Seventy-five countries accounting for more than 80 percent of greenhouse gases from energy use have filed pledges to cut or limit carbon emissions by 2020, the UN climate convention said yesterday.

The promises, made under the Copenhagen Accord, are only a step towards wider action to tackle global warming, the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) said in its official report on December's world climate summit.

A total of 111 countries plus the European Union (EU) "have indicated their support for the Accord," the UNFCCC

Cobbled together in the summit's crisis-ridden final hours, the Copenhagen switching out of carbon-Accord sets the goal of limiting intensive fuels, drove the warming to two degrees Celsius (3.6 Fahrenheit), gathering rich and poor countries in action against carbon pollution that causes the problem.

It also promises 30 billion dollars for climate-vulnerable poor countries in the three years to 2012, and up to 100 billion dollars annually by

Supporters point out it is the first accord to include advanced and emerging economies in specified emissions

Critics retort that it has no deadline for reaching the warming target, has no roadmap for reaching it and its pledges are only voluntary.

The UNFCCC's report on Wednesday confirms that major emitters, including China, India and Brazil, have given the Accord their political olessing.

After more than two months of foot-dragging, the emerging giants separately aligned themselves with the

But when reporters pointed out that Jamaat's present Senior Nayebe Ameer Abul Kalam Mohammad Yousuf, former acting ameer Abbas Ali Khan and another Jamaat man Khaleque Mojumder were sentenced to life in prison under the collaborators act, Mojaheed replied that the first two were convicted as they were members of the government cabinet back then, while Mojumder was a Jammat member alright, but of a lower level.

He also claimed although a lower court convicted Mojumder, a higher court acquitted him, proving that he was not guilty.

"One day in future antibiotics will not work for them if these kids remain exposed to this hazardous job for a long

time," he adds. At least five to six children usually work at each factory regularly and the number increases based on orders. Three to four adults, who get Tk 4,000 per month, work at the factory for making chemical solution and supervising the children's work.

The job at the balloon factory includes melting rubber, dipping balloons in acid solution, unwinding balloons from its case and colouring those.

When this correspondent visited the factory it was the time for unwinding the balloons, which have been produced. Another factory stands just several hundred yards away from the one where Ayub works. In that factory children were colouring the balloons spraying manually with a simple handmade spray stick.

allegations against Joy and they should also know there will be dire consequences if they fail to do so," Inu said.
