22 RMG units Minimum hit by unrest

30 hurt as workers clash with cops while blocking roads for hike in salary, perks

Fresh labour unrest affected production in 22 more readymade garment factories yesterday while the industry has been facing. difficulties surviving against power and gas crises, price hike of yarn, poor infrastructure, and low price offers from international buyers amid increased production cost.

Production halted in these factories in Mirpur and Rupgan areas as workers put barricades on highways on the second consecutive day of their agitation for increased minimum monthly wage from Tk 1,662 to Tk 5,000.

At least 30 workers were injured during chase and counterchase between the demonstrators and police in Mirpur.

The managements of 20 factories situated in Mirpur suspended production when 6,000 workers of Opex Garment: recommendations of the Limited, a sister concern of the Sinha Group, put up barricades · at Mirpur 13 and 14.

The workers also want a hike in their attendance bonus from Tk300 to Tk400.

"It is very hard for a man to maintain his family with just Tk: recently demanded that the 1,662.50, the amount a helper at our factory get each month. Our demand for hike in wages is a demand of the time," said Laily

The national minimum wage will be announced in three months and is expected to come into effect before the Eid, · Labour and Employment Minister Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain said yesterday.

"We hope that the workers will soon start getting the benefits of the national minimum wage," he told journalists after a meeting with the leaders of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association at the ministry.

Mosharraf Hossain, however, did not quantify the national minimum wage. It will be fixed on the basis of the committees comprised of workers and employers in · different sectors, he said.

BNP to march | MUTINY TRIAL AT PILKHANA

Male nurses were partners in crime

Several male nurses (medical assistants) of Bangladesh Rifles took up arms and helped others in killing and dumping the bodies during the bloody mutiny at the headquarters on February 25-26 last year.

A case was filed yesterday with the BDR Special Court-6 against 256 members of the BDR hospital unit in the force's HQ at Pilkhana. Medical assistant of this unit nayek subedar Md Nannu Mia

filed the case with the three-member court headed by BDR Director General M Mainul Islam. The other members of the court are Lt Col Md Nurul Alam and Maj Md Ali Mustain Khan.

Taking the case into cognisance, the court ordered the prosecution to produce the 256 accused before it at 10:00am today.

The male nurses, number of which could not be known, might not have killed or tortured officers of their own unit. But they indeed took up arms with the mutineers and helped them kill officers of other units.

Many of them played an active role to remove bodies from Darbar Hall. They took the bodies on trucks and pickup vans and also played a leading role to dump those in a mass grave besides the mortuary of the BDR hospital to destroy evidence.

Ninety of the accused were arrested last year in connection with a case for killing, looting and arson. They have been shown arrested in this mutiny case and the court also ordered to arrest the rest who are still serving at the hospital unit.

Lt Col Dr SMA Al-Muid of the hospital gave a brief but pathetic description to the court about atrocities during the mutiny in which 57 army officers including four doctors were killed.

The entire courtroom fell silent as he described how the mutineers brutally beat up male and female doctors with rifles, SEE PAGE 15 COL 4
