They call it the 'little final.'

It is the game no-one wants to play, which ironically means that it is the game that is usually the most entertaining. Statistics say that on average, the third-place game produces, four goals a game. Yesterday it produced five as Germany and Uruguay served up an absolute thriller as a prelude to the biggest show on earth.

The Germans won in an error-ridden but frankly brilliant game that oscillated between one side and another until Sami Khedira's looping header settled issues in the 83rd minute.

Even then, Uruguay captain Diego Forlan nearly took the game into extra-time when his superb 93rd minute free-kick thundered off the bar with Hans-Jorg Butt beaten.

It would have been sweet justice for the underrated Forlan, whose inspirational performances have seen

Uruguay scale the heights after a near 40-year absence. Forlan can perhaps lay claim to the Golden Ball as he has time and again bailed out the Uruguayans in this tournament and has been the backbone behind their strong showing. As has Bastian Schweinsteiger. The Germany winger

converted to central midfielder had a mixed game, but still proved the heartbeat of the side. Although it was his error that gave away the equaliser to Uruguay, it was also his shot that paved the way for young Thomas Mueller to give the Germans the lead.

And on the topic of Mueller, the Bayern Munich tyro is almost set to win the award for the best young player of the

World Cup. His intelligence and fearlessness make him a sparkling player to watch and with five goals and three assists he has been directly involved in more goals than any other player in this World Cup.

The game itself was packed with entertainment as both sides looked to take the game to the opponents. Luis Suarez, roundly booed whenever he touched the ball, Forlan and Edinson Cavani formed a formidable strike-force and they constantly troubled the German backline missing captain Lahm.

But Germany were not to be outdone with Khedira, Mueller and Mesut Oezil in particular forming threatening combinations backed up by Schweinsteiger. Sadly, it was Cacau upfront trying to score, rather than Miroslav Klose. The Bayern Munich striker was aiming to unseat Ronaldo as the greatest scorer in World Cup history but a bad case of the flu put paid to his hopes.

In the end, it might be divine justice as Ronaldo is a player of a much higher calibre, than the humble Klose, although a return of fourteen goals from three World Cup's is as good as it gets. Fittingly, he remains tied with Gerd Mueller.

In the end, Germany's triumph will mean that the young team will go home with a medal for their exploits. The Germans have wowed with their superb football throughout the tournament, and their young team with an average age below 25 have a bright future ahead. Euro 2012 and the World Cup in Brazil beckons.

Both coach Joachim Loew and his squad are to receive Germany's top honours after winning 'the hearts and minds' of fans by finishing third at the World Cup, it was revealed on Sunday.

Newly-elected German president Christian Wulff visited the team, just before they left their World Cup base to fly home on Sunday night after they beat Uruguay 3-2 in Saturday's third place play-off, to announce the news.

Loew is to receive Germany's Federal Cross of Merit, while the team will receive the Silver Bay Laurel Leaf, Germany's top sporting award, in recognition of their roles as ambassadors by scoring 16 goals at the World Cup. "This team is Germany's best ambassador

on the world stage," said 51-year-old Wulff, who succeeded Horst Koehler, who resigned on May 31 after he appeared to suggest German troops abroad were defending Berlin's economic interests. "The team has deserved this distinction,

they have won the hearts and minds of people not just in Germany, but across the world. "The Cross of Merit for Joachim Loew is in

recognition of his work as a coach, we all know how important he has been.

"The whole of Germany has been grateful for what he has done."

With the coach out of contract now Germany's World Cup is over, Theo Zwanziger, the president of the German Football Federation (DFB) says he wants to talk with Loew back in Frankfurt about his future. "I think we will sit down and put our heads

together, I have always said I want to keep working with Loew," said Zwanziger. "I think it is right and fair that we need to

take time to digest the World Cup." Loew has refused to hint whether he will

lead Germany into their Euro 2012 qualifying campaign, to be held in Poland and the Ukraine, with the first qualifier taking place against Belgium in Brussels on September 3.

"I have really put the issue on the back and solid unit."

Germany look to young guns

Midfielder Bastian Schweinsteiger said on Sunday Germany's rising stars have the potential to become future World Cup winners after finishing third at the World Cup finals. "We have come even closer

to the top five teams in the world, there is a bit of a tear in my eye thinking of the semifinal we lost, but there is a smile in the other one as we showed both heart and courage against Uruguay," said Schweinsteiger, who is just 25 but one of the veterans with 81

"If we keep improving like this, sooner or later the trophy will be ours."

Germany beat Uruguay 3-2 in Port Elizabeth on Saturday to win the third place play-off after losing 1-0 to Spain in last Wednesday's semi-final.

The side were due to fly back to Germany on Sunday night at the same time the final takes place in Johannesburg between Spain and the Netherlands, but captain Philipp Lahm says more is to come from this side.

"We have a very good chance in the coming years to play at the top. We are still nowhere near the end of our development," said 26-yearold Lahm. "We must continue to work

hard. But we have a lot of quality and must be optimistic looking ahead." This Germany squad was the second-youngest side to

compete at a World Cup finals with an average age of just under 25. "We have nothing to worry about," said forward Lukas

Podolski, who like Lahm and Schweinsteiger was a member of the team that also finished third in the 2006 finals in Germany.

"We have a young group and will compete again for the title," added the 25-year-old.

Ten players of the 23-man World Cup squad in South Africa are under 25, while Bayern Munich's Thomas Mueller, who has scored five goals here, is the red-hot favourite to win the best young player award.

"This team is the future, it is viable that it will only reach its zenith in a few years," predicted Joachim Loew, who has yet to decide whether he will stay on as head coach.

"The culture of our game is doing well," added the 50year-old.

Loew pleads for time

Germany coach Joachim Loew insisted on Saturday that there have been no talks over a new contract which would keep him at the helm of the team he led to third place at the World Cup.

"There have been no negotiations for the moment. I need calm and time to go over things that have happened in my head," said Loew, after Germany defeated Uruguay 3-2 in the third-place play-off.

"I want to have two or three days to get an idea of what can happen and I want to talk to may team manager, Oliver Bierhoff."
