# Ljubicic downs Djokovic

Croatian veteran Ivan Ljubicic ousted a weary world number two Novak Djokovic 7-5, 6-3 Wednesday as defending champion Rafael Nadal booked his quarterfinal berth at the BNP Paribas Open.

While third-seeded Nadal advanced with a 7-5, 3-6, 6-3 triumph over bigserving American John Isner, Djokovic couldn't keep pace with the blistering serves and clean groundstrokes of Ljubicic, a former world number three now ranked 26th in the world.

World number four Andy Murray secured his quarterfinal slot with ease as Spain's Nicolas Almagro retired while trailing with an apparent left ankle injury. Murray led 6-2, 1-0 when Almagro

called it quits after receiving treatment on court at the end of the first set. Ljubicic said he was delighted to end a

five-match skid against Djokovic, calling

some of those defeats "brutal". "I'm really happy to be able to beat him finally," said Ljubicic, whose only prior win

against Djokovic was their first meeting in Zagreb in 2006. His most recent defeats to the Serb had come in the first round of last year's US

Open, and in the quarterfinals at Dubai last "My serve helped me, especially in difficult moments," said Ljubicic, who

gave himself both of his match points in the final game with two of his 13 aces.

Djokovic saved the first, but on the

second Ljubicic came up with another big serve that the Serbian could only sail back across the baseline.

"But also two weeks ago in Dubai I was serving unbelievably," Ljubicic said. "You can't beat Novak only with a serve, but it does help you a lot if you can get a lot of free

points off that shot." Djokovic said he knew what to expect. "I don't think any match we play is

different," he said. "It's more or less based on the service and returns. As much as I get in the rallies, I think I have more chances to win the point. It wasn't the case today. "My execution was very bad and he

played well when he needed to and he served well when he needed to," said Djokovic, who won his second straight Dubai Open title in February then won both of his matches to help Serbia beat the United States in the first round of the Davis Cup in Belgrade.

Djokovic had looked far from sharp since arriving in the California desert, having to save three match points to subdue Germany's Philipp Kohlschreiber in the third round.

"This is a tournament where I definitely didn't feel comfortable on the court," said Djokovic, the 2008 champion. "It's just because I had a very tiring couple of weeks coming from Davis Cup, which was emotionally very exhausting for me."

Roger Federer was stunned by Marcos Baghdatis in the third round on Tuesday.

That left Spain's Nadal as the highestranked player to make it into the quarters as he withstood a barrage of 22 aces from

the 24-year-old American Isner.

Nadal closed it out with a forehand winner into an open court.

"I am feeling really well, and I am feeling good on court," said Nadal, who is playing his first tournament since retiring injured from the Australian Open.

"I felt like I played pretty well," Isner said of his first outing against Nadal. "I might have run out of gas in the third set, but that's what he does. He makes you work so hard for every point."

Nadal next faces Czech Tomas Berdych, a 6-1, 6-3 winner over Serbian Victor Troicki, while Ljubicic will take on Argentina's Juan Monaco, who beat Spain's Guillermo Garcia Lopez 3-6, 6-2, 6-

Baghdatis, who saved three match points en route to his triumph over Federer, couldn't hold off Spain's Tommy Robredo, who notched a 7-5, 0-6, 6-4 victory to line up a meeting with seventhseeded American Andy Roddick, who beat Austraia's Jurgen Melzer 7-6, 6-4.

Murray will play sixth-seeded Swede Robin Soderling, who beat France's Jo-WilfriedTsonga 6-3, 6-4.

Meanwhile women's fifth seed Agnieszka Radwanska of Poland booked a semifinal berth with a 6-4, 6-3 victory over fourth-seeded Russian Elena Dementieva.

Radwanska has reached her second The tournament has now lost its top semifinal of the season without dropping a two men's seeds, after world number one set, and denied Dementieva a shot at a third title of 2010 -- after triumphs in Sydney and the Paris Indoors.

## Pakistan remembers Bob

Pakistan on Thursday paid glowing tribute to their former cricket coach Bob Woolmer on the third anniversary of his death, saying his progressive coaching made a huge impact on the

"On the third death anniversary of Woolmer, Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) wishes to pay tribute to a man who did so much for our cricket and whose progressive coaching made a huge impact on the game," the board announced. Woolmer, 58, was found dead in his hotel

room in Jamaica on March 18, 2007, one day after Pakistan was sensationally knocked out of the World Cup following a shock defeat to outsiders Ireland. Pakistani players came under intense investi-

gation when Woolmer's death was initially treated as murder.

Some commentators insisted Woolmer was killed to stop him blowing the whistle on illegal betting, the curse of the game in Asia. But after a detailed inquiry Jamaican police declared Woolmer had died of natural causes. PCB said the contribution of Woolmer, who

remained coach from 2004 until his death and was also a former South African coach, will never be forgotten.

"Woolmer was a distinguished cricketer and coach whose contributions to the game and especially Pakistan cricket will never be forgotten," it said.

"More importantly Woolmer was an excellent human being who enriched the lives of all those that he came in contact with.

"He is and will always be missed. The entire Pakistan cricket community's thoughts and prayers are with the Woolmer family," PCB said. To honour Woolmer, the PCB dedicated their

indoor cricket school at the National Cricket

Academy in Lahore, which was inaugurated by the Pakistan and South African teams in October 2007, to their late coach. This year's anniversary of his death comes with Pakistani players once again accused or

PCB on Wednesday sent charge sheets to the penalised players and gave them 30 days to appeal against the sanctions.

West Indies coach Ottis Gibson has said he is elated with his maiden one-day series victory -- 4-1 over Zimbabwe -- and is pleased that batsmen apart from Chris Gayle played important roles in the success. West Indies lost the Twenty20 international and the first ODI but bounced back to win four matches in a row.

"Any time you win a series it is obviously a special moment. Zimbabwe aren't rated highly, but neither are we so we couldn't have taken them for granted and we didn't take them for granted, Gibson told Nation News. "We knew they were going to put up a good fight, but we sort of steeled ourselves for that. We prepared ourselves well for winning. Everybody in the dressing room, especially all those guys who were in Australia when it was really difficult, are obviously very happy now with what we have done and achieved in this series."

Gibson, a former West Indies fast bowler who stepped down as England's bowling coach to take up his current post, admitted the losses in the Twenty20 international in Trinidad and the opening ODI in Guyana, had put his team "under a little bit of pressure".

"The home fans were obviously expecting better from us and we had to dig deep," Gibson said. "It was good to see, apart from Chris [Gayle], other batsmen making contributions and getting us over the line. Narsingh Deonarine did it on a couple of occasions and [Denesh] Ramdin got an opportunity to go up the order and bat and show us what he can do."

Gibson said a key problem was the team's inability to win by a big margin when the opportunity presented itself: West Indies lost six wickets while chasing small targets in each of the last two ODIs.

"Of course, we talked about winning handsomely and we were in a position to win handsomely two days ago [last Friday] and we sort of let it slip and the same thing again today [Sunday] where we probably could've lost two or three wickets and won easily," Gibson said. "But at the end of the day, a win is a win for a team like this which has found winning difficult over the last couple of series."
