## England: Flashback 1990 Pro Carbonero,

Twenty years ago, England struggled through the first round of the World Cup, just as they have done in South Africa.

Back then, the team still made the semifinals. So maybe the 1966 world champions should be hopeful again.

1990, England laboured through 1-1 and 0-0 draws in their first two group games and went on to win the third 1-0. The team did exactly the same thing this year.

"We thoroughly deserve to go through. I thought all the players that started the game and all the subs were terrific today [Wednesday]," midfielder Steven Gerrard said. "We need to find consistency now in the knockout stages."

The parallels between the two

The journalist girlfriend of Spain's goalkeeper was accused of breaching professional ethics Wednesday after she reported on live television from behind the net ahead of the country's World Cup loss to Switzerland.

Sara Carbonero, whose boyfriend is Spain's number one keeper Iker Casillas, is a television journalist for Spain's Telecinco channel, part of the network owned by Italy's Silvio Berlusconi.


British newspapers last week showed a picture of her, microphone in hand, reporting from behind the net just a few feet (metres) from Casillas during the warm-up for the match against Switzerland.

Spain lost the match 1-0, with Casillas at least partly to blame for the goal, and the British papers speculated that her presence may have distracted him.

After the game, Carbonero interviewed Casillas on live television.

"It's a disgrace," the head of the Madrid press association, Fernando Gonzalez Urbaneja, said Wednesday.


