# Diego wants flavour of winning Cricket

Diego Maradona wants his Argentina side to get 'the flavour of winning' after they opened their World Cup campaign with a 1-0 victory over Nigeria and the coach compared Lionel Messi's love for the ball to a child's love for chocolate.

Argentina created a series of excellent openings in the Group B match but took just one of them, Gabriel Heinze heading home a Juan Sebastian Veron corner after five minutes.

Messi in particular suffered at the overworked hands of Nigeria goalkeeper Vincent Enyeama, who secured the manof-the-match award with a string of superb saves.

But Maradona felt the result was the most important thing for the opening game and hopes they can now go on a

seven-match winning run that takes in the final at Soccer City in Johannesburg on 11 July.

He said: 'I really hope that my men will make the most of the support from Argentina's fans, the people in the stadium, I hope they can make the most of that so they can excel and improve.

'My players will then have the flavour of winning. If our players keep winning the games they are going to feel the need, the hunger to win the game.' Messi, so often a disappointment for

Argentina, looked almost at his Barcelona best for large parts of the game and Maradona says it is easy to get the best out of him - just give him the ball. 'We've talked about this and I want

Messi close to the ball, he said.

'As long as he has fun close to the ball, then we will all be fine. If you take the ball

away from him it would be like taking chocolate away from a kid. He produced magic on the field today.'

The 1986 World Cup winner admitted the failure to kill off Nigeria did make him and his team a little nervous.

He added: 'We suffered a little bit by not converting all those chances, we've won the match but when you fail to take those chances you could end up with a draw every minute.'

Heinze emphatically took his chance, diving to head home a corner with Chidi Odiah unable to clear it off the line.

Nigeria coach Lars Lagerback was pleased with his side's overall display but lamented the lack of concentration that allowed Argentina to forge ahead. 'I'm very disappointed by the result

but I'm proud of my players and the team performance they put in,' said the Swede.

# 'SA will get better'

South Africa's talisman Steven Pienaar believes the host nation will get better and better as the World Cup progresses after the host nation battled to a 1-1 draw with Mexico in the tournament opener.

Everton midfielder Pienaar admitted Bafana Bafana struggled at the start of the match at Johannesburg's Soccer City stadium in front of a crowd of nearly 85,000 raucous fans clad in green and gold.

"It was the first game, the opening game and it's normal that there's a lot of pressure," said Pienaar, who added that South Africa got into their stride midway through the first half when they started playing their own game.

The midfielder said that on the strength of the South Africans' second-half performance "we deserved the victory".

"I'm happy with the way it went. The first 20 minutes we were a a bit nervous. It's normal because if you look at our team it's only Aaron (Mokoena, the captain) who's played in a World Cup," he said.

"For the other 10 players it was our first game in a World Cup but we're quite satisfied

with the way it went.

"We just have to go on and we can only get better now. We played against one of the best teams in the world and to walk away with a point, I think we must be proud of ourselves."

South Africa, who sent their supporters wild when they took the lead 10 minutes into the second half through Siphiwe Tshabalala's superb 55th-minute shot, were pegged back by Rafael Marquez's strike in the 79th minute.

The hosts then went agonisingly close to sneaking a win right at the death when striker Katlego Mphela hit the post after outpacing two defenders.

Pienaar welcomed the backing of the crowd, who kept up a deafening wall of noise with vuvuzela horns blaring throughout the match.

"I'm really proud of the fans for their support and I really appreciate it." Pienaar was substituted towards the end of

the match with coach Carlos Alberto Parreira explaining the Everton midfielder had struggled with cramp.

South Africa next face Uruguay in Pretoria on June 16 and then France in Bloemfontein on June 22.

# India romp to 6-wkt win

India needed only 15 overs to inflict a crushing six wicket defeat on Zimbabwe at Queens Sports Club here on Saturday in the first of two Twenty-20 matches over the weekend.

The Indians restricted a defensive minded Zimbabwe to 111-9 in their 20 overs and overtook this poor effort with five overs and much of the afternoon to spare, coasting to 112-4. Yusuf Pathan top-scored with an aggressive

37 not out, and picked up the man of the match award for his efforts. Virat Kohli, undefeated on 26, and Suresh Raina (28) also shared the spoils.

It was all too easy in the end but India did have their scares. They lost Murali Vijay with only seven runs on the board when he popped up an easy catch to Prosper Utseya. Then the departure of Numan Ojha on 12 had them on the back foot.

Raina eased the crisis before left-arm spinner Ray Price claimed two wickets in his first over, removing both Raina and Rohit Sharma.

It was Price's 34th birthday but it wasn't

quite the happy day he would have hoped for his two wickets cost 24 runs in two overs. At 48-4, it looked a little rocky for India but

Kohli and Pathan saw them home with a flurry of sixes and boundaries as the pressure was released. It was not so much an Indian success as a

Zimbabwe failure of batting tactics. The main culprit was Craig Ervine, who needed 47 balls for his 30 runs. Chamu Chibhabha made 40 from 30 balls

but with the in-form Brendan Taylor going for 15 and fellow opener Hamilton Masakadza making just one, Zimbabwe were always struggling to post an imposing total.

The final match for the Indians on their safari here on Sunday offers a good chance to square their overall account with Zimbabwe and make it 2-2 from four matches.

# Proteas rally to 352 Afridi wants attention

Half-centuries from Mark Boucher, AB de Villiers, and Ashwell Prince trumped a penetrative, marathon spell of spin bowling from Sulieman Benn to put South Africa in a favourable position in the opening Test against West Indies on Friday.

Boucher missed most of the preceding limited-overs matches, but he got his groove back in the top score of 69, de Villiers supported with 68, and Prince made 57, as the South Africans were dismissed for 352 in their first innings about 10 minutes before the scheduled close on the second day at Queen's Park Oval. "I think we played pretty well," said de

Villiers. "We realized after the first day, the pitch was taking a lot of turn, and quite slow, and it was not easy batting in the first session.

"I am really proud of our effort. We strung good partnerships together, and we got the team out of trouble. He added: "All in all, it was a good day for us.

We would have been happy with 300, but we got 352, and so we will need to come on the third day and pick up some early wickets to put West Indies under pressure." The Proteas' batsmen battled hard to get on

top of the West Indies' spin bowlers in particu-

lar, but Benn, gaining generous turn and bounce from the pitch, was the pick of the home team's bowlers with five wickets for 120 runs from 47 overs. Test newcomer Shane Shillingford sup-

ported Benn, when he collected three for 96 from 34 overs with his off-spin. "It is nice to be playing Test cricket again,

and this is my first Test at Queen's Park Oval, which has a reputation of being home of spin bowling in the Caribbean," said Benn. "It is nice to know that I was able to perform

here. The pitch started out really ideal for spin bowling, but it flattened out, so you had to put in some extra work. I guess being patient, and bowling good lines and lengths, paid off forme in the end."

Boucher made five fours and one six from 146 balls in his knock to beef-up the visitors' total, after their innings appeared at the cross roads at 238 for seven.

He reached his 50 from 102 balls with a single to point, and added a valuable 86 for the eighth wicket with Dale Steyn either side of tea to tilt the balance back in favour of South Africa.

Steyn was stumped off Benn for 39, and Boucher continued to rally the South Africans with tail-enders Morne Morkel and Lonwabo Tsotsobe before he was last man dismissed, caught at long-off off Dwayne Bravo.

De Villiers and Ashwell Prince had put the South Africans back on track, when they slid to 107 for five inside the first hour of the day.

The pair added 122 for the sixth wicket to revive South Africa before they were dismissed in the space of 25 balls. Before lunch, de Villiers and Prince had

carried the South Africans to 190 for five at the interval. De Villiers and left-hander Prince gave some backbone to the Proteas' innings, after West Indies claimed two early wickets. De Villiers got off the mark with a lofted four

to long-on off Shillingford, and one of Prince's

earliest strokes was also a lofted drive to longon off Benn for his first boundary, and he also carted Shillingford over long-off for a six. South Africa had continued from their overnight total of 70 for three, and suffered an

early blow, when nightwatchman Paul Harris was caught at cover for 10 off Benn in the fifth over of the day. The South Africa batsmen became bogged

down against tight spin bowling from Benn and Shillingford, who trapped Jacques Kallis Ibw playing back and across to a well-pitched delivery for 28. The two sides also play Tests in St. Kitts (June

18-22) and Barbados (June 26-30). South Africa have dominated West Indies in Tests since their re-entry into international cricket following international isolation.

They have won 14, and lost three of the 22 matches between the two sides, and two of the wins came at Port of Spain in 2001 and 2005 in the two Tests the sides have played here.
