BCB to use UDRS during NZ tour

The board of directors of the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) have extended the tenure of the Rafiqul Alam-led selection panel by another three months.

The interesting decision was taken during the marathon board meeting held on Thursday.

"The last contract of the national selectors expired last June and now it is extended up to September 30. Hopefully we will appoint all the supporting staff of the national team by next September and at that time we also extended the tenure of the national selectors for a long period of time," said BCB media committee chairman Jalal Yunus while explaining the reason behind the short tenure.

But reliable sources said that most of the directors were not happy with the performance of the present selection committee, particularly they are unsatisfied with chief selector Rafiqul Alam's performance.

The three-member selection panel has been under tremendous pressure after the Tigers' ignominious defeats against Ireland and the Netherlands. Despite the defeats, the chief selector still believed that the team is improving be responsible for looking after the which has disappointed many.

The sources said that board would even change the chief selector if they got a suitable candidate for the hot seat.

BCB have also decided to assign sports psychologist Dr Soumendra Saha, who is a professor at the Department of Sports Science at the University Sains Malaysia, as a consultant for the national cricket team while the evaluation committee has given the right to propose the name of fielding and a bowling coach.

National tam computer analyst Nasir Ahmed's contract has been extended till June 30 next year while the board approved the appointments of Manzur Ahmed as BCB CEO and Rafiqul Islam as CFO.

The domestic calendar was supposed to be approved in this meeting but the board directors advised the concerned authority to arrange the longer-version cricket after the 2011 World Cup.

"We want to put emphasis on oneday cricket before the World Cup and that's why it was advised to bring some changes in the calendar," informed

It was also decided that BCB senior vice-president Mahbubul Anam will operations of the Bangladesh A team while BCB director Gazi Ashraf Hossain has been given the responsibility of overseeing the GP-BCB National Cricket Academy in the capacity of chairman.

"Everybody admitted that there is a huge vacuum in the pipeline and we must give proper attention to the A team and Academy to make sure there is ample supply in the pipeline. They were designated to look after the A team and Academy respectively and prepare the course of action with the help of the game development committee," said Yunus.

Meanwhile, BCB has decided to use the Umpires Decision Referrals System (UDRS) during the Test series against New Zealand in October.

New Zealand is expected to arrive in Dhaka on September 20 to play two Tests and three ODIs.

The BCB Welfare Trust constitution has also been approved. There had been much talk over the Tigers poor showing against Ireland and Netherlands but the meeting had hardly focused on the issue ultimately.

England v Pakistan First Test, Day Three Live from 4:00pm

Pakistan rattled

England birthday boy James Anderson and rookie pace bowler Steven Finn ripped through Pakistan's batting to reduce them to 90 for six at tea on the second day of the first

test at Trent Bridge on Friday. Anderson, who turned 28, utilised the cloud cover to take three for 21 while Finn claimed three for 12 in seven overs as former Pakistan captain Shoaib Malik was 26 not out and number eight batsman Mohammad Aamer was on 22.

Pakistan trailed by 264 runs at the break and needed 65 to avoid the follow-on, in front of a sold-out crowd that had witnessed 12 wickets for 113 runs in a pulsating day where ball dominated bat.

England had earlier lost their last six wickets for 17 runs but still were able to post a competitive first-innings total of 354 as Mohammad Asif claimed five for 77 after some accurate out-swing bowling. Eoin Morgan made 130 and Paul Collingwood 82.

Pakistan, seeking to avenge their 3-0 series loss in England in 2006, started badly by losing their captain and most dependable batsman Salman Butt before lunch, caught behind for one. Then, in a bizarre period, they lost five wickets for 15 runs, collapsing to 47 for six.

Left-hander Imran Farhat (19) was bowled by a nearperfect Anderson delivery that

swung into him only to straighten off the pitch. Farhat smashed his bat into the ground in anger but better players would have struggled to combat such a ball.

Umar Amin (2), in his third test, continued to struggle in the top arena and edged Finn to Graeme Swann at second slip.

Azhar Ali (14), also in his third test, was given out caught behind off Anderson

but replays showed that the ball missed his bat and flicked the pocket of his trousers.

With two referrals in hand, it was surprising that Azhar did not choose to review his dismissal having had a midpitch discussion with partner Umar Akmal. Pakistan still had those reviews in place by the interval.

Sachin opposes UDRS

The Umpire Decision Review System may have its share of supporters but Indian batting maestro Sachin Tendulkar gave a thumbs down to UDRS, saying he was not fully convinced with the controversial referral system. Tendulkar said instead of UDRS, he was more in favour of the usage of new 'Hot-Spot' technology, which is an infra-red imaging system used in cricket to determine whether the ball has struck the batsman, bat or pad.

"I am not fully convinced with the referral system (UDRS). When I was here last time I was not convinced with many decisions. I did not feel comfortable, it was an experiment which I felt," Tendulkar said after notching up his fifth double hundred in Tests.

"I would rather go with the Hot Spot because that establishes the contact between the bat and the bowl. That it is far better system accord-

ing to me. The Hot Spot is much better," he said. The UDRS has recently got some supporters in Australian captain Ricky Ponting, Sri Lankan spin legend Muttiah Muralidaran and former ICC

umpire Rudi Koertzen, who called for the use of the system in every Test match. Tendulkar guided India with a classy 203 and helped his side end day four of the second Test at 669 for nine in reply to Sri Lanka's first innings score of 642 for four declared at a placid Sinhalese Sports Club wicket.

"When I was in the middle, it was important to go for a partnership and I am happy the way we played well. I was tempted to play my shots but at that time the match was at a critical situation and we had to hang in there," said the champion batsman.

With over 1300 runs scored in four days at the loss of just 13 wickets, he said the SSC wicket was not an ideal pitch for Test cricket.

"From a batsmen's point of view the pitch is definitely the best in the world. It is a batting paradise but it is not result oriented. It is a tough track to bowl on," Tendulkar said.

Although he is 37, Tendulkar is still going strong and the right-hander said it is his love for the game that keeps him fresh and rejuvenated all the time.

"I am enjoying every bit of it. I don't count the number of runs that I scored. It is nice to score runs and I am enjoying as much being in the middle as it is being in the past. It is fantastic," he said.

Siddikur takes surprise lead

Unheralded Siddikur Rahman of Bangladesh gave himself a shot at a historic victory after taking a two-shot halfway lead at the Brunei Open on Friday.

Siddikur, who is the first Bangladeshi to play on the Asian Tour, posted a fourunder-par 67 for his career's best two-day total of 11-underpar 131 at the majestic Empire Hotel and Country Club.

Overnight leader Thammanoon Srirot of Thailand slipped to joint second place after a 71 for a total of 133 along with Australian Adam Groom, who returned a 68 at the 300,000dollar full field Asian Tour tournament.

Juvic Pagunsan of the Philippines, Ben Leong of Malaysia and Jbe Kruger of South Africa are a further stroke behind on 134.

India's Gaganjeet Bhullar, last year's runner-up in Brunei, scored the third hole-in-one of the tournament on the 14th hole after his five-iron tee shot trickled into the hole. He closed with a 68 for a 137 total.

Siddikur, who grew up as a ball boy in Dhaka and fashioned his first club with a seven iron head on a metal rod, posted a flawless round with

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Colombo Test ends in a draw

The second Test between India and Sri Lanka ended in a high-scoring draw on Friday after the bat dominated the ball on a featherbed wicket for five days.

India posted their second-highest total ever when they made 707 in reply to Sri Lanka's mammoth first innings score of 642-4 declared on the fifth morning at the Sinhalese Sports Club.

The total was just 19 runs short of India's Test record of 726-9 declared against the same opposition at the Brabourne Stadium in Mumbai last year. Sri Lanka, trailing by 65 runs on the first

innings, made 129-3 in their second knock before play was called off an hour early with skipper Kumar Sangakkara on 42 and Thilan Samaraweera on 10. The match was a poor advertisement for

Test cricket in which 1,478 runs were scored for the loss of just 17 wickets on a flat pitch that offered no assistance to the bowlers.

There were five three-figure knocks over the five days, two of them double-centuries by

Sangakkara and Sachin Tendulkar, besides a 99 from Indian opener Virender Sehwag. Sri Lanka now head for the final Test at the P.

Sara Oval from Tuesday enjoying a 1-0 lead in the series after winning the first match in Galle by 10 wickets. India's last-wicket pair of Ishant Sharma and Pragyan Ojha, who resumed at the over-

night score of 669-9, batted until 20 minutes before lunch to put on a partnership of 39 runs. Sharma finally fell for 27, caught in the gully region off fast bowler Dilhara Fernando, leaving

Ojha unbeaten on 18. All four frontline Sri Lankan bowlers conceded more than 100 runs in India's innings,

with debutant off-spinner Suraj Randiv going for 2-222 from 73 overs. Unorthodox spinner Ajantha Mendis finished with 4-172, fast bowler Dilhara Fernando
