Clint eyes 1950 repeat

US playmaker Clint Dempsey sees his American World Cup squad on the verge of doing something special in South Africa, possibly a Saturday repeat of a 1950 shock World Cup upset of England.

Dempsey, a veteran at Fulham of England's Premiership, knows well the talent that make England a formidable first-match foe in their Group C showdown, but he also knows the faith his teammates have in themselves

even as others doubt. England figure to be a favourite with an all-time 7-2 record against the US squad, but the Americans look back at a 1-0 stunner over England at the 1950 World Cup in Brazil

and understand anything is possible. "If we didn't believe we could (beat England again), why would we be here? It would not be right if we didn't feel we could do something special," Dempsey said. "Hopefully we can do something special like

we did in the Confederations Dempsey scored goals in three consecutive matches in the Confederations Cup last year in South Africa, leading the Americans to a shock upset of Spain to snap a 35-match

win streak and a 2-0 lead on Brazil before losing in the final. "Nobody thought we could make the final," Dempsey said. "It doesn't matter what people think. It matters inside the

group what they think of them-"I hope they say, 'Why not?' You can't live in fear. You have

to go out and try to do something special." The 27-year-old midfielder

has gone from testing his skills in scorching conditions on the west Texas dirt as a youth to shining for Fulham, a stunning goal to beat Juventus in the Europa League leaving no doubt of his ability.

Portugal were counting the cost after in-form Manchester United winger Nani was ruled out of the entire tournament after injuring his collarbone in training, dealing a blow to his country's chances.

As a forlorn Nani watched from the sidelines, Portugal eased to a 3-0 win over Mozambique in Johannesburg on Tuesday with Hugo Almeida scoring twice.

Portugal coach Carlos Queiroz admitted Nani was a "sad" loss. "But the most important thing is the cohesion of the team and that we all play together to get over it," he said.

Queiroz was however given a boost after seeing defensive midfielder Pepe back in action after the Real Madrid player had been sidelined for six months with a knee injury.

Vidic fears England

Serbia defender Nemanja Vidic is hoping to avoid England in the second round should both nations make it out of their World Cup groups.

England are favourites to top Group C while Serbia face a tough battle to get out of Group D, which also features Germany, Ghana and Australia.

The winners of each group play the runnersup of the other in the second round, but Vidic is hoping his homeland won't have to meet the country where he plies his club trade with Manchester United in the second round.

Vidic's day-to-day knowledge of the Premier League's English stars has him convinced they are a team worth avoiding if possible. An England-Serbia clash would see Vidic marking his club teammate Wayne Rooney a fate any defender could be forgiven for fearing given the striker's form this season.

"If we got to the second round I would like to miss England," said Vidic, now widely recognised

as one of the best defenders in the world.

"England are the strongest team we could play, so I would prefer to avoid them. I play in England. I play against these players and I train with some of them every day.

"But it is best to focus on the first game because success at the World Cup for Serbia would be to reach the second round. If we do that we would be happy. After that everything else is extra."

At 28-years-old and playing for a nation that is not guaranteed to qualify for every World Cup, Vidic is aware this may be his last chance to make an impact on the biggest stage, and he intends to leave South Africa with no personal regrets, whatever the results.

"It is a big thing for anyone to play at a World Cup,"he said.

"I am no different. But I don't just want to play. I want to do well. I want to achieve something I can be proud of.

"I have reached an age where it could be my last World Cup so I will give everything I can to make it a positive experience, for both myself and the team.

Champs land in SA

Reigning champions Italy arrived in South Africa on Wednesday to defend their crown after

tournament favourites Spain showed off their firepower as they scored six times in their final warm-up game.

Coach Marcello Lippi's Italian squad, which includes nine of the players in the squad which triumphed four years ago in Germany, were guarded by dozens of police after their plane touched down at Johannesburg airport.

They headed off to the Leriba Golf Lodge, just outside Pretoria, to prepare for their opening Group F match against Paraguay in Cape Town on Monday.

The Italians' arrival ups the tempo two days before Friday's big kickoff when the host nation take on Mexico in front of 90,000 spectators including former president Nelson Mandela at Johannesburg's Soccer City stadium. Italy have rarely shone

since their triumph against France in the 2006 final in Berlin, but the country's football federation chief Giancarlo Abete insisted it would be a mistake to write off Lippi's squad. "Italy are world champi-

ons, that should not be forgotten but you cannot deny that other teams have done better than us in the last few years," Abete said on the plane to South Africa. "For everyone the favour-

ites are Brazil, Spain, Argentina and England, but we've got great belief. "For Italy we're talking

about tradition and in big competitions our strengths

show through."

But history is against the Italians no country has won back-to-back World Cups since Brazil in 1962.

Brazil hold the record for most consecutive wins at the World Cup (11, set in 2006). Next is Italy with 7 (ending 1938).

Lippi has already lost key man Andrea Pirlo to a calf strain for the Paraguay game and the playmaker faces a race against time to be involved in any of the group games.

Meanwhile, Italy midfielder Daniele De Rossi


says that winning this World Cup would be an improvement on four years ago. However, the 26-year-old

Roma talisman is under no illusions about the scale of the task facing his side.

Speaking to Spanish newspaper Marca, he said: "Winning this World Cup would mean improving on what we did in Germany and we will try to do that.

"The motivations are there like always when you put on the Italy shirt. We are all coming off a tough year, but we are improving.

"World Cup games are never easy. It's true, we don't have Argentina, Germany or England in the group stages, but still it won't be easy."


