

80pc billboards unauthorised

Offenders cash in on HC order that stays dismantling of rooftop hoardings

Four out of every five hoardings in the capital are unauthorised, posing threat to public safety in inclement weather, says the Dhaka City Corporation.

DCC Estate Officer Khalil Ahmed told The Daily Star Tuesday that almost 80 percent of the hoardings in the city are unauthorised, and most are mounted without considering the risk they pose to people or the buildings that nestle those.

"A building has a weight capacity it can sustain. Many owners rent out hoarding space for some extra cash without considering that he or she is putting the building at grave risk," he said.

Advertisers, however, continue to set up unauthorised hoardings on rooftops at unsafe

places and in unsafe manner taking advantage of a High Court order in 2007 that asked the DCC, Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha and the police not to tear them down until a case in this regard is disposed of.

Two people died and eight were injured during a thunderstorm in the capital Monday evening when an 800sqft hoarding on top of a shopping arcade could not withstand the wind and collapsed on a Gulshan street. A fast-food shop employee and a car driver were crushed to death.

According to statistics from the DCC, they had given permission to set up 1,370 hoardings in the capital until 2008-2009 fiscal year. Of them, 189 were on land owned by the DCC, one on the roof of a DCC office, 501 on private land and 679

10 hurt as BCL men clash at Dhaka College

At least 10 students were injured in an hour-long clash between two rival groups of Bangladesh Chhatra League at Dhaka College last night. The clash broke out at

about 11:00pm as around 25 BCL activists led by Sagir Ahmed, president of Dhaka College unit of the student body, and another group of activists led by general secretary of the unit Tutul attempted to occupy several rooms of a college hostel --Dakkhinayan.

The two groups attacked each other with rod, sticks and machete. Around 25 shots were also fired and 15 homemade bombs were hurled during the clash.

9 foreign firms show interest

Nine foreign investors have shown interest in the government's plan to construct an elevated expressway in the capital, Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain said yesterday.

Replying to queries in parliament, he also said the government will build railways to connect Mongla and Chittagong seaports. "We are taking measures to lay 53 kilometres of railway tracks

between Khulna and Mongla port in around 48 months," the minister said. Of the proposed elevated expressway, he said, "I hope a sig-

nificant portion of the construction work will be done during our tenure." There have never been such huge responses to any govern-

ment proposals, he added. The government is also examining the possibility of constructing an elevated expressway over the median of the Dhaka-Chittagong highway.

To another query, the communications minister said two four-lane bridges with access control systems will be constructed on Meghna and Gomti rivers.

No arrest yet over crash of billboard

Police failed to arrest anyone in connection with the hoarding collapse Monday that left two people dead and eight others injured in Gulshan-1 in the capital.

The incident occurred when a poorly-mounted hoarding collapsed on them from six-storey height in front of Gulshan Shopping Centre during a storm that swept through the capital. The hoarding also wrecked four cars and a motorbike.

Fast-food shop owner Abdus Salam of Gulshan Shopping Centre filed a murder case with Gulshan Police Station last night accusing the shopping arcade owners of killing his employee, another person and injuring several **SEE PAGE 15 COL 6**

US examining Jamaat's 'link with Lashkar'

Law Minister Shafique Ahmed said that the US government is examining whether there are links between Jamaat-e-Islami Bangladesh and the Pakistan-based militant organisation Lashkar-e-Taiba.

The minister briefed reporters yesterday after returning from a 10-day visit to the USA, which involved talks with high officials from the Department of Justice, Department of Treasury, Department of State and the Attorney General of the USA.

Swadhin Bangla Mines and Electricity Ltd will be awarded a licence to explore peat coal in 3,400 hectares, Padma Mining and Energy Corporation Ltd 4,000 hectares and Reliance Minerals and Power Ltd 3,100 hectares in Rajoir upazila of Madaripur.

Sources said a single business group owns these three new companies.

Interim deal on Teesta likely

JRC meet starts today in Delhi

Bangladesh is looking forward to increase its share of Teesta river waters through an interim agreement at a Joint Rivers Commission (JRC) meeting beginning in New Delhi from today. "We will try to reach an understanding at least for an interim

deal ensuring equal shares of Teesta waters," Water Resources Secretary Sheikh MdWahid-Uz Zaman said yesterday. Water Resources Minister Ramesh Chandra Sen will leave for

the Indian capital this morning. He will lead a 16-member delegation comprising officials of the ministry, JRC and the foreign ministry. His counterpart Pawan Kumar Bansal will lead the Indian side.

"We expect that the difference of sharing waters will narrow down since both the countries are having an excellent relationship," observed a foreign ministry official.

He said discussions would take place on sharing waters of all 54 common rivers but sharing of Feni river waters would take priority. The water resources secretary believes that they would be able to resolve water sharing of all the common rivers one by
