# Children on motorbikes



In Bangladesh, you would often see parents riding on motorbikes with their children, despite knowing the fact how fatal this can be if any accident occurs.

In our country people are hopping on motorcycles more, as a cheaper way of commuting and for fun. But there is no doubt that the vulnerability of motorcyclists, on just two wheels and without the benefit of a four wheeled vehicle's crash protection, is one of the major reasons they are disproportionately involved in casualty figures. Motorcycle accidents can cause more danger than any other accidents.

Obviously, motorcyclists are very vulnerable because of the lack of protection and the fact that they only have two wheels to keep the bike on the road. If a bike crosses a manhole or some oily patch on the road, it becomes difficult to keep control of the bike. Also the injuries you are likely to sustain will be a lot worse than a car accident.

Here's a typical disaster in the making, one that I've seen far too frequently. A motorcyclist rides down the street with a kid sitting in front of him, a helmet four sizes too large bouncing

around on the child's head, its little hands trying to hold onto the gas tank or the rider's legs. The kid interferes with the rider's control of the bike, the first strike against them.

What's going to happen if the rider must stop quickly? Will he grab the child with one arm, and thereby probably lose control of the bike if he really has to panic stop, or will he keep control of the bike and watch the kid fly off the front of the bike? Neither option bodes well for the child.

In Bangladesh, motorcycle accidents are unfortunately very common. As a motorcycle rider you are 40 times more likely to be killed than car drivers or passengers. You are more likely to be killed on a motorbike than any other means of transport.

There are so many deaths every year and only the bereaved families know the pain of losing their loved ones. Can't we stop putting young children's lives at stake? Can't we legally ban children from riding on motorbikes? Badal Hasib

continuous erosion and natural disasters. Initially, Kutubdia was a land of 250 square kilometres. Due to continuous erosion it lost 40% of its landmass to the sea by 1990. Now it is a land of 58 square kilometres only. More than 65%(area)of Kutubdia has been submerged by the sea in the last 100 years. The Water Development Board built 40 kilometres of embankment to protect Kutubdia from erosion, of which 24 kilometres was damaged in the cyclone of 1991. Under these conditions, the people of this island are at high risk of natural calamities and the risk is increasing day by day.
