



### Mandela to grace World Cup

South Africa's ruling party says Nelson Mandela will attend the opening and closing matches of the World Cup.

African National Congress spokesman Jackson Mthembu said Thursday that Mandela's office said he will attend both events. A spokesman at Mandela's foundation would not confirm the report, saying the foundation does not disclose Mandela's schedule ahead of time for security reasons.

The 91-year-old former president retired from public life in 2004. But he made a surprise appearance last year at a rally before the national election.

Mandela has strong links to sports in South Africa after he famously appeared at the 1995 rugby World Cup final wearing the green and gold jersey of the Springboks, the country's national rugby team.

#### Shuktara relegated



## Jamie eyes win, to change team

Old Trafford Test from today

Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons revealed Thursday he was set to change his bowling attack as the Tigers looked to level their Test series with England here at Old Trafford.

Siddons said paceman Shafiul Islam, left out of the series opening eight-wicket loss at Lord's, would definitely start and that left-arm spinner Abdur Razzak was likely to come in as well.

That would suggest seamers Robiul Islam, who made his debut at Lord's, and Rubel Hossain, who also struggled in the first Test, were set to be dropped for what will be the second and final match of the series, starting here on Friday.

The Old Trafford pitch has a reputation for taking turn and Siddons told reporters here on Thursday: "Shafiul Islam will come in for one of our fast bowlers, we haven't really worked out which one and I'll have a look at the wicket and see whether it's worthwhile playing another spinner."

Only Shahadat Hossain, with five first innings wickets, distinguished himself amongst the quicks, and Siddons added: "Our bowling was horrendous. We lost the game on the first day and, SEE PAGE 18 COL 2

### England land in South Africa

England arrived in South Africa Thursday morning hoping a favourable first-round draw can be the catalyst for a serious World Cup

Cool, clear conditions greeted some of the most watched performers in the global televised football arena when they landed at Johannesburg international airport with manager Fabio

Capello.

"I hope the World Cup will be a big success for South Africa and also for my team. Thank you. It is good to be here," the Italian told reporters on the airport tarmac.

Live broadcasts of virtually all English Premiership matches mean the stars of Chelsea, Manchester United, Arsenal and Liverpool are more recognisable to many South Africans than domestic equivalents. A recent survey here revealed England would be the second

most popular team after Brazil among local supporters should the national side fail to go all the way in the June 11-July 11 tournament.

Tight security surrounded the grey-suited England stars as they followed Australia, Brazil, Argentina, Denmark, United States, North Korea and Nigeria in reaching the first African country to host the World Cup.

Once immigration formalities had been completed at a temporary arrival facility, England headed by luxury coach for SEE PAGE 18 COL 6





### The return of Ronaldo

In a tournament characterised by an overwhelming capacity to surprise, with virtually every underdog having their day, it seemed somehow inappropriate that the final of the 2002 World Cup was contested by two teams who between them had graced 12 of the competition's 16 finals.

Brazil, with four titles to their name going into the tournament, prevailed against a decidedly average German side, with three previous wins, by two goals to nil in a match that ended in a fashion the neutrals wanted and the tournament needed.

Ronaldo got both goals -- his seventh and eighth of the tournament -- and earned the striker the competition's Golden Boot at the same time as slaying the ghosts of France 98. There was, at least, one anomaly saved for the competition's denouement player-of-the-tournament Oliver Kahn was culpable for Brazil's first, fumbling a speculative shot from Rivaldo to the feet of his gleeful strike partner. This after the indomitable German had conceded just one goal in his country's six previous matches.

Brazil's return to all-conquering form, welcome though their easy-on-the-eye brand of football always is, was largely overshadowed by the achievements of the hosts, both on the field of play and in the slick organisation and good spirit garnered off it. For the first time in World Cup history, the finals went to Asia and, also a first, to not one but two countries. Korea and Japan set aside historical differences to jointly host one of the most successful tournaments ever, even if the standard of football on offer, at times, was not quite up to scratch, SEE PAGE 18 COL

# Dunga plays down pressure

Brazil coach Dunga said on Thursday that the pressure on perennial favourites Brazil to deliver a sixth World Cup was normal - but unfair. Addressing reporters at a

news conference at team headquarters in Randburg, north of Johannesburg, Dunga said that "the pressure is normal. We have to play to win - this is the Brazilian mentality. All that has gone before is

to be left in the past," said Dunga. Since taking over the job in 2006 he has won the 2007 Copa America and the 2009 Confederations Cup as well as guided the auriverde to top spot in the qualifiers for South Africa.

Dunga, a winner as a player in 1994, noted Tanzania on Monday in their final tune-up.



Stosur knows that she has as good a chance as anyone and taking into account her back-to-back wins over Henin and Williams, she will be the favourite in some books.

"I think I've got as good a chance as anyone," she said.

# India shocked again

Zimbabwe pulled off a spectacular double against India in a tri-nations series match at Harare Sports Club here on Thursday, winning with three wickets and a huge 11.4 overs to

India were held down to 194-9, having scored at below four runs per over. Zimbabwe made 197-3 with ease in reply,

due mainly to an opening partnership of 128 between Brendan Taylor and Hamilton Masakadza.

But Zimbabwe's veteran medium-pace

bowler Andy Blignaut also came up with a major contribution, taking just one wicket but giving away only 22 runs in his 10 overs.

Zimbabwe's performance in reaching the winning target in less than 40 overs secured a bonus point that will be crucial in their efforts to reach the final.

Taylor made 74 in his 100th ODI to add to his 81 against India in the opening clash of the series and Mazakadza put together a solid 66, having scored 62 against Sri Lanks and 44 in the previous India match.

It was Taylor's 19th 50 in ODIs and Masakadza's 16th. Taylor was named man of the match, giving him a personal double after he picked up the same award for his 81 against

### Stosur-Schiavone finale

Samantha Stosur stormed into the French Open final on Thursday, beating Jelena Jankovic 6-1, 6-2, and she will become the first Australian

woman in 30 years to capture a Grand Slam title if she wins again on Saturday.

Her opponent in that final will be Italy's Francesca Schiavone, who won a first set tie break 7-3 against Russian fifth seed Elena Dementieva, who then revealed she was suffering from a calf tear, quit in tears after 70 min-

The pair have played five times with Stosur winning the last four in straight sets.
