BNP fronts too see selection, not election

BNP is picking leaders for the central committees of its front organisations, preventing those from electing their top leaders in a democratic way.

Asked, a number of BNP leaders said the

issue of electing top leaders of the front bodies was never discussed in the party forum. The party has already announced the central committees of Jatiyatabadi Juba Dal,

Jatiyatabadi Sechchhasebak Dal and Jatiyatabadi Mohila Dal. It also formed the central committee of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) though JCD is no more a front body of BNP. Insiders say BNP would soon announce the

central committees of Jatiyatabadi Krishok Dal and Sramik Dal, though the latter is no longer its front body as per the Representation of the People Order (RPO).

Approved by BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, the central committees were announced by issuing press releases, sparking protests and anger among the supporters.

The central committees of other front organisations -- Muktijoddha Dal, Jatiyatabadi Samajik Sangskritik Sangathon, Tanti Dal, Olama Dal and Matsyajibi Dal -- will also be formed later in the same way, the insiders add.

BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir however claimed the party high-ups did not impose the committees on the front bodies. The chairperson and senior leaders shared views with leaders of the front organisations' different levels before announcing the committees, he said.

"The new committees of the front and associate bodies will reorganise their respective organisations through holding councils from grassroots to central levels to ensure democratic practices within the organisations," Alamgir said in reply to a query.

In fact, BNP itself did not follow its constitution to elect its central leadership. Councillors were not allowed to elect the central leaders in the December 8 national council.

Water pipeline a blessing for Satkhira villagers

1,500 getting arsenic-free water under public-pvt initiative

Water pipelines under a public-private partnership (PPP) scheme have saved over 1,500 people of Nalta village in Satkhira from saline and arsenic contaminated water.

Since water drawn by shallow tubewells became undrinkable due to salinity and arsenic, a deep tubewell has been set up, a reservoir was built and over 13 kilometres of pipeline network was created here last December.

The deep tubewell at Hadipur, some 4 km from Nalta, is 280 feet deep and the

water is salt and arsenic-free. "We had to fetch water from places

four to five kilometres away from our village. It is wonderful to have supply water at an affordable cost," Jaheda Begum, a homemaker in her 50's, said last Wednesday.

She said they now pay Tk 100 a month for the supply water. The supply runs twice a day--from 8:00 to 9:00 am and 5:00 to 6:00pm, added Jaheda.

This pipeline network in Nalta is the first of 21 PPP schemes under Bangladesh Water Supply Programme Project (BWSPP). Funded by the World Bank the project has been implemented by the Department of Public Health Engineering (DPHE) under LGRD ministry.

The BWSPP is innovating measures

like small-scale piped water in villages to keep people from using arsenic contaminated water.

In the early 90's, shallow tubewells became popular in rural areas for its low cost and convenience. But that success countered a setback as arsenic started to creep in. The water of 200 to 250 feet underground got contaminated in many parts of Bangladesh. By late 90's water from 20 percent tubewells became harmful for domestic work, said a World Bank

The World Bank and DPHE officials involved in the project said the 21 water pipeline schemes involving 18 private

RMG units without fire safety warned

If necessary, factories to be closed for violating rules

The government yesterday warned garment industry owners of stern actions if their factories lack fire safety compliance.

The warning came at an inter-ministerial meeting held at the home ministry with Home Minister Sahara Khatun in the chair.

The meeting was convened to discuss what to do for fire safety in garment factories in the advent of summer when most fires occur in garment factories. It also discussed the reasons for and solutions to incidents of fire.

"If necessary, we will close down the factories that are not following the rules, and failing to ensure fire safety," State Minister for Home Shamsul Haq Tuku told reporters after the

He said many factories are located in such places where firefighters cannot enter when fire breaks out. Water is also not available at some of those places, he added.

Leaders of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA), and Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BKMEA) attending the meeting, requested the government to increase fire safety monitoring of garment factories.

They requested the government to allow them to import duty-free ambulances and fire fighting vehicles to increase their fire fighting capacity. They also urged the government to

The cases were filed in Khulna and Rangamati on charge of comparing Nizami with Prophet Hazrat Mohammad (PBUH).

Green 3-wheeler ready to roll

The highly low cost battery-run three-wheeler dubbed as Borak Super gets even more energy efficient as local entrepreneurs introduced solar panels to partly power up its rechargeable battery.

At a three-day Renewable Energy Expo at Dhaka University, Bangladesh Solar Energy Society presented Borak Super vehicle modified with solar panels.

Borak Super ran for a short period of time in the capital. The vehicle is considered as the most energy efficient and environment friendly that has ever hit the Dhaka streets.

Mohsin Khan, owner of Ma Enterprise, the first company to introduce the three-wheeler in the country, explained, Borak Super mainly runs with four rechargeable batteries.

The zero emission three-wheeler consumes electricity worth around Tk 30 a day. The solar panel will save its 20 percent electricity.

With an eight-hour recharge from a regular power outlet the vehicle can run 120 km at its highest speed of 40 km per hour. To minimise energy consumption the body was made with light material, Mohsin added.

During the day the solar panel keeps on charging the batteries that will ultimately save 20 percent electricity, he went on to say.

After long 21 years Mohammad Shahabuddin, a close aide to Moni, filed a murder case with Dhanmondi Police Station in 1996 accusing
