Argentina fully fit

Injury-free Argentina are in better shape than Nigeria ahead of the teams' World Cup Group B opener on Saturday, central defender Martin Demichelis said.

"We are having the good fortune that other teams are not," Demichelis told a news conference at Argentina's base in the University of Pretoria sports complex.

"We've had no injuries and that gives the coaching staff the confidence to demand the maximum from us," he added after Diego Maradona's squad practiced in front of a crowd of about 3,000 Argentine and local fans on Sunday.

"I'm confident that in the remaining days we'll be able to get there in very good shape," he said of the match at Ellis Park in Johannesburg.

The build-up to the tournament that kicks off on Friday has been hit by a spate of injuries to leading players including Nigeria midfielder John Obi Mikel.

"Some teams have played too many friendlies. Luckily Diego opted to come here and train in tranquillity," Demichelis said.

In a reference to the form of the Argentina players, he said: "Diego has a big headache picking his side while Nigeria have doubts.

"I think that they may have some issues to resolve in some positions and won't get there (to the match) as good as us." The crowd allowed in to watch, including groups from local

schools, learnt favourite chants from Argentina fans while waiting for the practice to start. They then gave the squad and particularly Lionel Messi and

Maradona a rapturous welcome when they came out onto the pitch. Demichelis said such attention on Maradona from fans and

The planet's biggest sporting extravaganza, the FIFA World Cup 2010 is around the corner. The month-long tourney starts with the game between hosts South Africa and Mexico at the Soccer City Stadium of Johannesburg on June 11 while the final will be held on July 11 at the same venue.

The 64 matches of the tournament will be held at three different times -- 5:30pm, 8:00pm and 12:30am Bangladesh time. Though Bangladesh are mere spectators, enthusiasm surrounding the event is at its peak as always. To cater to the demand of the viewers state-run Bangladesh Television, the only terrestrial TV channel, will provide live coverage of 25 of the matches.

Twelve matches of the first round including the opening game will be telecast live while all but three matches from the Round of 16 onwards will also be broadcast live. Due to some rights-related issues the BTV won't be able to show two quarterfinals and the third place play-off.

Tigers may name team tomorrow

The national cricket selectors are likely to announce the 15-member team tomorrow for the coming Asia Cup that will start from June 15 in Sri Lanka.

The Tigers are scheduled to return home on June 10 after a disappointing Twenty20 World Cup in West Indies which was followed by a frustrating Test series in England. They will leave for Colombo on June 12 for the regional championship which will start with the match between Sri Lanka and Pakistan on June 15.

"The team is returning home as per earlier schedule because early tickets could not be arranged for them after the second Test finished on the third day. The team think-tank talked about their failure in the second Test and tried to find out the problems. The main problem was that the players failed to adjust to the changed condition on the day," told Jalal Yunus, head of delegation, over telephone last night.

Bangladesh made a meek surrender inside three days in the second Test at Old Trafford after an impressive performance in the first Test at Lord's. Despite the early finish there was hardly any chance for the Shakib Al Hasan's men to return home early because the team management could not arrange tickets for next available flight.

"We will announce the team day after tomorrow [Wednesday]. There would be some changes in the one-day squad but there is no chance to see any fresh face this time," said chief selector Rafiqul Alam yesterday.

Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, Nazmul Hossain, Syed Rasel, Sohrawardi Shuvo, Nazimuddin and Rokibul Hasan, the right-hander who was available for selection after the three-month ban was lifted, has been practising for the

Siddons hopeful

Bangladesh coach Jamie Siddons insists his side can one day develop into a unit capable of challenging the world's top sides despite their dispiriting defeat against England in the second Test at Old Trafford.

The Tigers suffered a 2-0 series defeat after being dismissed for 123 to surrender the second Test in Manchester by an innings and 80

Bangladesh lost all 10 of their wickets inside a session twice in the match and their Test record now reads 59 defeats in 68 matches.

However, Australian Siddons believes those two collapses shouldn't detract from the improvements made by his team, especially the

free-flowing play of Tamim Iqbal, who hit cen-

tury in the first innings. "Whatever they say we've heard it before, no

doubt about that," Siddons said. "When conditions are good and not doing

too much we are competitive with any team in the world and can take them to five days. But we haven't got enough match-winners to win the games yet.

"We've got a couple of players who are standing up but others aren't and we need consistency.

"I definitely want to carry on. I'd love to go back and do their academy and make sure the next group of players aren't getting smacked around like this group.


"I've had two years of developing cricketers I didn't think were ready and now I've got three

South Africa's vuvuzela, the trumpet that will be a fixture at World Cup matches, is the loudest of all fan instruments and can cause permanent hearing loss, a global hearing foundation said on Monday.

Soccer governing body FIFA has okayed the plastic trumpet for the tournament, which starts on Friday, after organisers did tests at a match at Johannesburg's 95,000-seater Soccer City due to worries the din could drown out emergency announcements. While normally reserved for local games, the vuvuzela can now also be heard at warm-up matches and practice sessions ahead of the tournament, even those not involving South Africa's Bafana Bafana.

The Hear the World Foundation -- an initiative formed by Swiss hearing products group Phonak to raise awareness about hearing loss -said tests showed it produced a dangerously loud sound, far out-blasting a chainsaw.

The tests, conducted late last month in a sound-proof studio, found the vuvuzela emitted 127 decibels, more than the air horn -- 123.5

decibels -- and the Brazil's samba drums. A referee's whistle was fourth while the cowbell, a favourite in Switzerland and Austria,

trailed at 114.9 decibels.

"To put it in perspective, when a sound is increased by ten decibels our ears perceive it as being twice as loud, so we would consider the vuvuzela to be more than double the volume of the cowbell," audiologist Robert Beiny said in a statement.

Hear the World said extended exposure to 85 decibels risked permanent hearing loss and urged fans to use protection, such as ear plugs and ear muffs. The vuvuzela can be heard across South


Africa as football fever grows ahead of the June 11-July 11 tournament, from airports to shopping centres, but at stadiums tens of thousands of people will blow the trumpet, such like constant car hooters in a traffic jam. Some foreign players complained at last

year's Confederation Cup about the din, and Thailand manager Bryan Robson that he was unable to communicate with his players during a friendly against South Africa. FIFA president Sepp Blatter has defended it,

though, saying it as much a part of local soccer as bongo drums and chanting in other countries.
