Seniors complain of waiting days for old age allowance

Maqbul Hossain is 64 but looks 10 years older. Suffering from prostate cancer, he was standing in the crowd outside the Lalbagh branch of Sonali Bank on a recent noon, competing with scores of other senior citizens trying to push their way inside.

"They treat us like beggars," said Maqbul sputtering paan juice and leaning on his cane. "No one tells us when our names will be called. They do not give us any information either. "We stand at the bank entrance for the whole day starting

early morning and go back empty-handed." Maqbul is just one in the army of 22. 5 lakh elderly people

No to Lafarge mining in Meghalaya to stay

Indian HC opts to wait for environment reports

The Indian Supreme Court yesterday refused to lift a stay on mining by cement giant Lafarge in the forests of Meghalaya.

A special forest bench headed by Chief Justice KG Balakrishnan said: "Till the time, appropriate reports (on damage to environment) are submitted by the Ministry of Environment and Forest, we are not inclined to permit the mining."

The apex court on February 5 stopped

Lafarge from conducting limestone mining in Meghalaya for its cement plant in Bangladesh, saying mining in the environment sensitive zone cannot be allowed.

The bench stayed mining activities on the basis of a report from the Ministry of Environment and Forest, which said the company was extracting minerals in the forest

[Monday] and asked me to be prepared to return home tonight," said Ashraful Alam, chief officer of MT Paloma.

Alam said the other crewmen got panicked as only he was offered an air ticket for home.

THE HEART AND **HOW IT WORKS**

The normal human heart is a strong, muscular pump a little larger than a fist. Each day, an average heart beats (expands and contracts) 100,000 times and pumps about 2,000 gallons of blood. In a 70-year lifetime, an average human heart beats more than 2.5 billion times. The heart pumps blood continuously through the circulatory system. The circulatory system is the network of elastic tubes that carries blood throghout the body. It includes the heart, lungs, arteries, arterioles (small arteries) and capillaries (very tiny blood vessels). These blood vessels carry oxygen-rich and nutrient-rich blood to all

parts of the body. The circulatory system also includes venules (small veins) and veins. These are the blood vessels that carry oxygen-depleted and nutrient-depleted blood back to the heart and lungs. If all these vessels were laid end to end, they'd extend for about 60,000 miles. That's enough to encircle the earth more

than twice. The circulating blood brings oxygen and nutrients to all the body's organs and tissues, including the heart itself. It also picks up waste products from the body's cells. These waste products are removed as they're filtered through the kidneys, liver and lungs.

RISK FACTORS FOR **HEART DISEASE**

Risk factors are traits and lifestyle habits that increase the risk of disease. Extensive clinical and statistical studies have identified several risk factors for coronary heart disease and heart attack. Most of them can be modified, treated or controlled. The more risk factors a person has, the higher the chances that he or she will develop heart disease. The best way to prevent a heart attack is to reduce heart disease risk factors.
