Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday directed deputy commissioners to strengthen monitoring of militant activities, and prices of essential commodities.

She also told them to deal with iron hands encroachments on rivers, canals, and other water bodies, and to work with district and upazila level public representatives to boost development activities.

"As administrators you must take measures so none can destabilise the country, and at the same time you must work as friends of the people, whose taxes pay for your salaries," said the premier while addressing the inaugural session of a three-day DC conference in the International Conference Centre of the Prime Ministers'

Int'l crimes tribunal starts proceedings today

Prosecution seeks directive to show 4 Jamaat leaders arrested for 1971 war crimes

The special prosecution yesterday filed the first petition with the International Crimes Tribunal seeking direction to show top four Jamaat leaders arrested or detained on charges of committing war crimes in 1971.

The four accused are Jamaat Ameer Motiur Rahman Nizami, its Secretary General Ali Ahsan Muhammad Mojahid and senior assistant secretaries general Muhammad Kamaruzzaman and Abdul Quader Molla.

Four months into the formation of the tribunal, this is the first ever incident in the history of judiciary to seek direction to show any person arrested under the International Crimes Tribunal Act, 1973.

The three-member tribunal headed by Justice Nizamul Huq

The tribunal will today hold its first sitting in the open courtroom set up at the old High Court building. The courtroom was made ready for the prosecution yesterday.

Report says influential gang behind the crime

The probe committee formed by the education ministry primarily identified 11 people to be directly involved with the leak out of question papers for the assessment of assistant teachers for public high schools.

Of them, four are employees of Bangladesh Government (BG) press, two of Government Printing (GP) Press, one official of Public Service Commission (PSC) and the principal of a college in Nilphamari and three others who are not in any government service.

The BG press employees are compositors Shahidul Islam Fakir and ATM Mostafa, Mostafa's wife Laboni Begum, a binder, and Abdul Jalil, format proof pressman of offset branch.

The GP press employees are Khandaker Mohammad Ali, deputy director, and Hamidul Islam, a binder, while Abdur Rauf is an administrative officer of PSC, and Mahfuzur Rahman principal of Kishoreganj Women's College.

The other three persons identified are Atiqul Islam, Arif and Shafiar Rahman.

Of the 11, Shahidul Islam, Atiqul Islam and Arif are still at large.

The five-member probe committee yesterday submitted its 32-page report with 15 recommendations to Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid. The report said that the question papers leaked out from BG Press.

It mentioned a powerful organised group was behind the scam but could not identify any such syndicate. The committee suggested that the home ministry find out the group.

The probe body still considers the detained 167 people in this connection and a few others as suspects. However, it could not quiz any of the detainees as they are under court's jurisdiction.

The committee's report came with a set of suggestions on improving BG Press management and its security system, printing several copies of question papers and expediting the SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

It was a shock that foreign investors still prefer Pakistan as their destination rather than Bangladesh. In Pakistan, suicide bombings no more elicit any shocked look from observers, as it does not for Afghanistan or Iraq either. Pakistan is today torn by sectarian strife. Whether it will be run over by the Taliban any time soon is a current speculation, and world leaders are rather more concerned with what will happen to its nuclear

Bangladesh, in comparison, offers a far greater safe place for investment. It did not suffer from a terrible anti-insurgency fight like Sri Lanka did, and for which Sri Lanka's FDI flow also dipped sharply. The remnants of the militant bands in Bangladesh are on the run and the government is firmly committed to fight extremism. Bangladesh's economic health is also quite stable in the region, and it

has made reasonably commendable advancement in social index. And yet we scored low -- we need to

### India to track foreign visitors

Every foreigner who visits India will soon be "tagged", and his or her unique case file identity folder will be stored as part of a massive database being created under the home ministry.

A new tamper-proof, machine-readable India visa sticker, sources said, will be launched by next month as part of this larger effort to revamp the foreigners' visa, registration and tracking system.

Once the basic system has been set up, biometrics will be introduced for all visa applicants to be launched on an experimental basis next year. SEE PAGE 15 COL 6


