Govt firm on: DAP to save **Dhaka City**

Nobody can foil its implementation, says Mannan

Government will not bow down to any force while: implementing the detailed · area plan (DAP) of Dhaka city, . said Abdul Mannan Khan, : state minister for housing and public works.

DC conference begins today

A three-day conference of deputy commissioners (DC) begins in the capital today.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will inaugurate the conference at the International Conference Centre in Prime Minister's Office (PMO) at 10:00am. Divisional commissioners will also attend the conference.

The PM is expected to direct the DCs about implementation of various development projects and government policies. The DCs will also talk on various issues under their jurisdictions.

After the inaugural session, the conference will begin at the Cabinet Division of the Secretariat at 3:00pm.

INT'L CRIMES TRIBUNAL

Prosecution gets rolling for trial

May seek today warrants against Jamaat leaders

The International Crimes Tribunal is likely to start proceedings today as the prosecution is set to file a petition with the court seeking direction to show some detained top Jamaat leaders arrested on charges of committing war crimes.

Reliable sources say the prosecution initially would submit the petition against five detained top Jamaat leaders on the basis of sufficient allegations against them of committing genocide and crimes against humanity and peace mentioned in the law. during the Liberation War.

The five leaders are Jamaat chief Motiur Rahman Nizami, Secretary General Ali Ahsan Muhammad Mojahid, Nayeb-e Ameer Delwar Hossain Sayedee and senior assistant secretaries general Muhammad Qamaruzzaman and Abdul Quader Mollah.

Sources involved in the process of preparing

the petition told The Daily Star an investigation into the alleged offences is underway against the five.

They added as per the International Tribunal Act and its rules, the prosecution can ask for direction from this court to arrest such alleged criminals during investigation.

The section 11(5) of the Act says any member of the Tribunal will have the power to direct or issue arrest warrant or commit to custody. and authorise the continued detention in custody of any person charged with any crimes

Speaking anonymously, a member of the prosecution formed under the Act told The Daily Star, "We will seek arrest or detention order based on specific allegations against them of committing genocide, crimes against humanity, rape, arson and loot during the Liberation war in 1971."

FIGHTING POVERTY

Bangladesh ahead of India, Nepal

Bangladesh has scored better than India and Nepal in UNDP's Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI) of five South Asian coun-

Among 104 countries, Bangladesh ranked 73. India ranked 74, Nepal 82, Pakistan 70, Sri Lanka 32 in the MPI released on July 15. The 10 indicators in MPI are grouped into three equally

weighted dimensions--health (child mortality and nutrition), education (years of schooling and child enrolment), and standard of living (electricity, drinking water, sanitation, flooring, cooking fuel, and assets).

The Oxford Poverty and Human Development Initiative (OPHI) of Oxford University and the Human Development Report Office of UNDP jointly prepared the MPI.
