Capello gamble pays off

England's World Cup campaign finally took off Wednesday at the third attempt as Fabio Capello's side qualified for the last 16 with a 1-0 win over Slovenia to secure runners-up spot in Group C.

Jermain Defoe started for England in place of Emile Heskey in one of the biggest gambles of manager Capello's career.

And the move paid dividends with the Tottenham striker's 23rd minute goal.

An opening 1-1 draw with

the United States followed by the lame goalless stalemate with Algeria had left England staring at the possibility of failing to make it out of the group stage for the first time since 1958.

Capello's men turned up

at the Nelson Mandela Bay stadium facing, as Steven Gerrard had so aptly put it, a do-or-die match.


James's near post.

Samir Handanovic. In almost a carbon copy move minutes later Milner crossed again, this time Defoe's shot was parried by Handanovic with Frank Lampard pouncing on the clearance only to fire over the bar.

Shane Smeltz has already created history for the Kiwis against Italy by scoring the first goal for New Zealand ever in World Cup Football Competition. Well, New Zealand has already created history when they qualified only for the second time in World Cup Football.

The first New Zealanders to be widely known as Kiwis were the military.
