No legal bar to free rivers

SC clears way for govt to knock down all illegal structures; rejects appeal of 7 companies against HC verdict

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A Supreme Court (SC) order yesterday cleared the way for removing all structures, excluding the government ones set up to serve the public interests, from the rivers around the capital. The rivers are Shitalakkhya, Balu, Turag and Buriganga.

Even the jetties and other structures established by some private commercial companies within the rivers' boundaries upon the government permission have to be removed as per the

The Appellate Division yesterday passed the order after dismissing seven appeals filed by seven commercial companies challenging a High Court (HC) order that directed the government to remove the structures. The companies are City Group of Industries, Heidelberg

Cement Bangladesh Ltd, Kamal Vegetable, Akij Cement, ACI Cement, Cimex Cement and Molla Salt Industries.

Some legal experts opine the HC verdict of June last year regarding the four rivers has been upheld.

Advocate Manzill Murshid, a lawyer concerned, told The Daily Star there is no bar to remove the structures excluding those set up by the government in the rivers to serve public

The four dying rivers will be restored and the city dwellers will be protected from environmental pollution following the apex court order, he said.

Grabbing, polluting go unabated

The rivers flowing through and around the capital look dismal though 10 months have gone since the High Court directed the government to take measures to save them.

Buriganga, Turag, Balu and Shitalakhya--all still give off a terrible stench. Encroachers continue filling them up and industrialists keep polluting their water, found the correspondent in recent visits

In fact, little has changed since the government announced shortly after taking office in January last year that it would do everything necessary to put an end to river pollution and

encroachment. Except for taking up some ambitious projects involving hundreds of crores of taka, the administration has so far failed to go tough on influential polluters and grabbers.

BNP MARCH TO EC

Protest loses steam halfway amid no cop obstruction

A protest march of the main opposition BNP towards the Election Commission Secretariat ended halfway yesterday in the capital, not because it was obstructed by law enforcers, but because the party leaders leading the march ran out of steam.

Apparently the leaders became too exhausted to march all

the way from Muktangan to the EC Secretariat in Sher-e-Bangla The march made a promising start with around 10,000 activists and supporters of the party behind their top leaders around

4:00 pm from Muktangan. The procession came across police forces at different intersections, but faced no resistance from them, which apparently surprised the BNP leaders. By the time the procession covered about two kilometres and reached Bangla Motor, some of the top leaders had already

abandoned it, and the remaining declared the march over, leaving the rest of the marchers, and journalists bewildered. "We've ended the march peacefully because the police obstructed us, and we didn't want any confrontation," BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir claimed to The Daily Star. But The Daily Star correspondent saw

Govt to review power import MoU with India

The government yesterday formed a high-powered committee to review thoroughly the memorandum of understanding (MoU) on power import from India before ratifying a deal. According to a decision,

made at a regular cabinet meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair, Finance Minister AMA Muhith, Planning Minister AK Khandaker and PM's Finance Affairs Adviser Moshiur Rahman will scrutinise the deal for ratification.

PM's Press Secretary Abul Kalam Azad said this to reporters after the meeting.

The cabinet on December 31 last year approved in principle a MoU with Delhi, seeking open-ended import and export of electricity with an option to purchase power from both public and private sectors of India.

The MoU was signed between Bangladesh and India during Hasina's visit to Delhi.

Jubo League factions fight for contract

30 hurt in Meherpur bomb attack

At least 30 people were hurt in a bomb attack by a Jubo League faction during a tender dropping in Meherpur yesterday.

Of the injured, Asirul, Tareq, Hira, Ranga, Raza, Bhola, Rezaul, Atiar, Nafiz Uddin, Abbas and Zia were admitted to Meherpur General Hospital.

Police and Rab sources said a gang led by district Jubo League general secretary Bipul attacked the rival group led by Golam Rasul, president of Meherpur sadar upazila Awami League,

when the latter reached LGED office to drop tender documents. The attackers exploded six bombs leaving 30 persons splinter-hit. They also threw two explosives at a Rab vehicle partly

damaging its front side, Rab sources said. Rab and police jointly chased both groups, charged baton on them and brought the situation under control.

Later at about 2:00pm, men loyal to Bipul attacked the house of district AL general secretary Kaji Mia Jan. They ransacked

rooms and torched a motorcycle. The same group also burnt another motorcycle owned by Amanuallah, a supporter of Golam Rasul, on CB Road. Rab raided the houses of some leaders of both factions

around 3:00pm but could not arrest anyone. Rab, however, seized Bipul's motorcycle. Police later arrested two persons including a bomb-hit AL

activist. The two are Turaf, 30 and Asirul, 30.


