Involuntary resettlement of people creates more poverty

Say speakers

Speakers at a press briefing yesterday identified involuntary resettlement of communities as a major challenge of development projects in Bangladesh, which eventually creates more poverty.

They pointed out that a suitable policy, which would ensure efficient land acquisition, proper compensation and resettlement of the communities facing displacement, is necessary to reduce the negative impacts of develop-

ment projects. The briefing on 'Infrastructural development and people: Challenges of resettlement' was organised by Brac Development Institute (BDI) at Brac Centre Inn in the city.

BDI Director Prof Syed Mesbahuddin Hashmi said often acquisition of too much land takes place for development projects. For a country with land scarcity and dense population, it poses difficulties for communities.

The speakers said some 20,000 households would be displaced for the 6.15km Padma Multipurpose Bridge while about 55,000 people would lose their livelihoods.

Under the existing law, only those who can provide papers on land get compensation, they added.

Prof Hashmi said thousands of people are uprooted from their homes, many lose their livelihoods and communities become scattered for development projects, causing a huge loss of agricultural lands and crops and creating socioeconomic problems.

A broader perspective considering all of these issues is necessary while assessing the amount of losses and compensa-

Rahman, also a former adviser to a caretaker government, said development of all sectors in Bangladesh, which is a country with large infrastructural gap, is needed. However, sometimes the projects, which are supposed to help reduce poverty, in fact, push more people down the poverty line.

Mentioning Kaptai Dam Project as one of the regretful example of development, he stressed the need for a suitable policy, which would ensure efficient land acquisition to reduce the cost of compensation and its proper monitoring.

To ensure just compensation and resettlement, it is also necessary to reduce lengthy bureaucratic process, he added.

Suhrab made envoy to Pakistan

The government has appointed retired diplomat Suhrab Hossain as the new high commissioner to Pakistan, according to a foreign ministry announcement.

He succeeds Yasmin Murshed, who returned to Bangladesh in November last year on completion of her tenure as the high commissioner.

Suhrab Hossain, a freedom fighter, who joined the Bangladesh Foreign Service in 1973, was appointed on contractual basis.

During his long diplomatic career, he served as Bangladesh ambassador to Uzbekistan and Thailand, and as high commissioner to Canada; and in various capacities in Bangladesh missions in Bangkok, Birmingham, Dakar, Ottawa and Paris.

Farroque gets bail

A Dhaka court yesterday granted bail to Opposition Chief Whip Zainul Abdin Farroque in a defamation case filed against him for making derogatory remarks about the prime minister's son Sajeeb Wazed Joy.

Metropolitan Magistrate AKM Emdadul Haque passed the order upon a bond of Tk 10,000 with two guarantors after Farroque along with his lawyers appeared before the court and sought bail.

On March 24, the High Court directed the BNP leader to appear before the lower court within eight weeks, after refusing his bail petition in the case filed by Advocate Moshiur Malek, president of Bangabandhu Foundation.

Students of city colleges block road

Papua New Guinea keen to recruit Bangladeshi workers

The visiting Labour and Industry Minister of Papua New Guinea, Mark Maipakai, has shown interest to recruit a large number of Bangladeshi workers.

Maipakai, who led a sevenmember delegation, met with acting secretary of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Dr Jaffar Ahmed yesterday and made an informal proposal to recruit Bangladeshi workers for Papua New Guinea's infrastructure and gas sectors.

Emerging from the meeting, Dr Jaffar told that Maipakai said they would propose formally soon after forming a joint company comprising of the government of Papua New

Guinea (PNG) and the Bangladeshi community in Papua New Guinea to recruit Bangladesh labourers.

Maipakai said huge manpower is needed for the infrastructure and gas sectors of Papua New Guinea.

Dr Jaffar said Bangladesh

would set up six more labour wings in its missions in Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Sudan, Italy and Japan.

This will raise the number of Bangladesh's labour wings to 19 abroad.

At present, only about 500 Bangladeshis work in Papua New Guinea, whereas over 10 lakh Chinese, three lakh Sri Lankans and two lakh Indians work there. The population of Papua New Guinea is only six million.

BCS, BJS EXAM CANDIDATES WITH DISABILITIES HC order on writs April 25

The High Court (HC) will pass orders on April 25 on two writ petitions that sought directions from the court upon the government to allow the candidates with disabilities to sit for Bangladesh Civil Service (BCS) and Bangladesh Judicial Service (BJS) examinations.

An HC bench of Justice Md Mamtaz Uddun Ahmed and Justice Naima Haider fixed the date after concluding the hearing on the petitions yesterday.

Four human rights organisations -- Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST), Action on Disability and Development (ADD) and National Council of Disabled Women (NCDW) -- and Swapan Chowkidar, a lawyer, and Ridwanul Hoque, a teacher of law faculty of Dhaka University,

jointly filed the petitions on April 19.

social welfare, and health ministries, Bangladesh Public Service Commission (BPSC) and its chairman and secretary and the controller of examinations (Cadre), the judicial service commission and its chairman and secretary, the director general of the directorate of health, and the national disability welfare coordination committee and its chairman and secretary have been made respondents to the petitions.

The petitioners prayed to the court to issue a rule upon the respondents to explain why the provisions of the Bangladesh Civil Service (Age, Qualification and Examinations for Direct Recruitment) Rules 1982 preventing the candidates with disabilities from appearing in the BCS and BJS examinations should not be declared unconstitutional.

Advocates Shahriar Shakir, Qazi Zahid Iqbal, Taufiqul Islam and Nusrat Jahan appeared for the petitioners, while Attorney General The secretaries to the establishment, law, Mahbubey Alam represented the government.

Fraud case filed against Proshika Chair Wadud

A fraud case was filed against Proshika Chairman MA Wadud, its Executive Chief Officer Mahbub-ul-Karim, and 12 others with a Dhaka court yesterday.

Momtaz Begum, a member of Proshika Housing Project, filed the case with the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court accusing them of misappropri-ating Tk 3.17 lakh between December 12, 2005 and January 18,2010.

The other accused are Proshika Vice-Chairman Abdul Matin, Treasurer Masrul Ul Islam, directors Sirajul Islam, Abdur Rob, Sirajul Huq, Altaf Hossain Talukder, and Mahbub Alam, deputy directors Kamrul Hassan Kamal and Azizul Haque Kabir, central coordinator Khorshed Alam, divisional coordinator Taslima Begum and area coordinatorHumayun Kabir.

After the hearing, Metropolitan Magistrate AKM Emdadul Haque recorded statement of the complainant and did not pass any order on the issue.

In her complaint, Momtaz mentioned that she along with seven others deposited a total of Tk 3.17 lakh to the Proshika Housing Project on different dates sometime between December 12, 2005 and January 18,2010.

But she had earlier come to know that Proshika Chairman Oazi Farugue was sacked from his post on May 24 last year and the accused in collusion with others had misappropriated crores of taka from different projects like the complainant's project.

Later on July 26 last year, the complainant went to Proshika Pallabi Unnayan Kendra to know about her project where divisional coordinator Humayun Kabir asked her to communicate with its head office. He also asked her that they had earlier transferred the savings of housing project to the head office.

The complainant also said that she had gone to the Proshika head office where the accused told her not to proceed with it again.
