FIFA's choice of Englishman **Howard Webb to take charge** of Sunday's World Cup final has irked Spain as he was the man in charge of their opening loss to Switzerland, media reports noted Friday. # Fight for solace

Two-time winners Uruguay and three-time champions Germany clash here on Saturday in a match that neither side wanted to be contesting - the playoff to decide third place.

Both coaches, Oscar Tabarez of Uruguay and Germany's Joachim Loew will have a job on their hands to rouse their players for one last effort after losing their semifinals to the Netherlands and Spain respectively.

The Uruguayans have an advantage in that they will have had an extra day to absorb their disappointment and 63-year-old Tabarez is known to be a shrewd motivator of men.

He has already been firm in his resolve following the 3-2 defeat by the Dutch that they would put aside the loss and aim to finish third going one better than their performance in 1970.

"To use a term that is

common in the team -- we have to bury this match and get over our sorrow," said Tabarez, in his second spell in charge having guided Uruguay to the last 16 in 1990.

He will definitely have Ajax hitman Luis Suarez back after he served his one match suspension for being sent off for punching the ball off the line in the quarterfinal against Ghana.

And it looks likely he will be reunited with his inspirational strike partner Diego Forlan, who had been in

danger of missing the match through injury after playing through the pain barrier in the semifinal.

Madrid star - scorer of four goals in the finals - carried the unspecified injury throughout the loss to the Dutch but Tabarez is confident he can play some sort of role in the match and Forlan appeared to concur with the coach.

"I think it will be an attractive game - Germany play very good football,"

said Forlan.

"But we also have our style of play. I hope it will be a good game - but our goal is The 31-year-old Atletico to go out there and win this third place for Uruguay."

#### Flu hits German camp

Germany have been hit with flu worries as well as concerns over the fitness of star striker Miroslav Klose ahead of Saturday's World Cup third place play-off against Uruguay, team sources said on Friday.

Coach Joachim Loew is suffering from the flu - and so are skipper Philipp Lahm, striker Lukas Podolski though it is hoped they will both be fit for the match.

Klose meanwhile missed training as he struggles to get over a back problem which affected him in the semifinal loss to Spain on Wednesday.

"Loew is confined to his bed and will not take part in the pre-match press conference at Port Elizabeth this evening," said spokesman Harald Stenger.

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### Ashraful to join hurt Tigers

Mohammad Ashraful flew off to London yesterday morning after being called up to the injury-hit Bangladesh squad.

The out-of-form batsman, who was left out for his poor showing in the Asia Cup last month, was given the nod after Rokibul Hasan and Mushfiqur Rahim were hurt during the first one-day international against England in Nottingham on Thursday.

Mushfigur has been ruled out for a week while Raqibul Hasan is out for the rest of the tour after fracturing his toe after being struck by a James Anderson yorker.

The wicketkeeper was struck in the face while standing up to the left-arm spinner Faisal Hossain and had to be stretchered off the field. X-rays showed there was no fracture, but he is being kept in hospital for observation.

Junaed Siddiqui deputised behind the stumps for the remainder of a match where Mushfigur had previously shown his class with the bat by striking seamer James Anderson for two sixes late on in a Bangladesh innings of 250 for nine.

Ashraful will be joined by all-rounder Naeem Islam and Sahagir Hossain, who awaits visa approval.


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


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#### Vuvuzela: The sound of the FIFA 2010 World Cup

You may hate them or love them but the distinct sound of the vuvuzela has already become the sound of the FIFA 2010 World Cup. The sound of the vuvuzelas on field sounds like a stampede of elephants which on television seems like a swarm of humongous buzzing bees. Let's take a look at the history of this horn to see what it's all about:

- · Originally it was made from a kudu horn and said to be from the ancient days of South Africa and was used to summon people to
- To get the pure blast of sound from a vuvuzela you need some descent lung capacity to produce the monotone obstreperous sound that shows the full extent of what this horn can really do. So where does the word vuvuzela come from. One theory suggested is that it came from the word Zulu which means making a vuvu sound. Another is that it's a township slang word for taking a
- The world's largest Vuvuzela is located in South Africa's Cape Town. At a staggering 114 feet long this horn is powered by air horns which themselves can reach noise levels of 123.5 decibels. This is an immense sound that will shatter ear drums.
- Cape Town shops have sold out of "Vuvu-Stop" earplugs, which reduce the noise level of a nearby vuvuzela by 31 decibels. Each packet has a label on the back of the packet which reads: "Highly effective noise reduction. Uses include soccer, rugby, or to block out your wife's moaning."













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
