# No room for tender manipulators in BCL

### Says AL general secretary

AL General Secretary and LGRD Minister Syed Ashraful Islam yesterday said there is no room for tender manipulators or vandals in Bangladesh Chhatra League or Jubo League.

The party chief and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had already given this message to all, he bers. said, adding: "We want to bring about a big change in the AL, which has a bright and unique history of dedicated politics."

The minister said this as the chief guest at the inaugural ceremony of the party's membership drive at the Sylhet Auditorium in Sylhet

Inaugurating the membership drive, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said the 14party grand alliance government has been successful in all sectors but could not control the prices of lentil and sugar, as their production could not be increased.

He also said it is just a matter of time before the trial of war criminals begins.

"We are also looking to hold the trial of jail killing and the trial of those who had repressed AL leaders and activists during the period from 2001 to 2007," Muhith said.

LGRD Minister Ashraful Islam asked the party men to visit house to house for enrolling women and young generation as party mem-

Grassroots leaders and activists should play a role in the decision-making in the party, he

He also said the full-fledged committees of Sylhet district and city units of AL would be announced in a week.

The councils of the units were held in 2005 but the names of only president and general secretary were announced.

## Nat'l Film Policy on cards:PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday stressed the need for a specific plan for the film industry to face and compete with the present open sky culture.

"Local films are now facing a tough challenge in the era of open sky culture. There is no alternative to patronising decent films as well merit, creativity and technological advancement... we must move ahead with a specific plan," she

Hasina was addressing the National Film Award 2008 ceremony at Bangabandhu International Conference Center (BICC) in the city.

Information Minister Abul Kalam Azad presided over the function, organised by the Information Ministry. Information Secretary Dr Kamal Abdul Naser Chowdhury also spoke on the occasion.

She said the government has taken an initiative to totally recast the Film Development Corporation. Projects have been taken up to construct a modern Film Archive Building at a cost of Tk 75 crore and the government will soon formulate a Film Archive Policy.

She said from this year, grants will be given to six films instead of earlier two and this will include two films for children. The amount of grant will be increased to Tk 1.9 million from Tk 1.5 million. "From next year, five short-films will be awarded." Hasina said from now on directors and

producers will get Tk 50,000 instead of Tk 10,000 while other award recipients will get Tk 30,000 instead of Tk 5,000. "I know the amount is still very small. But I can ensure you this will be increased in the near future. You'll give me good films and I'll increase the award money."

She said that digital technology is going to be introduced in the FDC for the production of film and in preserving

The Prime Minister said that initiative has been taken to set up a film city in Kabirpur, on the outskirts of capital

Dhaka on 101 acres of land with all modern facilities for shooting of films. "Our government is working to formulate a National Film Policy."

### ARSON ATTACK AT KAMRANGIRCHAR

## AL men force complainant to drop 6 names from case

Local Awami League leaders forced the complainant to drop names of six accused from the First Information Report (FIR) on Friday's arson attack at Kamrangirchar in the city, although they played a key role in setting fire to at least 25 business establishments. The six accused are either son or brother or

close relatives of local AL leaders and activists, local people alleged.

Complainant of the case businessman Mahbubur Rahman said around 100 local AL leaders and activists stormed Kamrangirchar Police Station when he went there to file the case at around 3:30pm on Friday.

"In the police station, the local AL men almost snatched the draft FIR from the complainant and then deleted the names of six prime attackers out of the 18 accused," affected trader Mohammad Ali who witnessed the incident told this correspondent yesterday. Among the six, Saidul Matbar's name was on

top of the list of accused in the draft FIR, but his name was dropped. Saidul is the brother of a Sultanganj union AL leader. The five others are Shaon, Mizan, Ali, Alam, Alamgir, Sumon and Shahidullah.

The two businessmen also alleged that the AL leaders also included some other names in

But the police have been mysteriously silent at that time, said the two businessmen who went to the police station to file the case.

Complainant Mahbubur Rahman also said that he had to wait at the police station for seven hours to sign the final case statement.

When contacted, Officer-in-Charge of Kamrangirchar Police Station Shafiqul Islam Sikdar said both the complainant and the accused had a discussion among them and then submitted a written case statement.

#### Int'l symposium | on environment begins

### WAR CRIMES TRIAL Call to strengthen

Expressing doubts about the success of the war crimes investigation agency, Forum it would be a huge task for the for Secular Bangladesh (FSB) vesterday called on the government to strengthen it by inducting more competent and honest persons.

It urged the government to appoint at least 25 lawyers and investigative officials to both the prosecution team and the investigation agency for their better performance.

FSB leaders made the call at a discussion at the Bangladesh Institute of Law and International Affairs (BILIA) auditorium in the city. The event was organised to mark the 39th anniversary of the proclamation of independence.

"We are not satisfied with what the investigation agency has done so far to collect evidence, documents and other materials relating to war crimes," said Shahriar Kabir, acting president of FSB.

Bangladesh Chhatra League of

Chittagong Veterinary and Animal Sciences University yesterday called off its movement on the campus following an assurance from Prime Minister's Education Advisor Prof Alauddin Ahmed. Prof Alauddin and

Chittagong City Mayor ABM Mohiuddin arrived the campus in the evening. They assured the agitating students of immediate government step regarding their 21-point demand including the resignation of the vice chancellor.

Chhatra League Convener of the university unit Komol Kanti Majumder then called off the agitation and unlocked Vice Chancellor Nitish Chandra Devnath's office and residence.

"We will consider the investigation of University Grants Commission and the remarks from the mayor and ministries concerned while making decision on VC Nitish," said

Prof Alauddin. He also urged the academics to work hard to make up for the time lost due to the unrest on the campus for the last four months.

The university was closed sine die on December 14 following an indefinite strike by General Students' Forum and Chhatra League unit. Their 21-point demand included resignation of the VC on charge of corruption and nepotism.

The university reopened on April 4.

After reopening BCL activists put the VC's office under lock and key confining him to his evening office-cum residence. Later, they locked his residence as he left for capital to join a conference.
