

# Awareness on Liberation War through theatre

BSA stages "Khetmojur Khoimuddin"

........... "Though the Pakistani army was defeated in 1971, their cronies, the Razakars and Albadrs are still at large and it is high time that these people are brought to justice for their heinous crimes in 1971," -was a reaction from an audience at National Theatre Stage, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA) on March 26. Theatre and Film Department of BSA was staging "Khetmojur Khoimuddin", set against the onset of the Liberation War, highlighting the atrocities of the Razakars and Pakistani army.

To celebrate the 39th Independence Day, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy held a three-day programme start-

ing from March 24. "Khetmojur Khoimuddin" was staged on the final day of the festival. The play was written and directed by Golam Sarwar. The protagonist of the play


is Khoimuddin Sheikh (played by Khandokar Tazminur). Khoimuddin is a day labourer who comes to Dhaka in search of better livelihood. In Dhaka he becomes aware of the political situation. As the Liberation War starts he returns to his village and informs the villagers of the war, Pakistani army and the 'Mukti Bahini'. But unbeknown to him the local landlords Sabed Talukder (played by Mohammad Zahid Hossain Liton) and Solaiman aka 'Miaji' (played by Saifur Rahman) have formed a peace committee and been feeding the villagers false news of the war and propaganda about the 'Mukti Bahini'. When the peace committee becomes aware of Khoimuddin's efforts of gathering support for the 'Mukti Bahini' they inform the Pakistani army. In the last scene Khoimuddin is brutally murdered by the army -- a reminder of the mass murders conducted in 1971.

Among others Kamal Lohani, director general, BSA attended the play.

Apart from the play, the three-day festival included regular cultural programmes, discussions, recitations, dance performances and more at the BSA Open Stage.

"You know, my misfortune of not seeing a great director making a movie out of my work seems to continue," Hossain told The Daily Star here on the sidelines of SAARC Literature Festival at the India International Centre last Saturday.

The writer said that she is not sure if Mrinal Sen would be able to make a film out of her story, given his age and that he has not directed a movie for quite some years now. Sen, according to Hossain, wanted to shoot the film in India. The author recalled with disappointment

how Ray had written to her a number of letters in 1970s that he wanted to film "Hangor Nodi Grenade", set against the backdrop of the Liberation War, but could never make it.

However, after Ray's demise in April 1993, it was Bangladeshi director Chashi Nazrul Islam who made a film out of it.

In fact, Ray had since mid-1970s wanted to adapt "Hangor Nodi Grenade" and asked The story which Sen wanted to film is about Hossain not to allow any other director to make a film on the story. The writer kept her promise till Ray's death, leaving his wish unfulfilled and her disappointed.

Will history repeat itself if Mrinal Sen wants to film her short story? Hossain shudders to think of such a possibility.

## **Bucket blast**

#### Art show

Who hasn't heard of wall, street or even rickshaw art? Balti (bucket) art is in a different league altogether. In a first of its kind endeavour in India, the Delhi-based Kala Care groupArtists for Better World, displayed the works of 35 artists, who have used the ubiquitous bucket as their canvas.

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The five-day "Balti Blast", an effective art show, concluded recently. The exhibition was held to coincide with World Water Day on March 22.

The 31 buckets tell their own storyeven if they sometimes convey truisms. Manish Kumar, artist and senior designer with CNN IBN, has finely embellished his bucket with human forms, an embryo, a mushroom, taps, hand pumps, tube-wells, clouds and living creatures like penguins and birds. "We on earth are wasting precious water resources and eyeing the moon and Mars to meet our water requirements. The truth is that with proper water conservation, we do not need to look elsewhere," he says.

In another eye catching bucket, artist Amrendra Maharana depicts many taps sprouting from a human head. There are also motifs like a child, fish, tortoise, a man and a toothbrush. Explaining the toothbrush, Maharana says that each of us has an "inner child" and emulating children may just leave taps

open while brushing our teeth.

In his work, renowned artist Jai Zharotia, the guiding force behind Kala Care and former head of the Department of MFA (Painting) at the Delhi College of Art, makes the point that living creatures and entire cities have no future without water. " All artists have a social conscience," asserts Zharotia, about his art.

The works of several other

The exhibition is a first for the Kala Care group which intends to extend its social and environmental horizons to theatre, music and dance. Says Shweta Zharotia, founder of the group, "We started Kala Care a few months ago with the vision that art should not be con-
