The big-name players have fallen by the wayside, leaving the Netherlands and Spain, tactically, technically and temperamentally the teams of the tournament, to face off in a World Cup final that should be one for the soccer cognoscenti.

It is entirely fitting that Sunday's climax to a tournament that has seen Cristiano Ronaldo, Kaka and co fail to live up to their stratospheric reputations should showcase the value of teamwork over individual brilliance.

Spain, inching their way back to the levels of technical perfection that took them to victory at Euro 2008, will start as slim favourites at Soccer City in their first World Cup final. Even Paul the Octopus, the tentacled tipster

who has provided the great silly story of this World Cup by correctly predicting all Germany's results, is pointing to a win for the Furia Roja (Red Fury).

"The important thing is that we keep our calm and maintain our spirit," coach Vicente del Bosque told reporters. "We know that's the road to follow."

Whatever happens, we will have a first-time

World Cup winner at the first tournament in Africa, with the Dutch playing their third final after defeats in 1974 and 1978.

It will also be a first World Cup win for a European side playing on another continent Bert van Marwijk's team, who have exuded


