

Onus on Shakib to save match

Can Shakib Al Hasan celebrate his birthday in style today? The Bangladesh captain will need to do something special on the fifth and final day of the second and final Test against England if he wants to make it a day to remember at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

The job will not be easy for the Tigers even to save the match after the fourth day's play as the visitors finally gained the momentum after Bangladesh's second innings was found wanting, with some funny dismissals, and the loss of wickets at regular intervals.

turns twenty-three today, batting on 25 and night watchman Shafiul Islam on naught. Stuart Broad and Graeme Swann with two wickets apiece made regular inroads into Bangladesh's batting order in a pitch where the bowlers finally got some assistance as cracks opened up.

Bangladesh began their second essay fifteen minutes before the lunch break with a 77 run deficit as England were bundled out for 496 after resuming the day on 440 for eight. Tim Bresnan missed his hundred for nine runs as Mushfiqur Rahim made a brilliant stumping off left-arm spinner Abdur Razzak, who also took the day's other wicket of James Tredwell (37). And on that occasion too it was Mushfiqur's

tremendous stumping which put an end to the England innings.

England went for a happy lunch as Broad gave them an early breakthrough by removing the out-of-form Imrul Kayes, who was unlucky as he tried to flick it away but ended up deflecting the ball onto his leg-stump via the bottom of his thigh pad.

Tamim Iqbal however was lucky enough to score a half-century as the left-hander survived twice courtesy of sloppy fielding from Tredwell and Jonathan Trott. But the Chittagonian was stopped at 52 when he flashed an outside offstump delivery from Swann only to reach the safe hands of Broad at point.

Bangladesh lost one more wicket before the The home side were reduced to 172 for six, to tea break as Junaed Siddiqui also fell victim of manage only a 95 run lead, with Shakib, who an unfortunate dismissal. The tall left-hander drove firmly off the back foot onto Alistair Cook's boot from where the ball looped gently to Tredwell to take a catch and claim his first wicket of the innings.

The quick dismissal of Mahmudullah Riyad after the break deepened the crisis for Bangladesh. The right-hander got an edge from a good delivery of Bresnan to perish for just six

Jahirul remains UDRS in next Test series upbeat

The platform was not perfect for debutant batsman Jahirul Islam to deal with the press as defeat was looming for the home team at the end of the fourth day's play of the second and final Test at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

But there was no shortage of confidence when the newcomer talked about his team's chance to earn a credible draw, his effort in the second innings after a first innings duck and obviously on poor umpiring and the pitch.

"We should draw the match because we have played good cricket. It will be really nice for us if we have two more wickets in hand at the end of the day. But still we are hopeful because Shafiul scored a fifty in the first innings while Naeem is yet to bat," said Jahirul when asked whether it would be possible for his side to save the match on 172 for six.

"You never know what can happen in cricket. Still it is possible to draw the match if we can spend time in the middle for two sessions on the final day. The first session will be crucial for us and we must play the first session without any damage," he added.

Jahirul said that he could have prolonged his innings if he had avoided playing too many shots and dealt with spinner Graeme Swann more carefully. "Actually I stepped into a trap. I was a little bit excited as it's my first match and I went to bat on the back of a duck. I wanted to get back my confidence by playing some shots but it was not my plan to hit sixes," he said about his innings.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president AHM Mustafa Kamal has assured that the Umpire Decision Review System (UDRS) will be in place from the next home Test series in Bangladesh which is in October against New Zealand.

Clarifying that the non-installation of the UDRS in the current series against England had nothing to do with finance rather it was a matter of the intricacy of the system that barred from it being installed, the BCB supremo said they are working with the broadcasters and others involved to make sure that the logistics are there for the next Test series. He said all these to reporters at the press box of the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium while accompanying International Cricket Council (ICC) president David Morgan yesterday.

"We have been talking about the UDRS issue, but we found that other countries have not been using it extensively, so we thought tional or elite umpires are biased. This game that, first of all, we must know about the system itself. It is very delicate and if we misused it, it might go against us. There was also the matter of agreement with broadcasters involved," said the BCB chief.

"Now we have taken up the matter with the broadcasters and everybody has agreed that in

time for the New Zealand tour, everything will be in place."

Such an affirmative response from the person-in-charge was the demand of the hour after the blasting by Bangladesh skipper Shakib Al Hasan the previous day for BCB's failure to have the technology in place for the current series.

The whole series against England, starting from the one-dayers has been dogged with contentious decisions. The most frustrating fact was that the hosts have been in the receiving end for most of those shocking decisions.

A fuming Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons claimed at the end of third day's play that three or four decisions went against his side which only justified his opposite number Andy Flower's pre-series remark that more influential teams tend to get the rub of the green in marginal decisions.

The ICC president refuted such indication but at the same time he felt Bangladesh might have been better off with the UDRS in place than not and admitted that he was not pleased with the standard of umpiring in the series.

"I cannot accept that any of our internawill be monitored in Dubai, and the match referee here is monitoring umpires' performances as well. We will also listen to the captain of Bangladesh and the coach, but their views will not necessarily be regarded as value judgements at the end of the day," said Morgan.

Bresnan sniffs victory

It all looked so bright for Bangladesh when they built a first innings total of 419, but by the end of Day Four England took a strangling hold on the match courtesy of some rearguard batting and some spirited bowling performance later.

In the morning England stretched their lead over Bangladesh to a sizeable 77 runs before being all out for 496 runs. A gritty and gutsy knock of 91 runs from Tim Bresnan helped England take the lead. He later took the wicket of Mahmudullah Riyad as the Tigers slumped to 172 for six by the end of yesterday. And the 25year-old paceman believes a second victory in the two Test series is round the corner for England.

"I think four quick wickets tomorrow and we chase 150 and win," said Bresnan adding, "We'll see how it goes but that's how we've set it up. We will be chasing a total, I have a feeling about that, especially after getting the key wicket of Mushfiqur [Rahim]. We've got a nightwatchman in tomorrow and then Naeem [Islam], who'll hang in a bit, but if we can get them out, we are sniffing a win."

Bresnan was smelling a maiden century before his oft-rushof-blood against a flighted delivery from Abdur Razzaq left his castle empty only to be taken care of by keeper Mushfigur. But the paceman who considers himself as a genuine all-rounder and after an innings like that has every reason to do so, said he was pleased to have made a good contribution to the team's

Afridi named T20 captain

Pakistan Cricket Board (BCB) on Tuesday named all-rounder Shahid Afridi as captain for next month's World Twenty20, in which the embattled team are hoping to defend their title in the West Indies.

The 30-year-old was tipped favourite to lead the side, but his reputation suffered a blow when he was slapped with a two-match ban for tampering after being caught biting the ball during a match against Australia last month.

Afridi vowed to carry the team to victory after the PCB announced his appointment.

Siddons fined

Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons was on Tuesday fined 10 percent of his match fee for showing dissent at an umpire's decision during the ongoing second and final Test against England in Dhaka.

"Jamie became increasingly frustrated and let his emotions out during the second session of day three (Monday), which was obvious for all to see," International Cricket Council matchreferee Jeff Crowe said in a statement.

"Clearly he behaved inappropriately and he agrees that such actions and gestures must be kept behind closed doors.

"He is disappointed with himself that he was so public and he did not hesitate in pleading guilty and accepting the proposed sanction."

Shakib bowled 66 overs, of which 27 were maiden, and the left-arm spinner conceded 124 runs for four wickets.

He broke Rafique's record for most number of overs bowled in a Test innings by a Bangladeshi bowler in England's first innings of the Mirpur Test yesterday.

Rafique, the retired left-armer bowled

59.1 overs in an innings, picking up six wickets against New Zealand in 2004. While it took six years for the feat to be broken, it wasn't surprising that another

So when Jahirul Islam faced his sixth ball in the second innings, he must have had his heart in his mouth. Admittedly nervous, Jahirul charged Graeme Swann and spanked him over mid-on for six, his first runs in Tests.

It probably was a unique way to open one's Test account, almost like getting a wicket in the first over of a debut Test.

From recent memory, West Indies opener Dale Richards slammed a six to score his first Test runs when he pulled Mashrafe Bin Mortaza over midwicket in St Vincent last

FROM PLAYER TO PRESIDENT

Even though his first visit was 33 years ago when Bangladesh was only just beginning its cricketing journey and he was an offspinner, MCC president John Barclay isn't really surprised at the heights that the Tigers have reached in international cricket.

"It is not a surprise that Bangladesh is now a Test-playing nation," said Barclay, who came to this country as a player in the 1977 goodwill tour by the Marylebone Cricket Club. The tour paved the way for Bangladesh to be put on the cricketing

Now in Bangladesh on an official visit with the ICC chief David Morgan, Barclay enthused about his first trip as an offspinner playing for the MCC.

"Nothing much has changed; the smell, the enthusiasm and the environment seem to be similar to 1977. But the cricket has certainly changed now with so much talent and coaching around," said Barclay who also toured Bangladesh as an official of the England A side in 1994.
