## RMG wage sparks violent protests

Rampaging workers vandalise over 200 business establishments, several factories in city a day after announcement of new pay structure

Several thousand garment workers yesterday rampaged through different parts of the capital and Gazipur rejecting new wage structure and demanding Tk 5,000 minimum wage from August.

The workers damaged around 200 business establishments, including several garment factories, and seven vehicles at Mohakhali, Tejgaon industrial area, Banani Chairmanbari and Gulshan Avenue.

The violent protest yesterday rocked the upscale neighbourhood of Gulshan Avenue, a popular shopping area. Angry workers vandalised a series of shops and smashed the glass fronts of offices on both sides of the avenue.

At least 20 people including five police personnel were injured in yesterday's clashes in Dhaka between law enforcers

Witnesses said around 8:30am about weekend. 4,000 workers blocked the roads at Nabisco in Tejgaon industrial area while some 1,000 others took position near Mohakhali flyover at Chairmanbari, Banani.

Heavily outnumbered, police put barricades on roads and tried to disperse the protestors by charging truncheons and lobbing teargas canisters. The barricades, however, could hardly

hold the agitating workers for long. They started vandalising glass exteriors of many business centres including Navana Tower, Habib Super Market, Jabbar Tower in Gulshan-1, United Commercial Bank at Mohakhali Commercial area and Prime Bank at Amtoli in Mohakhali.

Witnesses said the workers damaged the glass fronts of the establishments, as the business centres were closed for the

Meanwhile, the agitators at Tejgaon Industrial Area swooped on a dyeing factory and brought out a huge volume of fabrics on the street. They set fire to the fabrics.

Security guard Abdul Ali was on duty at . back. an ATM booth in Mohakhali commercial area. He said garment workers hurled brickbats and damaged the booth around 11:30am. He and his two other colleagues were beaten up when they requested the protestors not to damage the booth.

The workers damaged five vehicles including three CNG-run auto rickshaws at Shahid Tajuddin Ahmed Sarani and torched a vehicle at Tejgaon-Gulshan link road and a motorbike near Navana Tower in Gulshan-1.

### Militant den busted in city

Firearms, ammunition, 'explosives', bomb-making materials seized

Police yesterday busted a militants' den at Mirpur in the capital yesterday and seized a firearm, ammunition and bomb-making materials.

They also recovered 35kg of powder which they suspect to be explosives. They sent the powder to Detective Branch of police to know for sure what it is.

They recovered a homemade grenade, 36 grenade cases, a pistol, a sub-machine-carbine, 18 bullets, batteries and wires, 150 to 200 clocks and three bags of metals, which police believe are meant for use as splinters. There were 35 books on jihad and Bengali translation of the holy Quran as well.

None was arrested and police are yet to find out which organisation was behind this.

Officer-in-Charge of Shah Ali Police Station Abdul Latif said the clues indicate that the militants were trying to make time bombs. He said they sent the powder to Detective Branch of police to verify if it was explosive.

The recovery prompted investigators to examine whether the militants, who are yet to be identified, were trying to launch attacks at a time when the trial of war criminals has just begun, police said.

The den was in a rented room in a three-storey building on Road-10 of Uttar Bishil in Mirpur.

Landlord Musharraf Hossain discovered sacks and clothwrapped packages containing arms and powder in the rented **SEE PAGE 15 COL 6** 

### Errors in BCS exam papers

Errors and inconsistencies have crept into a set of question papers for a preliminary test, designed for examinees to qualify for the 30th Bangladesh Civil Service exams.

There were three sets of

question papers, but more than half of the queries in the English section of Set-2 were misplaced, which created confusion among examinees. The test was held at 110

centres in six divisional headquarters with about 147,988 applicants vying for 2,572 posts under three cadres yesterday. Some questions in the set,

codenamed Makar, had wrongly been put below the answers. The English section in each set has 20 questions. A number of examinees, who got set-2, said many did

not answer some questions -out of confusion -- since there is a negative marking for any wrong answer. However, no such error was

found in the other two sets.

## SC for amendment to ensure efficacy

The Appellate Division of Supreme Court seeks restoration of two articles of the 1972 constitution, for making separation of the state's judiciary from the executive branch effective.

The lower judiciary was officially separated from the executive branch on November 1, 2007 following the Appellate Division's directives in a case known as "Masdar Hossain's

constitution was not amended to ensure effective separation.

Upholding the High Court's verdict that declared the fifth amendment to the constitution illegal, the apex court is now saying, "It is our earnest hope that articles 115 and 116 of the constitution will be restored to their original position by the parliament as soon as possible."

Independence of the judiciary, which is one of the basic features of the constitution, will not be fully achieved unless the articles are restored to their original position, the court stated.

He also said the owners will reopen their factories today as Labour and Employment Minister Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain assured

them of security. The owners did not expect such mayhem in the garment industry as the wage board was formed comprising all stakeholders.

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# Bus stops at wrong places create mess

#### 223 unauthorised bus stops in city

Wrongly planned bus stops and absence of bus-bays at busy locations are two major factors behind the nagging traffic congestion in the capital, experts say.

Currently, the city has around 223 authorised bus stops, a large number of which have been situated on important road intersections ham-

pering smooth vehicular movement. Sources from traffic department say Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) approves bus stops solely on the basis

allegedly manipulate the situation for their own benefit.

In addition, the traffic department ignores recommendations of Dhaka Transport Coordination Board (DTCB) during location selection,

insiders say. Besides, public buses frequently ignore the scheduled stops selected by the owners themselves. Haphazard parking, picking up or dropping passengers at any point, even in the middle of roads, continue unabated creating inconvenience for everyone.

Daily Star a study recommended 347 locations for bus stops in the capital two years ago. The recommendations also included designs for possible bus-bays.

"The recommendation was ignored by both DMP and Dhaka City Corporation," said Salehuddin, also a traffic engineering expert.

"Bus stops around road intersections are bound to create problems. What we see in Dhaka city is sheer chaos," Dr Salehuddin observed.

The DTCB official sees no option Dr SM Salehuddin, additional but to create dedicated bus-bays,

#### Nigerian held at airport with 'drugs'

Immigration personnel at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in the capital yesterday detained a Nigerian national with six kilograms of white powder which, they think, is heroin.

He was caught around 7:00pm at gate-3 of the airport with five luggage and identified as Afolayan-o-Zaccheaus. He was scheduled to fly to Malaysia today. An immigration official

preferring anonymity said that while the detainee was crossing the gate with another Nigerian, the scanner indicator signalled the presence of some metallic things insides the luggage. As civil aviation officials

challenged him, his aide fled the scene but he could not escape. Immigration officials

found 58 small foil packs with white powder inside a total of 10 aluminum packs, his four passports and one ID card. Three passports mention
