## Obama faces rare defeat on health help for jobless

AP, Washington

If Chuck Lacasse had gotten his pink slip four days earlier, Uncle Sam would have covered most of his family's health insurance while he looked for a new job.

But Congress allowed emergency health care assistance for unemployed workers to expire May 31, and seems unwilling to renew it despite pleas from President Barack Obama.

Not three months after lawmakers passed his \$1 trillion insurance overhaul, Obama is facing a rare defeat on health care at the hands of his own divided Democrats. Moderates have rebelled against adding billions more to the deficit in a treacherous election year.

"The same Congress that spent all this political capital trying to get people health insurance is going to take a crucial benefit away from unemployed people," said Andrew Stettner, deputy director of the National Employment Law Project, which advocates for the unemployed.

On June 4, Lacasse lost his ob as advertising director for a company that makes nutritional supplements. He'll soon have to pay the entire \$1,500 monthly premium to keep his family covered under his former employer's health insurance plan.

Until May 31, under Obama's economic stimulus law, the government provided a 65 percent subsidy. That would have lowered his cost to

"This really isn't about welfare," said Lacasse, 40. "It's about buying people some time. In a position as specialized as mine, it would have been nice to know that I had some time to look for the right ob." He lives near Green Bay, Wis., with his wife and two children.

spent on any service during a financial year in excess of the amount granted by the House for that purpose, the public accounts committee will examine with reference to the facts of each case the circumstances leading to such an excess and make such recommendation as it may deem fit.

A senior official in the parliament secretariat said the parliamentary body cannot exercise its jurisdiction this year too as the revised budget was never sent to the committee for examination. The committee did not move on its own to exercise its jurisdiction since the rules of procedure was enacted in 1973, he added. The House however will

But he said the House never allowed its committee to exercise the authority. "If we want to engage people's voice in the government expenditure, the system must be introduced," Anwar said.

Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir, chief of the public accounts committee, however said the overall expenditure of the current fiscal is less than the amount granted by parlia-When his attention was

Only one-tenth of the surveyed youths said they are involved in political activities. The first-ever nationwide

survey of its kind, titled "Bangladesh: The Next Generation", collected opinions of the young to help find out what the future adults do, say, think and want. The survey result was unveiled at the Sheraton Hotel in the city yesterday. Speaking as the chief guest at

the unveiling programme, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni said, "I do not believe that the youth do not have any capacity to influence decision-making. It was their decision to elect this government after all."

They are just not aware about their capacity to influence government decisions, she The survey interviewed

2,166 young people between the age of 15 and 30 at their work, educational institutes and homes in 2009. The data of the survey was processed by a taskforce represented by leaders in different scientific, economic, social, cultural and business fields.

"There are grounds for optimism," said The Hunger Project Country Director Badiul Alam Majumdar, adding, "Seventy-nine percent of the youth are interested in development issues and 70 percent think the country is headed in the right direction." "There are fears too," he said,

adding that 60 percent of the youth fear corruption wil worsen in the next five years. "But our youth have a clear

identity, are happy and are

dedicated to their country and

families," said Badiul, also a member of the taskforce. Another member of the taskforce Sheela Tasnim Haq of The Asia Foundation said, "This is a generation that wants to get

involved." "A striking 98 percent want to take part in social work. But in reality, 70 percent don't, and 94 percent couldn't name a youthbased organisation or movement," she said.

The survey suggests 88 percent young Bangladeshis are happy with their lives but 41 percent said they would prefer to live abroad eyeing better pay and education facilities. Only 1.6 percent said they are very unhappy in the country.

As much as 36 percent of the respondents said they believe student politics has a detrimental effect on educational institutions and another 38 percent expressed "strong feelings" about student politics.

Only 15 percent of the respondents seem to think forces'. student politics is a good thing.

party and Koirala's cousin Sushil Koirala has already issued a public warning opposing the private army and saying those promoting it would face punitive action. The ruling party's private

army comes at a time the peace process has come to a standstill with the government failing to draft a new constitution within the prescribed two years. Now it is uncertain if the

statute will be drafted by 2011.

The impasse is mainly over the Maoist army and the YCL the ruling parties want disbanded while the former rebels are asking the prime

minister to quit. Two major parties from Nepal's volatile Terai plains have their personal armies while several minor parties and underground groups also lay claim to their own 'defence
