Franklin in NZ squad

New Zealand has called up fast bowler James Franklin to join the squad for Saturday's second Test against Australia in Hamilton.

Australia leads the twomatch series 1-0 after a 10wicket win in Wellington on Tuesday.

"There has been a lot of rain in Hamilton of late, and it is fair to say that the conditions we saw today at Seddon Park, at this stage, are far different to those we experienced earlier in the season," New Zealand coach Mark Greatbatch said in a statement.

"We thought it prudent to have all our bases covered, and James does that for us,' Sydney Morning Herald quoted Greatbatch, as saying.

The Black Caps hope Franklin's batting will add depth to their tail at No.8, after New Zealand lost 5-9 in their first innings of the first Test and their last four wickets for nine runs in their second innings.

The 14-man squad also includes uncapped 19-yearold batsman Kane Williamson, who could be vying for a spot in the side with Mathew Sinclair to replace out-of-form No.3 Peter Ingram.

McCullum afraid of ODIs 'Invincible'

Brendon McCullum has warned "one-day cricket is in danger" as an international format. The New Zealand wicketkeeper-batsman

believes Test cricket's traditions can withstand the rise of Twenty20 cricket, a form of the game in which he excels. But even though the International Cricket

Council's premier tournament is the 50-oversa-side World Cup, McCullum fears established one-day cricket may not survive the rise of Twenty20. "It's a dangerous time for the 50-over for-

mat," McCullum told the April edition of the Wisden Cricketer magazine. "At the moment T20 cricket has captivated a

lot of people. "Test cricket will always stay -- there're too

many traditionalists, and it is considered the cream of the crop for most cricketers.

"One-day cricket is in danger."

Following his 56-ball 116 against Australia in the recent T20 international in Christchurch, McCullum does though see some downsides in world cricket's shortest format.

No doubt thinking of the example of New Zealand's Shane Bond and England's Andrew Flintoff, McCullum fears the impressive financial rewards on offer from Twenty20 cricket will deter already injury-hit fast bowlers from putting themselves through the greater physical demands of five-day Test matches if they can still earn good money for much less work.

"The one concern I do have is that genuine fast bowlers around the world will look at the option of four-overs-a-game two or three times a week versus the hard graft of Test match and one-day cricket and decide that four overs is their lot," McCullum said.

"I'm talking about the 150-160 kph bowlers. That would be a shame, because I think there's something incredible about watching raw pace bowl a long spell in a Test."

Afridi appeals penalty

Pakistan's Twenty20 captain Shahid Afridi is the first to appeal against his punishment following a disastrous tour of Australia that saw the country's cricket board come down hard on top players.

Afridi was among seven players who were punished by a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) inquiry committee, set up to investigate the February tour.

The 30-year-old all-rounder, appointed captain for next month's World Twenty20 in the West Indies, was fined three million rupees (35,000 dollars) for tampering with the ball during a one-day match in Australia last month.

He was also put on a six-month probation during which his conduct will be strictly monitored.

Pakistan lost all three Tests, five one-day matches and the only Twenty20 international 30-day period for appeals.

Former captains Younus Khan and Mohammad Yousuf were banned for an unspecified period, while Shoaib Malik and Navedul Hasan were banned for one year and heavily fined.

Brothers Kamran and Umer Akmal were also heavily fined by the PCB in an unprecedented move on March 10.

PCB chief operating officer Wasim Bari confirmed Afridi was the first to lodge his appeal.

"Afridi has submitted his appeal against the team's dismal performance on the December- fine with the PCB chairman liaz Butt and now one of three independent judges appointed to hear the appeals will take up the matter," Bari told AFP.

> The PCB last week appointed two retired Supreme Court judges -- Muneer Sheikh and Jamshed Ali Shah -- and a former High Court judge, Irfan Qadir, to deal with the appeals.

Shane Watson's chances of playing the second Test in Hamilton looked promising after he had a strong workout during a batting session in the Seddon Park nets on Thursday. Watson appeared unencumbered by the hip strain that kept him out of the win in Wellington, driving and pulling with full power against Clint McKay and a group of local bowlers.

Should Watson prove his fitness it will mean the axe for Phillip Hughes, who blazed to an unbeaten 86 as Australia chased down 106 to win the first Test at the Basin Reserve. Michael Hussey said Hughes would not be fazed by making way for Watson and the Australians were confident that Hughes would become a full-time member of the Test side in the future. "He's a great young guy," Hussey

said. "I think he just loves being around

the group at the moment. He is so young, there's so much time for him. All you can say is keep churning out the runs for New South Wales and when he gets his chance to play for Australia, keep showing everyone that he is good enough. I'm sure his opportunity is going to come up, where he'll make that position his own at some stage."

Hughes took a shine to the New Zealand pace attack in the second innings in Wellington, where the home bowlers took only five wickets for the match. James Franklin has been added to the New Zealand squad to replace the injured Daryl Tuffey and with some rain around in Hamilton two days out from the Test, the hosts faced a tough call on whether to use Franklin or the second spinner Jeetan Patel. New Zealand lacked a spearhead in

Wellington, where Chris Martin struggled for impact and his new-ball partner Tim Southee failed to take a wicket. The loss of Shane Bond and Iain O'Brien to Test retirement in the past few months has been a blow for New Zealand but Simon Katich, who saw plenty of the seamers in his innings of 79 and 18 not out, said there were still challenges for Australia's top order. "There's no doubt those two are big

losses, Bond with his pace but also O'Brien, he has bowled well against us in the past and he was able to bowl at a lively pace and moved the ball," Katich said. "Both those guys are big losses to their attack. But their guys posed problems for us the other day. We had the best of the conditions batting first, there was a bit of hard work to be done early." New Zealand must also decide on

what to do with their batting line-up, with Peter Ingram under pressure having failed in both innings at the Basin Reserve. The veteran Mathew Sinclair and the teenager Kane Williamson are in the mix to come in to the side, although the conditions closer to Saturday will help determine the balance of the team.
