discipline that led to unsavoury incidents during a match against Mohammedan SC in the Bangladesh League on Tuesday at the Sylhet Stadium.

lar mishaps occur in future. The other team involved in the incident Mohammedan were also verbally reprimanded for their part in attacking the referees and organizers. The meeting, having expressed condolences for the injured Mohammedan players, assured them of their treatment. And it was decided in further no matches will take place without having ambulances and doctors in place.

# Rocky times for BCB

After the episode with the selection of Mashrafe Bin Mortaza only a small intervening period has passed for another incident to rock the Bangladesh cricket team in Rokibul Hasan's sudden retirement, which has left many questions unanswered. The issue with selections has taken an

alarming precedence especially as the young team is taking shape ahead of the 2011 Word Cup on home soil as Bangladesh are co-hosts.

Many believe that the time has come to delve into the roots of the problem to avoid such scenarios in the future, with particular focus directed towards the lack of professionalism in the activities of the board, which has given rise to one crisis after another.

A lot of questions have already been raised about the efficiency of the current selection committee under the leadership of Rafiqul Islam while the cricket operations committee, who are looking after the vital team affairs, have already came under scrutiny. Finally the recent alleged interference of the board about Rokibul Hasan's selection in the one-day side has also been heavily criticized.

Bangladesh captain Shakib Al Hasan understandably was not ready to accept what Rokibul did but still he raised his fingers towards the board for what has been happening over the last couple of months. Rokibul's decision of retiring from cricket was totally unacceptable to the young Bangladesh skipper but he believes that it might not have happened if Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) took a strong stance against some players on disciplinary

grounds in the recent past.

"If the board had been more strict in the cases of Mashrafe Bin Mortaza and Shahriar Nafees I don't think this would have happened. This is my personal opinion," said Shakib.

Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons was however sympathetic towards Rokibul but still there has been some observations over the activities of the authorities.

"He wasn't in form until the other day, he wasn't in the side. He's obviously an upset kid at the moment, and probably a bit confused. He's decided to call it quits for the moment and hopefully in the near future he will have a change of heart and everyone will accept him back, which is what I hope will happen," observed Siddons.

When asked whether they would welcome Rokibul if he changed his mind, the Bangladesh skipper came up with a diplomatic answer; "I don't know."

It seems that the Australian was sympathetic towards Rokibul's decision following disappointment with his selection in the team.

"He didn't like being dropped in the way he was dropped, then missing out on the 30 for the T20 squad, which was probably a bad selection, and he's really disappointed. He thought he'd proved his point that he was good enough to be in that 30, which I think he is, and then he walked away. I don't know who he was trying to hurt, or what point he was trying to prove, but I hope the BCB welcome him back because he's a kid who's a bit confused," said Siddons.

"It hasn't rocked our camp. It's rocked the BCB and the media, our boys are still training beautifully. I hope everyone accepts it's a poor decision on his behalf, one that's not that detrimental to Bangladesh cricket, and that they

# Reminiscing Manu as a cricketer

those of us who played alongside him at Azad Boys Club. A gregarious and very cheerful personality, Monawar Hossain Manu was a cricketer par excellence. I remember the matches in which Azad Boys were either playing Abahani or Mohammedan as it was Manu who more often than not either got us crucial breakthroughs or was even instrumental in winning us so many crucial matches with his fastish off breaks. A bowling action that was so reminiscent of a cowboy ready to slap leather as he gave a little hop on one leg before crossing the umpire to hurl those innocuous looking deliveries that so often deceived the batsmen into submission. A quintessential figure was Manu for whom Azad Boys club meant a lot and be in triumph or in defeat Manu was one who always had a good laugh and was always the first one along with his beautiful wife Gajju bhabi to be present at

Ashraful bhai's house for some good lively moments during the evenings of the match.

For those of us who played the game at Azad Boys, it was Manu who always managed to keep the dressing room in good humour and his determination and focus was switched on as soon as he crossed the ropes. Stalwarts such Babu bhai, Ashraful bhai, Salahuddin bhai, Saber bhai, Tanna bhai, Badshah bhai and many more including yours truly indeed made Azad Boys a side that other teams loved to hate as we played it tough yet full of zeal and fervour. Manu was conspicuous not because of his good looks and tall and lanky frame but his effervescent yet boisterous nature had always touched the heart of all those who knew him. His appeals to the umpire for an lbw or caught behind would sound more like an Indian war cry than a mere appeal and he would immediately wink at the fielder closest to him suggesting that it was a close call for the batsman. That was how involved he

always was with the cherry in his hand while having fun at the same time.

Characters like Manu are hard to come by and who would know better than his mates in Ramblers, Dhaka Club as well as BCCI (Bank of Credit and Commerce International) where almost invariably Manu would play a key role both on and off the field. It was during his days of ill health that I had very little contact with him and now that he is no more with us I regret for not having shared many of the interesting moments and events.

A big socialite, Manu had that uncanny ability to add fun and fervour on any occasion or event he was part of, be it a serious cricket match or even those important and widely attended conferences organised by BCCI as many of his old colleagues would certainly vouch for. An almost uninhibited character, Manu was also a compassionate human being with that soft streak in his personality that showed his good human nature. There **SEE PAGE 18 COL 1**
