Salinity increases in groundwater

BSS, Chittagong

The work for identifying the reasons behind increase of salinity in groundwater is going on in full swing across the country.

The government launched the "Forecasting saline water intrusion, water quality and waterlogging programme" in February last

According to the project profile, 150 `salinity test tubewells' will be installed in the coastal belts of Chittagong at a cost of Tk3 crore.

Eighty tubewells of such kind have already been sunk and 20 more will be installed by June this year, the sources said.

Abdul Hai, assistant engineer of Minor salinity. Irrigation Information Service Wing of Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC), said such kind of tubewells have been installed in Khulna, Satkhira, Madaripur, Shariatpur, Chittagong, Cox's Bazar, Noakhali, Lakkhipur, Chandpur, Gopalganj, Barisal, Barguna, Patuakhali, Bhola, Jhalakathi, Pirojpur, Jhenidah, Magura, Rajbari, Bagerhat, Narail and Jessore.

BADC sources said such tubewells would be sunk maintaining a distance of 50 kilometers as per opinions of experts across the country, excluding the hilly areas, and the number of such tubewells might be increased to 500 to reap benefits.

Project Officer of "Forecasting saline water intrusion, water quality and waterlogging programme" and Superintendent Engineer of BADC Iftekhar Alam said the project would help identify the sources of salinity in the ground, its impact and remedy.

He said it would also help take effective steps to save the country from the bad effects of climate change -- salinity.

"The second phase of identifying the sources of saline water will start right after we get equipment from abroad and the project is expected to be completed by December next," Iftekhar said.

"We must take preventative measures to cope with the bad effects of climate change according to geological technical guidelines so that we can get rid of salinity," he said, adding that the tubewells of Tala, Debhata and Kaliganj of Satkhira are marked with huge presence of

Iftekhar said presently the water level at Dhaka city is 140 feet under the sea level and the water level in and around Dhaka is also gradually dropping.

Abdul Huq, assistant professor of Geography and Environmental Studies Department at Chittagong University, said the reserve of the groundwater is not fulfilled due to shortfall of rain and it results in decrease of water level and increase of saline water.

However, he thought that excessive use of groundwater in daily life is also responsible for

Md Ibrahim Khalil, who was the investigation officer of the case before DB took it over.

Latifa said, "I did not say that my daughter committed suicide. I told police that hearing Pinky's scream I rushed to the spot and saw Tabarak running away from my house, while Pinky in flames jumped into the adjacent pond."

She also said since she had not seen who had set her daughter on fire she did not want to mention any suspect, but she definitely wanted to record that she saw Tabarak running away, and definitely did not want to identify the incident as a suicide. She also said later on death bed Pinky told her that Tabarak had doused Pinky with kerosene and set her on fire with a matchstick.

"When I did not want to mention any suspect, a police person at the station asked me to mention a name, saying that the merit of the case would be weak if I did not mention any name," Latifa said adding that she was tremendously traumatised at the moment, so when police read out the recorded statement to her she could not pay much attention.

She could not tell the name of the police person who recorded her statement, but said she will recognise him if she sees him again.

Latifa alleged that Tabarak's family is now spreading unfounded filthy rumours about her to prove that because

ofher, Pinky committed suicide. Pinky died on April 5 after

being set on fire in her Kona Bhawal village residence of Tarail upazila in Kishoreganj. Right before Pinky died she told Latifa that Tabarak set fire to her, and requested her mother to make sure that her killer is punished.

According to local residents, and Pinky's mother and classmates, Tabarak had stalked Pinky for two years and harassed her with unwanted advances including repeated proposals for mar-

Tabarak is from an influential local family. According to the local residents, Tabarak has a history of vile criminality, and everybody in the area is afraid of his temper and brutality. But because of his family's power, Tabarak's deeds usually go unpunished, the residents added.

On the other hand, the victim's family is very poor. Pinky's father is currently a bakery worker in Sylhet, who earlier used to pull rickshaws in the capital to earn a living for his family.

Sub-inspector Khalil said police have been guarding the complainant's house since Thursday evening to avert any possible attack.

Latifa said she will seek help of the prime minister if she is denied justice at the local level.

The SP said he himself will monitor the case from now on, and that is why the case was transferred to DB.
