Existing laws enough to stop road crashes

Law minister tells seminar

Terming the existing laws sufficient to prevent road accidents, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed yesterday said the government will take more steps if necessary to avoid road crashes.

The minister was speaking as the chief guest at a seminar on "Prevention of road accidents: social, state and legal steps" jointly organised by Saif Foundation, Families United Against Road Accidents (FUARA) and Dhaka Officers' Club at the club's auditorium yesterday morning.

Shafique said the ministries of home and communications are tasked with controlling the vehicular movement.

The ministries must see to it that the vehicles are not overloaded and reckless driving and overtaking do no happen, he said.

The minister said the novice drivers manage driving licences by unfair means from Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) and BRTA officials have to be hones in this regard.

The home ministry should look into this matter, he added.

Advocate Tarana Halim, MP, presented a written statement saying that on an average around 4,085 road accidents occur and some 3,370 people die and 2,881 are injured every year across the country.

She said most road accidents happen due to reckless driving and exemplary punishment to the drivers is called for in such cases.

State Minister for Home Shamsul Huq Tuku said the existing laws need to be amended and the drivers and owners of vehicles have to be made aware about the accidents.

BRTA Chairman M Ayubur Rahman said some 209 places on the highways have been identified as vulnerable to road accidents across the country.

Decrease in use of contraceptives a threat to population control

Says health minister

High rates of unmet need for family planning is posing a threat to population control, said

Health and Family Welfare Minister Prof AFM Ruhal Haque said yesterday.

The unmet need for family planning, which means the couple who want to use contraceptives but could not, is still 17.6 percent, the minister said.

He said this while he was speaking at a press briefing at the health ministry conference room prior to the World Population Day.

The minister said it was 11.3 percent in 2004. It means the unmet need has increased more than 6 percent in last few years for lack of awareness, which must be addressed properly.

As elsewhere across the globe Bangladesh observes the World Population Day today with the slogan Everyone Counts.'

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare has taken different programmes to mark the day including rally, discussion, film exhibition, special health

service, painting exhibition, distribution of family planning media award 2010 and special programmes on media.

Prof Ruhal highlighted the country's population scenario, challenges of population control and the government's steps to address the issue.

" Every year some 20 lakh new faces have been added to our population. The number of population has been increasing as the infant mortality rate has decreased for years together and the average life expectancy has increased. Much could be done if we could address the unmet need of the married couple," he said, admitting that shortage of family planning workers has been hindering the programme.

A field level family planning worker was to recruit during the 70s to educate and provide contraceptives to 600 couple. But family planning workers were not recruited accordingly during the previous years though the number of population had increased and the programme has slowed down, said the

health and family planning officials. They said a family worker is to cover

right ahead of the country's largest shopping season.

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nearly 2000 couple currently, which is quite difficult for them.

Prof Ruhal said recruitment for the directorate general of family planning will begin soon.

Terming dropout rate of using contraceptive a big challenge, the Director General of Family Planning Abdul Quaiyum said it is 40 percent.

The authorities are hopeful as the use of contraceptives by males has increased to 15 percent from 0.7 percent for continuous awareness programme.

Furthermore, satellite clinic at each upazila, reforms in district committees and population council, establishment of community clinics and increased number of skilled birth attendants will play an important role in population control, they said.

State Minister Captain (Retd) Majibur Rahman Fakir, Secretary Shaikh Altaf Ali, Director General of Health Services Prof Shah Monir Hossain and Director (IEM) of Family Planning Ganesh Chandra Sarker were present at the breifing.

Govt to resume operations of closed jute mills

jute farmers, the government has fixed the minimum price at Tk 1,100 per maund this fiscal, added Latif. State Minister for Labour

Earlier, the minister inaugurated an exhibition on jute products at the university auditorium.

Thirty machines and huge cotton were gutted in a fire at a cotton godown at Purba Delpara of Fatulla in Narayanganj yesterday.



Subsidised power plants

setting up quick rental power plants would eventually increase production cost instead of solving power shortage in the country.

They said highly subsidised rental power scheme would increase the price of electricity. As a result, production cost would also be increased and this process ultimately will create a negative impact on people's purchasing power and economy.

Bangla weekly Shaptahik organised the roundtable discussion titled "Power crisis and public interest" at BIAM auditorium yesterday.

They also questioned the process of selecting companies to set up these quick rental stations without tender.

Presenting the keynote paper Shuvo Kibria, assistant editor of the weekly, said PDB will have to spend around Tk 5,000 crore as subsidy to purchase power with high cost from these foreign stations and sell it at a lower cost to the former energy advisor to a caretaker government, said some of the rental companies are bringing aged generators, which would not work properly instead consume more fuel and create more emission.

Economist Prof Anu Mohammad said Petrobangla is now considered a "losing enterprise" and blamed the World Bank's prescription for it. He also criticised the government for declining condition of PDB gradually.

He said additional fund for PDB in recently announced budget is actually subsidy allocation for purchasing electricity from these foreign companies.
