Cesc going nowhere

Arsenal have no intention of selling captain Cesc Fabregas manager Arsene Wenger said on Wednesday dismissing Barcelona's repeated approaches for the Spain midfielder as "transfer noise".

Barca have openly courted the 23-year-old and according to media reports in Britain and Spain made 29 million pounds (\$45.17 million) bid last month to take the World Cup winner back to the Nou Camp where he played as a youth.

After Spain were crowned world champions earlier this month, Fabregas's celebrating team mates forced a Barcelona shirt over his shoulders on their return home but that looks to be as close as he will get to wearing one in the foreseeable future.

"It is only noise. In our job we have to deal with what we can master. What we cannot influence is not to worry about," Wenger told Arsenal's website (www.arsenal.com). "He is a very important

player for us, he is our captain and we have worked very hard (for him) to be the future of our team and that is why we are always adamant about not letting him go."

Fabregas has five years left on his contract and Arsenal have refused to open any negotiations with Barca over a sale.

He joined the Premier League club as a 16-year-old in 2003 and has made a total of 267 appearances scoring 48 goals.

Maradona 'betrayed'

Diego Maradona accused Argentine soccer chiefs of betraying him on Wednesday, a day after they voted unanimously to end his tenure as national team coach.

The Argentine Football Association (AFA) decided not to renew Maradona's contract following the team's 4-0 drubbing by Germany in the World Cup quarterfinals.

In his first public comments since the defeat, Maradona took aim at AFA President Julio Grondona and the technical director of said. national teams, Carlos Bilardo.

"Grondona lied to me, Bilardo betrayed me," a sombre Maradona told a news conference at a restaurant, reading from a prepared

statement. "Grondona told me in the changing room after we were eliminated in South Africa ... that he was very pleased with the work I'd done and he wanted me to stay on," he said. "When we were in mourning, Bilardo worked in the shad-

ows to kick me out." Maradona, who led Argentina to World Cup victory as captain in 1986, was appointed as coach in 2008 despite having very little coaching experience.

During his tumultuous spell in charge, Maradona was banned for two months for a foul-mouthed outburst at a news conference and the squad barely scraped through the

qualifiers. After convincing wins in their opening World Cup games, Argentina became one of the tournament's favourites, but Maradona's

dreams of lifting soccer's most-coveted prize as coach were dashed by the Germans.

Dressed in a navy suit and blue shirt, Maradona appeared in a reflective mood,

read from the statement.

He said he was still recovering from the loss to Germany but put some of the blame for the patchyWorld Cup campaign on AFA.

"They called me to put out a fire and then when I did, this happens," he said, adding that he had taken over the team during a time of crisis and had been dropped before being able to finish the job. He said he wanted to continue as coach but

that during a meeting with Grondona, the AFA head had asked him to replace seven members of his coaching staff. "He knows it's impossible for me to con-

tinue without my coaching staff, Maradona "I defend everyone from the masseuse to the

assistant because I have values and I'm not going to change." "I've given my all for the Argentine soccer

shirt ... to wear this shirt again ... And I'm convinced that the players felt this again ... maybe that was my job. Grondona said he had asked Maradona to

stay, but said changes had to be made among the coach's staff team. "I can't see how there was a betrayal of any

kind," Grondona told reporters. "Perhaps he sees betrayal as trying to make

things better. ... the only thing I was looking for was to make a change, not to get rid of Maradona."

President Cristina Fernandez, who has backed Maradona's tenure since the World Cup exit, said she was sad he had been dropped.

"He took over the national team when it was a hot potato and lots of people predicted we wouldn't even qualify for South Africa," Fernandez said at the presidential palace.

"I'm really sad about Diego, I think the team put on a very dignified performance," she said. "I don't know what happened (with Grondona) but it saddens me, they should come together and fix things."

Diego sacking upsets president

Argentina President Cristina Kirchner has expressed her sadness at Diego Maradona's sacking as national football coach, saying the star did not deserve his treatment.

Kirchner personally phoned Maradona after his press conference on Wednesday evening during which he lashed out at Argentine Football Federation president Julio Grondona and team manager Carlos Bilardo.

The 49-year-old Maradona has accused Grondona of lying and Bilardo of treason in a bitter attack on the two men he insisted plotted his downfall.

"I'm very saddened by his departure. I thought he was very dignified with the team," said Kirchner. "He always defended the colours of his country with a lot of heart." The captain of the 1986

World Cup winners read from a prepared statement and refused to answer questions at the press conference. "Grondona lied to me.

Bilardo betrayed me," said an emotional Maradona, whose colourful and controversial reign as Argentina coach came to an abrupt end on Tuesday. "They asked me to put out

the fire and we did it. I have given everything. Treason is everywhere. There are people who do not want the best for Argentine football.

"They only have their own personal interests at heart."

Maradona, who took charge in October 2008, has been replaced for the time being by under-20 coach Sergio Batista who will lead the team for the August 11 friendly against the Republic of Ireland in Dublin.

PAOK hold Ajax

Laudrup frustrated

Real Mallorca coach Michael Laudrup and his players and staff have written to UEFA president Michel Platini expressing "great frustration" with the decision to exclude the club from European competition this season.

Financially-troubled Mallorca finished fifth in Spain's La Liga last campaign and qualified for the Europa League but UEFA ruled last week the Balearic Islands club, who are in administration, had not fulfilled the admission criteria.

UEFA did not publish the reasons behind the decision, which Mallorca, who are partowned by tennis world number one and island native Rafa Nadal, have appealed.

"It's very true that our club has problems, in this day and age, who doesn't," read the letter, which was obtained by Reuters and sent to Platini on Wednesday. "Do you think that (Real Mallorca) is in a

worst situation than other clubs that today have been accepted in to European competition? We are reluctant to believe that it's easier (for UEFA) to exclude a modest-sized club.' The letter concludes by arguing that the

club deserve their place in the Europa League after winning qualification on the pitch and urges UEFA to play fair. Mallorca, like many Spanish clubs, have

been slipping further into the red due to rising wage and transfer costs and a recent University of Barcelona study indicated they had debts of around 85 million euros (\$111 million). Nadal became a shareholder in the club

this month and his uncle, former soccer professional Miguel Angel Nadal, is Laudrup's assistant. Rafa Nadal hit out at UEFA on Tuesday,

saying it was "a hell of a blow". Mallorca's place in the Europa League has

provisionally been taken by Villarreal.

Mallorca said on their website (www.rcdmallorca.es) on Wednesday a Socialist deputy in Spain's national parliament sympathetic to the club had demanded the release of data on Villarreal's debts with the tax and social security authorities.

He made his Madrid debut as a 17-year-old in 1994 and stayed with the club since then _ a span that includes three Champions League triumphs, six Spanish league titles and two Intercontinental Cups.

He leaves with 228 league goals for Madrid, and a record 44 goals in 102 appearances for Spain, though he hasn't played for the national team since 2006.

Raul is also the leading scorer in Uefa competitions with 66 goals, including 64 in the Champions League.
