Woods to defend title

Tiger Woods will defend his title next week at the Memorial Tournament, marking his return to the PGA Tour after three weeks spent rehabbing a neckinjury.

Woods withdrew from The Players Championship on May 9 with an inflamed facet joint in his neck. He confirmed on his website Wednesday that he'll play next week at Muirfield Village, where he has won four times and is the defending champion.

"The doctors advised me to take a week off and rest, which I did," Woods said. "They prescribed physical therapy, antiinflammatory medication and soft-tissue massages, which I'm continuing with. Although I'm not 100 percent, I feel much better and look forward to competing next week."

The tournament hosted by Jack Nicklaus will also serve as preparation for the US Open two weeks later at Pebble Beach. Woods won the Memorial from 1999-2001 and again last year.

After a winter of revelations of marital infidelity, Woods returned in April to play in the Masters, where he tied for fourth. He missed the cut at Quail Hollow after rounds of 74 and 79, and was 4 under at The Players Championship before withdrawing with the injury.

A day later, he appeared at a news conference in suburban Philadelphia for the AT&T National, which he also won last year. He said at the time, "A lot is up in the air still, which I don't like. ... I want to come back and defend at the Memorial and play the US Open and obviously play here. But a lot of that is still up in the air right now."

Subsequent medical tests diagnosed the extent of the neck injury, which improved with treatment and rest. Woods resumed his normal practice sessions last week.

Woods has since confirmed he will play in the British Open at St. Andrews from July 15-18. He has yet to commit to any tournament beyond the Memorial, the next two major championships and the AT&T National, from July 1-4 at Aronimink Golf Club.

A year ago, Woods started the final round of the Memorial four shots back of Jim Furyk but shot a 65 to win by one stroke, with birdies on the final two holes to forge ahead.

cheque. The first World Cup hosted by Africa kicks off on June 11 at the 90,000-seat Soccer City near the black township of Soweto with Parreira-coached South Africa facing Mexico and finishes with the July 11 final at the same venue.

Afridi persuading Yousuf

Shahid Afridi, Pakistan's captain for the Asia Cup and the tour of England, has stepped up efforts to convince Mohammad Yousuf to come out of retirement and bolster the side's potentially tough Test assignment in England, where they face off against the hosts and Australia.

"I've talked to Yousuf and I've also talked to a few elders, who can influence him to come out of retirement for the sake of Pakistan," Afridi told the News. "I am sure that he would listen to them and change his mind about retiring from international cricket. We will certainly need his services in England."

Yousuf announced his retirement from the game following the ban issued by the Pakistan Cricket Board after Pakistan's unsuccessful tour of Australia. Of the seven punished players, he was the only one to not file a formal appeal against the punishments imposed. On Tuesday, Pakistan announced the 35-member list of

probables for the two upcoming tours. Five of the punished players, including Younis Khan and Shoaib Malik who are currently serving bans that are due to be reviewed, were included in the long list, but Yousuf was not considered.

The England tour begins in end-June, and Afridi is confident that there is enough time for Yousuf to prepare for the tour even if he is included in the eleventh hour. "Yousuf is a great batsman and I'm sure that even if he just plays in a couple of warm-up matches before the Test series, he will be ready for the tough assignment. He won't need much time to get ready for the tour."

Yousuf confirmed that Afridi has been in discussions with him over a possible comeback. "Yes Afridi called me up and we spoke at length about the cricket scenario. I told him I took the decision to retire after seeking advice from my elders and I can only take back the retirement decision if my elders give me permission to do this," Yousuf said.

Since embracing Islam, Yousuf has sought out religious elders during his trips to Raiwind and on preaching missions. He is known to follow their advice before making important decisions.

SA aim to seal series

South Africa will look to exploit a weakened West Indies side, and clinch an unbeatable lead in their one-day international series at Windsor Parkhere on Friday.

South Africans lead the series 2-0, following a 66-run victory in the first ODI last Saturday at the Vivian Richards Cricket Ground in Antigua, where they also prevailed by 17 runs in the second ODI on Monday.

The path for a series-clinching victory for the Proteas have been helped by injuries, which will rule out three pivotal West Indies players.

Graeme Smith, the South Africa captain, admitted his side has not quite reached their peak, but he was satisfied that they would enter the next two matches on the verge of another series victory.

"We have done pretty well so far in the series," he said.

"We have kept our nerve, and we have done what we need to do to win the games. The guys are working hard."

"We had a few positives in the previous match, particularly the way Darren Sammy and Dwayne Bravo batted, and I am hoping that we can carry them into the match," said Gayle.

"I think the bowlers have been doing very well, although South Africa have made two big totals because the pitches have been good, and they are bowling to experienced batsmen that know how to manipulate the ball." He added: "It's now up to us, the batsmen, to

play our part. I think we have been letdown with our batting in the middle period of the innings, when rotation of the strike is very important. "Once we put that kind of pressure on our-

selves at that stage, it's always going to be difficult for the batsmen coming lower down, so we need to work on this as quickly as possible." On their previous trip to the Caribbean,

South Africa completed a 5-0 sweep in the ODI

series, and if the scattered showers forecast stay away, and they can complete a victory in the third ODI, they could repeat this achievement. Windsor Park hosted its first two ODIs last year, when Bangladesh took advantage of a West Indies side ravaged by industrial action by the leading players because of unsatisfactory terms and conditions of engagement. In both matches, the pitch appeared to be batsman friendly, which sets the stage for more high-scoring.

The revelations come just weeks after Pakistan spinner Danish Kaneria and Essex teammate Mervyn Westfield were arrested and bailed as a result of an investigation into alleged spot fixing -- the practice of paying a player to perform a certain task such as bowling a number of wides.

Middlesex batsman Strauss is adamant he has never come across match-fixing during his time on the county circuit, but he wants players to go to the authorities if they have evidence of foul play.

"The authorities are doing everything they can, but there is a huge responsibility on the players to make sure it doesn't take hold and spread," Strauss said.

"It's the only way of ironing it out. For players to be tempted by taking money is ludicrous in my mind.

"If it is happening, it needs to be stamped out straight away. There's no place for it in any form of cricket, and certainly in domestic cricket, we've got a duty as players to make sure that if we hear of it, or are approached by someone, we come forward and report it

ECB is pleased that the system of anonymous player reporting is working and ECB's Board has reinforced the need to all players and officials to be vigilant concerning illegal approaches by bookmakers and others.

"ECB believes unlawful activities such as those attempted here and appropriately

reported by players must be eliminated. "The Board takes this opportunity to remind cricketers and others falling under its jurisdiction that any unlawful activity of this kind entered into by anyone will result in disciplinary action, irrespective of any sanctions imposed by the law of the land, and will inevitably be dealt with severely, constituting as it would, a grave slur on the integrity of the
