Over a hundred trees to be felled to build CAAB HQ; controversy over design

The Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (CAAB) is all set to begin construction of its new headquarters, felling over a hundred trees near Shahjalal International Airport in Kurmitola of the capital, amid a crying need for increased greenery in the city. Moreover, the building's architectural design selection pro-

cess is marred by controversy. The prime minister is scheduled to lay the foundation stone of the Tk 58 crore ten-storey complex on May 20, said CAAB officials.

The headquarters will be built on four acres of land. It is half

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## 10 more RMG factories face labour unrest

20 hurt as workers clash with cops

At least 20 people were injured yesterday in clashes between law enforcers and workers of 10 garment factories in the capital's Mirpur with the labour unrest continuing for the fourth day over pay hike.

Several hundred workers put barricades on the road at Mirpur Section-13 and 14 at around 10:00am bringing vehicular movement to a halt there for about two hours.

Police charged baton to disperse the agitating workers, who retaliated by pelting them with brickbats, said witnesses.

The angry workers got involved in chase and counter-chase with law enforcers for nearly two hours turning the entire area

## New policy on cards to define child

Anyone below 18 to be considered a child

Adopting United Nations standards, the government is set to re-define the age of a child by raising it from 14 to 18 -- a move that would eventually outlaw employing an additional 1.3 million kids involved in labour.

The anticipated change to the national children policy would follow the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and attempts to bring an end to the confusion over what constitutes a minor.

According to 2003 study of Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS), 3.2 million children aging between 5-17 years are involved with child labour for wage. Of them, 1.29 million children are involved in hazardous work, and the new policy would have direct impact upon them.

The policy would prohibit any physical punishment in educational institutions. It also aims at providing rights for ethnic, refugee, and disabled children.

In addition, the draft policy would require that every child born in Bangladesh be registered and given a right to claim the national identity.

"A human being below 18 will be given all the services that are meant for children," said advocate Salma Ali, executive director of Bangladesh National Woman Lawyers Association, which offers legal advice to women and children.

She added the policy change would be "a step towards human development".

# Over 400 teachers to get promotion

Six years after the postponement of promotion the government is going to elevate assistant teachers of secondary schools to the posts of assistant headmaster and assistant district education officer.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS

A proposal for promotion of 408 teachers across the country has been sent to the education ministry on Wednesday, a top official of Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education (DSHE) told The Daily Star.

Of them, 357 assistant teachers will get promotion as assistant headmaster and 51 as assistant district education officers, he said.

Since the post of assistant district education

officer is a cadre post, the ministry will send the proposal to Public Service Commission (PSC) for approval, said the official. After PSC's approval the ministry will start

awarding the promotion, he said. "We have sent the proposal to the education ministry. It will be sent to the PSC soon," said Prof Mohammad Jakir Hossain, director (sec-

ondary) of DSHE. The total number of government secondary schools in the country is 317 including 144 double-shift schools, according to the DSHE

There are 461 posts of assistant headmaster for the schools as every double-shift school has

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# Sunken launch under water for 5 months

Govt, owners fail to settle dispute over salvage operation

Passenger launch MV Coco-4, which sank in the River Tentulia five months ago, still could not be salvaged as the government and owners of the ship are yet to reach a settlement on the next move. The vessel is under water since govern-

ment's two salvage ships Hamza and Rustom abandoned the rescue mission in first week of December last year.

The capacity of Hamza and Rustom together is 120 tonne while the weight of Coco-4 is about

400 tonne. The government charged M/s Rahman Brothers Shippers Limited, the parent com-

pany of the sunken ship, Tk 10 lakh for the failed rescue operation when the company sought permission to salvage the launch on their own two months ago. Tarique Rahman, elder son of former pre-

mier Khaleda Zia, is the managing director of the shipper company while Arafat Rahman, another son of Khaleda, and Giasuddin Al Mamun are the directors. "The company was denied permission [to

lift up the ship] as it paid only Tk 2 lakh," a senior official of Bangladesh Inland water Transport Authority (BIWTA), told The Daily Star yesterday.
