Black Night revisits tonight

A long wait for justice is about to end today as the government announces a formal start to the process of trying the war criminals, just before the nation's 40th Independence Day.

The government timed the landmark announcement with the Black Night of March 25 that evokes the painful memories of thousands of unarmed Bangalees slaughtered by the Pakistani occupation forces in 1971.

Food ration in hills Tk 100cr a year

Most beneficiaries of public money Bangalee settlers

The government has to spend over Tk 100 crore a year to provide food rations to 40,335 families, mostly Bangalee settlers living in 81 cluster villages in Chittagong Hill Tracts.

And it has been shouldering the expenditure for years without solving the problems in CHT

A total 26,220 Bangla-speaking families living in the 81 cluster villages in Khagrachhari and Rangamati districts have been getting the ration since October 1988. The remaining 14,115 families are repatriated indigenous refugees and members of the Shanti Bahini who have been given the ration since 1998.

In 1986, when massive violence erupted in the region HM Ershad's government built the cluster villages for Bangalee settlers near army camps to ensure their safety and security and later decided to provide them with food ration initially for three years.

On the issue, some Bangalees living in Baghaichhari upazila of Rangamati said the government has not increased the number of recipients for years.

"Population has increased in the Chittagong Hill Tracts. Now they should review and increase the number of ration recipients," said Abdul Kalam, who moved to Baghachhari from

Dighinala, Khagrachhari, three years ago. Indigenous recipients comprise those

The communications ministry yesterday announced to initiate a drive to confiscate all unfit age-old public transport and remove them from the



STRIKE ENTERS DAY 2

Local miners confine 760 over pay hike

Local miners confined 760 people, including 370 staff, to Barapukuria Coal Mine Company Ltd (BCMCL) complex yesterday, the second day of their strike, to realise their demand for pay

Some 220 Chinese officials and staffs of two contractor companies--CMC and XMC--are among the victims of confinement. The coal production and sale remained suspended for the second consecutive day, said BCMCL official sources.

The agitating miners with the help of villagers encircled the BCMCL complex with sticks from outside and resisted any movement of its officials and staffs. But the staffs were maintaining external contacts over phones, sources said.

MARRIAGE REFUSAL

Youth shoots dead parents of schoolgirl

A youth shot a schoolgirl's parents dead in their flat at Kalachandpur in the capital's Gulshan yesterday as they declined to marry their daughter off to him.

Rubel, 24, shot the couple when they tried to prevent him from dragging their daughter

Deceased Sadequr Rahman, 55, general secretary of Bangladesh Nursery Owners' Association and his wife Romana Nargis, 45, were living on the first floor of a five-storey building.

Victims' daughter Bithi who witnessed the murders told The Daily Star that Rubel along with his friend Mithun came to their flat around 8:45am.

"Rubel had a hot exchange of words with my father as he turned down Rubel's proposal of marriage with my sister Nilufar Yesmin Iti. My father asked him to send his guardians instead," said Bithi.

At one stage Rubel tried to drag Iti out of the house. As her father resisted, Rubel shot him in the head around 9:00am, she said adding that

Rubel shot her mother as she came to her hus-

band's help. "My father died on the spot and my mother succumbed to her injury at United Hospital in

Gulshan at 9:30am," Bithi said. When Rubel was having an altercation with Iti after the killings, Bithi ran down to the garage and took shelter in a car asking the security to

close the main gate. Caretaker of the building Abdul Kuddus told this correspondent that around 9:00am he locked the main gate as Bithi told him that Rubel had killed her father.

"Rubel made me open the gate at gunpoint and fled the scene with his accomplice," the caretaker said.

He said Rubel used to come to meet Iti in the flat over the last six months. Rubel also went out on dates with Iti at times.

Officer-in-charge Kamal Uddin of Gulshan Police Station said Rubel, a resident of Nadda in Gulshan, tried to develop a relation with Iti over the last one year but Iti's family did not accept it, as he was a drug addict.
