

"Teen Number Chokh" (by renowned writer Samaresh Majumdar) -- staged by Lokkrishti, a visiting troupe from India -- was the first play at the weeklong (March 1925) Dhaka Padatik-UCB International Theatre Festival

The play highlights the illeffects of greed and selfinterest. The plot centres on a family, with the elderly Satyaprokash Dutt (Falguni Chattopadhyay) as the patri-

arch. Satyaprokash, his son Arunprokash (Prasun Bhattacharya), daughter-inlaw Protima (Rumki Chattopadhyay) and granddaughter Urmila (Monalisa Chattopadhyay) all have their individual goals. Satyaprokash wants his own

house, Arunprokash wishes to buy a flat and Urmila dreams of going to USA for higher education. These aspirations, however, cannot be realised as the family is cash-strapped. Another important char-

acter in the play is Kanchan (Shampayan Lahiri) --Urmila's friend and a wellwisher of the family. Kanchan's character represents conscience. Satyaprokash decides to commit suicide when he realises that his dream won't come true. Things worsen when Urmila wants to join her grandfather as her father chooses to buy a new flat rather than funding his daughter's education

In the midst of this entanglement, a lawyer shows up at their door, bearing a letter for Protima. The missive is a will from an anonymous individual bestowing a huge fortune on Protima, whom he claims to be his wife. The shocked family berates Protima for hiding the truth of her secret marriage. Everyone

turns a deaf ear to Protima's repeated attempts to explain herself and she is ordered to leave the house.

However, the greedy family members soon begin to realise that Protima could be their golden goose and help them realise their goals. Protima's husband tells her to go the lawyer's office posing as the dead man's wife and collect the cheque. This is the last straw for Protima as she sees the real faces of her loved ones for the first time. She decides to leave the house. At this point Kanchan makes a surprising entry and tells everyone the truth.

The play was directed by Phalguni Chattopadhyay.

Abul Kalam Azad, Minister for Information and Cultural Affairs, inaugurated the festival on March 19 at the National Theatre Stage, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy. Among others, Ramendu Majumdar, president, ITI world wide; Golam Kuddus, president, Dhaka Padatik; Rajeet Mitter, Indian High Commissioner to Bangladesh and Urs Herren, Swiss Ambassador to Bangladesh

were present on the occasion. Apart from "Teen Number Chokh", Lokkrishti also staged an experimental production "Achho Ontorey", highlighting the cultural harmony between India and Bangladesh, on the opening day. It symbolised the bond between the people of both countries in the form of two lovers separated by barb-

"The production has been specially planned for the festival. Through this production we hope to portray the bond and affection between the people and theatre activists of both countries. We're elated to be able to join this festival," said Monalisa Chattopadhyay, choreographer and director of "Achho Ontorey".

Tribute to a musical genius

Bicentenary birth anniversary celebrations of Chopin

A Philippines-born pianist, now a resident of New York, playing the music of brilliant Polish composer and pianist Fryderyk Franciszek Chopin in New Delhi? Globalisation is well and truly here in the

cultural world. This year as the world celebrates the bicentennial birth anniversary of Chopin (1810-1849), pianist Adolovni Acosta was in New Delhi recently as part of the Embassy of Poland's "Tribute from Asia". The evening included mazurkas, etudes, a nocturne, impromptu and Fantaisie in F Minor, Op 49. "These are painful chords as it takes time to resolve them," says Adolovni. A deep pain permeates his works, she says, an outcome of his turbulent life: leaving his beloved homeland after the outbreak of the November Uprising in 1830, a stormy relationship with famous French writer

tuberculosis. Adolovni also played a few pieces of Isaac Albeniz, Robert Schumann and Felix Mendelssohn. Having taken her music

to Pune, Delhi and Kolkata, Adolovni is to perform in Bangalore on March 22.

The inaugural Delhi concert dedicated to Chopin is one of many such treats that the Embassy of Poland has up

exhibitions and ballet performances. Says Ambassador of the Republic of Poland to India, Professor Piotr Klodkowski, "We believe that Chopin's revolutionary approach changed the his-

dance. "His music was not lofty and appealed to the common folk as well," says Professor Klodkowski, going on to add, "It is perfect music, which can be discovered again and again by all generations."

George Sand and debilitating Chopin will be celebrated in various cities in India, in tandem with prominent organisations, in the form of films, concerts, workshops to lecture demonstrations,

Chopin has also been variously described as a "poet of the piano" and a musician of the masses as he was greatly influenced by his national folk music and

Many world-renowned figures fell under the spell of Chopin's music. "You can love Poles for one thing itself, that they had Chopin!" remarked famous Russian

author Leo Tolstoy. Likewise French writer Honore de Balzac asserted, "Chopin is less a musician than a soul manifesting and communicating itself through all manner of music, even through

simple chords." The credit for the Chopin 2010 celebrations in New Delhi must go to the Embassy of Poland, the Delhi Music Society, India International Centre together with the Chopin 2010 India Celebration Committee.

One interesting experiment in the yearlong celebrations is likely to be a fusion of Chopin music with Indian classical dance.

Bangladesh could also figure in the bicentennial celebrations with Chopin films, lecture demonstrations and concerts in the second half of the year. Detailed programmes, venues and dates still remain to be worked out.

If all goes according to plan, Dhakaittes can look forward to some spellbinding cultural fare dedicated to the perennial musical genius of Chopin.

Priyanka Chopra wins **Indian National Film Award**

Priyanka Chopra and Arjun Rampal joined an elite club of winners on Friday after being presented with the National Awards at a ceremony in New Delhi which also saw veteran cameraman V.K. Murthy receiving the Dada Saheb Phalke amid a standing ovation from the audience.

The award for best direction went to Bala for Tamil film "Naan Kadavul".

Priyanka, 28, received the Rajat Kamal Medal and a cash prize of Rs 50,000 for Best Actress for her role as an aspiring model in "Fashion" with her co-star Kangana Ranaut, also winning the award for Best Supporting Actress.

Rampal received the award for Supporting Actor for his role as a struggling musician in "Rock On" while the award for Best Actor was conferred on Upendra Limaye for the Marathi film "Jogva". It is a first national award for Rampal, Priyanka and Kangana.

Murthy, 87, who shot India's first cinemascope movie "Kagaz Ke Phool" and best remembered for his stunning camera work for all films of legendary Guru Dutt, is the first cinematographer to be given the Phalke since its inception in 1969.

Dibakar Banerjee's "Oye Lucky! Lucky



Oye!" was given the award for the best popular film providing wholesome entertainment.
