Serena has surgery

AP, New York Serena Williams needs surgery on

her right foot after cutting it on a brokenglassatarestaurant. The top-ranked women's

player was injured last week and will miss three tournaments leading to the US Open, the WTATour said Saturday.

Williams has withdrawn from tournaments in Istanbul, Cincinnati and Montreal. The tour website offered no details about what happened at the restaurant.

"I'm so upset I won't be able to play in the upcoming events because of this foot surgery," Williams said on the website. "Thank you for all of your support. I can't wait to get back on the courts."

A message left with her agent was not immediately returned.

On Monday, World TeamTennis said Williams would miss the entire season. Her Washington Kastles team said she cut the bottom of her foot and needed stitches.

On July 10, Williams attended the wedding of Denver Nuggets star Carmelo Anthony in New York. In a photo, it appeared she had two bandages on the top of her right

Williams won her fourth Wimbledon crown and 13th major title in July. The Rogers Cup in Montreal begins Aug. 16, and the US Open starts Aug. 30.

After winning the Australian Open at the end of January, Williams was sidelined through April because of an injured left knee. She lost in the French Open quarterfinals in June

before capturing Wimbledon.

"This team was unified and there were no problems, nothing. I took the decision in the best interest of the team and hope a youngster with a Test temperament takes my position.

"I also feel that there are other players who are not fit for the longer version of the game and my advice to them is to concentrate on the shorter forms," said Afridi, without

naming names. Afridi hopes a month's break will revive him for the two Twenty20 and five one-day internationals against World Twenty20 champions England

which follow the Test series. "I will be fresh for the limited over series which will be very tough because England have been doing very well in both ODIs and T20s, so if we could beat them it would be good for the progress of the

team," said Afridi. Pakistan's one-day squad is due to announced next month.

Vinokourov wins stage, Schleck in overall lead

Alexandre Vinokourov scored his first victory on the Tour de France since completing a doping suspension after a gutsy attack late in the race's 13th stage from Rodez to Revel on Saturday.

Luxembourg's Andy Schleck, of Saxo Bank, retained the race leader's yellow jersey with his 31sec lead on main rival and reigning champion Alberto Contador intact ahead of Sunday's first stage in the Pyrenees.

Vinokourov, who only returned to racing last year, was delighted with his win after capping a late counter-attack to Italian Alessandro Ballan with a determined drive for the finish line.

It is his first victory on the race since 2005, when he won two stages as part of the T-Mobile team.

"For me, just to be at the Tour de France is a victory. So to win a stage makes me very happy," said Vinokourov, who served a twoyear ban after being caught blood doping at the race in 2007.

"When I was racing as an amateur they used to tell me that winning a stage on the Tour is similar to winning the world championships. And that's true.

"So I'm very happy, not just me but for my team, my family and all the people in Kazakhstan.'

tions after Astana teammate Contador countered a late attack by Spaniard Joaquin Rodriguez to overtake the Kazakh rider, eventually taking 10secs off Schleck.

This time, Vinokourov made no mistake. After former world champion Ballan had jumped out of the peloton with 8.7km remaining, the Kazakh joined a small group of riders in a bid to close the gap.

By the time he had crested the summit, Ballan had run out of juice. Vinokourov soloed past with ease, and employed impressive bike handling skills on the rest of the downhill section to keep the peloton at bay.

The HTC-Columbia team of British sprinter Mark Cavendish had been hard at work all day helping to chase down a threeman breakaway, which was reeled in with 10km remaining.

But by then the American outfit had nothing left to offer.

The 1.9km-long Saint-Ferreol climb, just after the 10km to go banner, provided the perfect ramp for the late attacks which came and went, and ended their hopes of seeing Cavendish win a fourth stage on this year's

Cavendish went on to win the sprint for second, the Isle of Man rider thus adding precious points to his tally for the green jersey. Despite missing out, he was quick to

applaudVinokourov's performance. "At the end (of the stage) we weren't riding

full gas," said Cavendish. "I had to use my team the whole day so I didn't have anyone, but if any of the other

sprint teams wanted to take it (chase) up maybe we could have got him back. But he did a very impressive ride. "We didn't win the stage today... but it was

an incredible ride by Vinokourov. He deserves that win.'

Cavendish consoled himself by picking up 30 points to close the gap significantly to rivals Alessandro Petacchi and reigning champion and competition leader Thor Hushovd.

Once again Hushovd finished off the pace, Vinokourov attacked late on Friday's stage the Norwegian crossing the line in eighth to to Mende, where he had to drop his own ambi- collect 18pts. That proved insufficient for him to keep the lead of the points competition, now being led by Petacchi on 187pts, with Hushovd on 185 and Cavendish on 162.

However, Cavendish is coy about his chances.

"It's just important to minimise my losses now. Thor's always there, Petacchi's there.... we'll see what happens," he added.

Vinokourov added: "This victory is also very important for the team's motivation, especially with four days in the Pyrenees remaining."

Ancelotti cools Torres talk

Chelsea coach Carlo Ancelotti appeared to rule out a move for Liverpool striker Fernando Torres on Saturday, after seeing his side beat Crystal Palace 1-0 in their first preseason friendly.

Torres won the World Cup with Spain last weekend but endured a disappointing, injury-blighted campaign with Liverpool last season, prompting speculation he could be set to leave the club.

Chelsea and Manchester City have both been linked with a move for the former Atletico Madrid marksman, but Ancelotti said the Premier League champions were already well stocked in the striking department.

"I don't think we need other strikers," said Ancelotti.

"Nothing has changed because in the next few days (Didier) Drogba, (Nicolas) Anelka and (Salomon) Kalou come back, and we have (Daniel) Sturridge."

Ancelotti also dismissed speculation over a possible departure for England international left-back Ashley Cole, who has been linked with a move to join former Chelsea coach Jose Mourinho at Real Madrid.

"I didn't speak with him, don't need to speak with him and he doesn't need to speak to me," said the Italian.

"He is a player of Chelsea, did a fantastic season for us and will be an important player for us next season. One hundred per cent." Chelsea won 1-0 at second-

division Palace, with Ghanaian midfielder Michael Essien marking his return from a seven-month absence through injury with the winning goal.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) has hinted that a Test Championship might be conducted in 2013 in England to revive fans' interest in the five-day format which is struggling due to the growing popularity of Twenty20s.

ICC chief executive Haroon Lorgat said the governing body is looking at ways to revive the dwindling interest in the five-day game.

"There's real talk of a Test play-off in the not too distant future around 2012 or 2013," Lorgat told Radio Five Live Extra. "There's a slot in 2013 that we think could

work, where they would take the existing rankings table and the top four would progress into a semifinal and final. "We have an open mind, we will structure the formats and events correctly so we are not

sitting with the mindset that this is not negotiable. If that [the Champions Trophy] has to be replaced by the Test championship final, then

so be it," Lorgat said.

An ICC sub-committee, comprising the governing body's general manager for cricket Dave Richardson and five member nation chief executives, presented a discussion paper to the board in Singapore last month.

Lorgat said while a final proposal will still take some time to materialise, he strongly believes the concept is closer to reality than ever before.

"There's a lot of work that has been done. It's not straightforward and I think we will see in the not too distant future some proposal on the table. The best way for me to describe it is a work in progress. There's a lot of good work that has been done.

"They've now been tasked with putting together a firmer proposal at the next chief executive's committee meeting. I'm encouraged with the progress we've made. I'm a lot more confident now. When I first got involved it was a foreign concept.

"I'm confident when I see a lot more of the Full Members are beginning to see the need for context and the need for generating more interest in Test cricket," he said.

A North-ern surprise

When Shahid Afridi was asked after the Lord's Test what he thought of Marcus North's bowling, he screwed up his face, looked away and tried not to laugh. As compliments go, it could have been more convincing. North doesn't care. He described it as one of the highlights of his career to help Australia win a Test and earn a place on the bowling honour board at Lord's, alongside his batting colleague Shane Watson.

If that wasn't proof enough that the natural order had been turned upside-down, North's 6 for 55 was the best bowling by an Australian spinner in a Test innings at the home of cricket. Shane Warne couldn't match it, nor Clarrie Grimmett, nor Arthur Mailey, although none of them had the luxury of bowling to Pakistan at Lord's.

"I don't feel like I deserve that, to be honest, North said. "There have been some amazing bowlers over the years who have had some great bowling performances at Lord's. I certainly would like to have that six-for against England. But it was a great occasion to play at a neutral venue against Pakistan at Lord's.' Afridi's wicket was the ultimate bonus for a

bowler -- from his fourth delivery he tried to launch North onto Cavendish Avenue, only to find the fielder at deep midwicket. It wasn't all luck for North and his dismissal of Umar Akmal, who cut to slip when he was surprised by turn and extra bounce from the rough outside off

stump, was memorable.

Things went North's way as soon as Ricky Ponting handed him the ball ahead of Steven Smith on the fourth day. With two left-handers at the crease, Ponting wanted the ball turning away from them, but with his first delivery North drifted the ball down leg side and had Salman Butt stumped thanks to an excellent piece of glovework from Tim Paine.

"I'm as surprised as you guys," North said. "It felt like the ball was coming out okay. There are times it has come out better, but I haven't had too many opportunities at this level. An opportunity to contribute with the ball is something that I love to do. Getting the ball thrown to me and having the opportunity to help win a Test match for Australia is certainly one of the highlights of my career."

North's first six-for in first-class cricket helped him forget about a disappointing match with the bat, after he was bowled for a duck in the first innings and caught behind for 20 in the second. North is coming off a century and a 90 in Australia's last series, on their tour of New Zealand, but his tendency to make triple or single figures, with not a lot in between, is a slight concern.

"In general with batters the first 20 or 30 balls are pretty important," he said. "My record shows it's very important for me. It's something that I'm very aware of. I don't think it's a nervous thing. I'm no more nervous than anyone else. It's something that I've been trying to work on my whole career, it's not just since I've been playing for Australia."

reach the World Cup last-16 round, says he has come back from the brink of retirement thanks to advice from his ailing father. The 29-year-old rejoined

his J-League club Nagoya Grampus on Thursday after spending some two weeks in Brazil to see his father Paulo Ryuji, 57, recover from a heart problem he suffered at home during the big tournament. Tulio learned about his

father's condition right after Japan beat Denmark 3-1 to reach the World Cup knockout stage for the first time on foreign soil. But he stayed on in South

Africa until the Blue Samurai finally lost 5-3 on penalties to Paraguay after a goalless 120 minutes on June 29, failing to clinch their first ever World Cup quarterfinal spot. "I wanted to go home as

soon as possible but I knew my father would say I should finish what I should do," Tulio told Japanese media. "When I saw my father suffering so much, I thought I would quit football and look after him.

"My father then got better and became able to speak again. He told me, 'You should not leave anything in a half-

feel like working hard all over again.'

Tulio, who formed Japan's airtight defence with fellow centre back Yuji Nakazawa, has been a vocal presence on the pitch and has also scored eight goals in 43 matches for Japan since his international debut in 2006.

He scored Japan's only goal in their four straight pre-World Cup friendly defeats by Serbia, South Korea, England and Ivory Coast. Tulio gained instant fame when he clashed with and injured Ivory Coast star striker Didier Drogba.

Tulio's father, a teacherturned-lawyer and a son of Japanese immigrants in rural Palmeira d'Oeste in Sao Paulo state, was reportedly seen saying on Brazilian television: "Tulio has not only realised my dream but also my family's dream."

Tulio came to Japan aged 16 in 1998 after he was scouted in Brazil to play for a high school near Tokyo.

After making his J-League debut with Sanfrecce Hiroshima in 2001, Tulio moved to Urawa Red Diamonds in 2004, helping the country's best-supported club win the AFC Champions League title in 2007. He signed with Nagoya in January.

Tulio acquired Japanese nationality in 2003 and has become the third Brazilianborn player to represent Japan former top 10 player, retired this at a World Cup, following Wagner Lopes in 1998 and year after struggling with form.

But he was the first

Brazilian of Japanese ancestry to stand on the big stage. "I would quit if I couldn't play football full out. If I was half hearted, it would be

insulting to football," Tulio said about his future. Asked whether he would play in the next 2014 World Cup in his native Brazil, he said: "I'm too occupied with what I should do today. I don't even know what I will do
