### Final results of 28th BCS exams soon

The final results of 28th Bangladesh Civil Service (BCS) examinations under Public Service Commission (PSC) will be published soon while the proceedings of 29th BCS will be completed by this year.

"The result of the 28th BCS will be published soon," said an official, adding that though written test and viva voce of 28th BCS were held on time, the result could not be published in due time because of some legal barriers.

The legal barriers have been resolved recently, he added.

The official, however, could not indicate any specific date about the publication of the result.

The 28th BCS preliminary test was held on November 2008 and the result came out on February 1 last year while the written exams ended in May 2009.

National Prof Dr MR Khan yesterday called on the people to change their negative attitude towards autistic children and extend their cooperation for rehabilitation of the children.

He also stressed the need for identification of all the autistic children across the country, saying, "The earlier autistic children can be identified, the sooner their rehabilitation can be ensured."

Prof Khan said this at the inaugural session of a two-day autism fair at Russian Centre of Science and Culture in the city on the occasion of the World Autism Awareness Day-2010 to be observed today.

The fair is being jointly organised by Bangladesh Protibondhi Foundation (BPF), United Nations Information Centre (UNIC) and Russian Centre of Science and Culture.

BPF Executive Director Dr Shamim Ferdous said a survey, which was conducted at Malibagh and Mirpur in 2008, showed that every three children out of 1,000 are autistic.

"The autistic children from insolvent families are deprived of treatment and training, which are provided at different institutes, because these treatment and training are very expensive."

She also sought cooperation from the government and private organisations as well as individuals to ensure proper treatment and training for autistic children.

A painting competition will be held on April 5-7 in participation of the students of Kanan, an education centre of the Autism Welfare Foundation that teaches autistic children.

### 18 killed in 'crossfire' in 3 months

'crossfire' with law enforcement agencies in the last three months, according to a survey report prepared by Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), a human

rights organisation. Of them, 11 people died in 'crossfire' by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab), four in 'shootout' with police while three others in 'encounters' with

During the period, cases were filed against nine journalists for publishing reports while 20 others received death threats.

women, the report said 130 women were raped and 15 of them were killed.

Some 39 women were killed over dowry and 65 other women tortured in dowryrelated incidents.

court fee.
