## No respite from outage soon

#### Frequent power cuts make life, business all too difficult

Business and public life are weighed heavily down by the electricity crisis as the country has been experiencing power cuts for up to ten hours a day for the last two months.

Scores of industries, both big and small, are incurring huge losses as their production is greatly hampered due to power shortage.

Abdus Salam Murshedy, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association, said the garment sector is reeling from both power and gas crises.

The garment factory owners face difficulties in meeting the deadline for shipments. The cost of business is going up sharply as they have to transport goods by planes instead of ships to meet the deadline, he said.

The shipment cost of goods is 13 to 20 cents a kg on an average by sea while it is up to \$4.50 by air, he said.

In December 2009, 5,858 tonnes of garment were supplied by air. It was 8,198 tonnes in January, and 8,622 tonnes in February this year, he said.

The BGMEA president said they did not confront such a situation even during the global financial meltdown.

"We have already started losing buyers," he said. Around 20,000 small factories producing plastic goods and other items in Islambagh, Kamalbagh, Debidasghat, Posta, Chadnighat incur huge losses every day due to frequent power cuts.

Nazrul Islam, owner of a factory of plastic goods in Islambagh, said they face power outage 12 times a day for the last 10 days. It used to occur 15 times before that.

"The machine requires a two-hour heating to be operational. But electricity goes out every one hour," he said.

The factory's production dropped to a mere 20 percent because of power crisis. If the situation continues, the factory has to be shut down soon, Nazrul said.

The situation is almost the same in other parts of the country.

"We experience power cuts eight to nine times a day," said Azad, a resident on Sagorika SEE PAGE 15 COL 6

## Tk 2.35cr gold looted from city jewellery

Over 785 tolas of gold worth over Tk 2.35 crore was burgled at a jewellery shop of Muktijuddha Super Market in the city's Mirpur-1 on Saturday night.

All the jewellery shop owners of the area kept their shops closed yesterday protesting the burglary. The shop owners association leaders threatened an agitation programme from Wednesday if the burglars are not arrested and the gold recovered within the time.

Police said the burglars entered Dewan Jewellary on the ground floor of the market, apparently breaking open the locks of adjacent Jyoti Cosmetics and Imitation Jewellers, as they found a hole cut through the wall between the two shops. Mohammad Shah Alam Siddique Babu, manager of Dewan

Jewellery, said, "When police opened the shop around 10:30 am, we found all our displays and three of six vaults empty. Initially we found the gold ornaments and Tk 3.5 lakh from cash boxes missing from the shop."

Jahid, an employee, said he along with his three colleagues opened the shutters of their shop around 9:30 am and found some cases on the floor.

He added that on information, shop owner Tazul Islam Dewan along with police rushed in around 10:30 am. The shop was locked at 8:00 pm on Saturday.
