Bangladesh Army following model of Pak Army

Says BBC radio documentary

The business Bangladesh Army is carrying out in the country, is just following the model of Pakistan Army, reported the second episode of the nine-part BBC radio documentary "Probaho" yesterday.

The documentary revealed this while investigating business projects of Bangladesh Army, particularly the Mongla Cement Factory in Khulna.

Regarding the relations between two armies, eminent expert on military affairs in the sub-continent Dr Ayesha Siddika told the weekly BBC documentary, "There is a keen interest in building links with Bangladesh. I mean, older officers, Pakistan Army officers, want to develop a close relationship with Bangladesh Army."

"I know a retired general of Pakistan who is a businessman nowadays and frequents to Bangladesh. He can be defined as a medium of communication," Ayesha added.

While investigating the history of Mongla Cement Factory, a concern of Bangladesh Army Welfare Trust, the documentary found that a bilateral deal was signed between Pakistan and financed also coincides with the military Bangladesh on October 13, 1988 focusing on a loan of \$ 5 crore at 2 percent

The deal was signed at a time when Gen Ziaul Haque of Pakistan was killed in a mysterious plane crash nearly two to three months back and Pakistan was heading for a general election.

The then Pakistan Army chief was Aslam Begh when Pakistan government approved the loan for Bangladesh considering it as a state matter, the documentary said.

The Mongla factory was financed by a portion of the loan. A government document shows though there were discrepancies in the deal the two states signed, Sena Kalyan Sangstha (SKS) did not face much problem in purchasing machineries for the cement factory project.

The documentary quoted a letter addressed to the then managing director of SKS on June 6, 1990.

"The deal between SKS and Pakistan Heavy Mechanical Complex Ltd have discrepanciesThe institutional deal allows payment in advance, which was not entertained in the state deal. We need an immediate explanation in this regard,"

the letter reads.


High ranking army officers of that time confirmed BBC that the then Pakistan high commissioner in Bangladesh was much eager to have the loan used in implementing the cement project of SKS.

The documentary said that the cement factory in 2008 earned Tk 24 crore as profit--equivalent to the half of the total business profit earned from the business ventures under the trust.

The trust was established in Bangladesh in June in 1998 following the model of Pakistan Army Welfare Trust, which was established in 1965.

Pakistan army established the trust showing reasons that as army is the biggest defence force in the country and largest number of personnel are going into retirement every year, the force needs a separate business platform for welfare of the soldiers, said a book titled "Military Inc: Inside Pakistan's Military Economy" by Ayesha Siddiqa.

The projects taken under the trust are more profitable than SKS's and mainly controlled by army headquarters, the documentary added.

Females' dorm remains unused Dhaka seeks Tokyo's support for lack of gas, water

A newly constructed three-storey building meant for nearly one hundred female students of Dhaka University (DU) remains unused as connections of gas, water and sewerage are yet to be given, four months into the completion of its construction.

Starting in 2006, the construction work of Sikder Monowara Bhaban at the Bangladesh-Kuwait Moitri Hall was finished in February this year with suspension of work for over one year, said DU officials.

Sikder Medical College of Sikder Group donated the dormitory.

"We will be able to accommodate nearly 95 students on the first and second floors once the connections of gas, water and sewerage are fixed," hall provost Prof Farida Begum said, adding that there will be an auditorium on the ground floor.

A number of house tutors of the hall said these utility connections were not set up because the DU administration and Sikder Group remain undecided as to who will do it.

While DU administrators say Sikder Group will set up the connections, Sikder Group representatives say it is the responsibility of the DU administration.

Haque Sikder donated the fund under condition to name it after his wife Monowara Sikder, DU officials said.

Sikder Group engineer Kamrul Huda, however, said DU administration willingly decided to name it as Sikder Monowara Bhaban.

On the ongoing situation, DU Vice-Chancellor Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique told The Daily Star that construction of the building began under the previous administration and that the current administration is unaware about its deed.

Hall provost Farida Begum is also in the dark about the contract. "I just want the rest of the work is completed so the students can stay there," she said.

Sikder Group engineer Kamrul Huda told The Daily Star that there was no deed whatsoever for the construction of the building that cost nearly Tk 2 crore.

The VC, however, said he would Sikder Group Chairman Zainul arrange a meeting with Sikder Group representatives to decide on the unfinished work.

House tutors and resident students of Bangladesh-Kuwait Moitri Hall said they have an acute accommodation crisis. "We have arranged accommodation for 45 students in three rooms because of seat crisis," said a house tutor preferring not to be named.

They also said they could not accommodate all the students of 2007-08 session while request for accommodation from the students of the current session is pilling up.

CONSTRUCTION OF PADMA BRIDGE

sector for the overall socio-economic development, the foreign minister sought Japanese cooperation for the construction of the Padma Bridge as it did for the Bangabandhu Bridge.

During the meeting, Dipu Moni recalled the historical relations that happily exist between Bangladesh and Japan, mentioning that Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman paid a visit to Japan in 1973 which in fact laid the foundation of today's relation.

She also said that the Bangladesh PM is very keen to visit Japan at a mutually convenient time this year to revitalise our bilateral relations.

Emphasising the importance of visit of the Bangladesh premier, the Japanese foreign minister said that Bangladesh is one of the close comprehensive economic partners and Japanese business communities are taking interest to invest to develop socio-economic infrastructure of Bangladesh.

Expressing Japanese positive indication regarding the Padma Bridge, Okada said that they would like to work together with ADB and the World Bank. He further informed that they have already signed the exchanged notes regarding the Bheramara Cycle Power Generation Plant and hoped for its quick implementation.

Dipu Moni said that despite various constraints Bangladesh is moving forward and it has been possible because of the

friendly cooperation of Japan and other development partners of Bangladesh.

The Japanese foreign minister enthusiastically said that they would like to take some environment-friendly projects in Bangladesh. Referring to a study report of JETRO,

Dipu Moni informed her Japanese counterpart that the business environment of Bangladesh is better in South Asia, which she expects that the business community of Japan would be interested in Bangladesh.

The Japanese foreign minister sought Bangladesh's co-operation to work together in various regional and international forum.

Meanwhile, she also had a meeting with her Myanmar counterpart U Nyan Win on the sidelines of the ARF Ministerial Meeting.
