BFF facing field limbo

The Bangladesh Football Federation's (BFF's) plan to start the upcoming season in October may face a huge obstacle due to the unavailability of country's premium venue, Bangabandhu National Stadium, following the renovation works ahead of the 2011 ICCWorld Cup. The BNS is being prepared to host

the opening ceremony of the cricket World Cup on February 17 and the multipurpose venue is supposed to be handed over to the International Cricket Council by late October, although the National Sports Council (NSC) has already sought one more month to complete renovation work.

The Bangladesh League committee has already announced that they would begin this season in between October 10 to 15 through the Super Cup or the Federation Cup following the inter-club players' transfer, which will take place on September 1-20. Keeping the Bangabandhu National

Stadium in mind, the game's governing body is also planning to reveal its annual calendar by August, but the fact remains that they are not fully aware of the availability of the country's premium venue.

It seems that the start of football

season would not be possible before the completion of the ICC World Cup opening ceremony if they want to roll football through a curtain-raising tournament at the BNS.

"The renovation works at the BNS has been going on full swing and the venue is supposed to be handed over by October," NSC director (planning and development) Abdur Rahman said. "I don't think it is possible to hand it

over to football." NSC assistant director (planning and

development) Habibur Rahman said that they had verbally informed BFF vice president Badal Roy about the situation.

"If the BFF wants to use the venue for a two-week period to hold a big tournament such as the Super Cup, they would not get the facilities of the players' dressing rooms, the media box and the VIP galleries where the renovation works are currently progressing," said Rahman.

The football's governing body is seemingly in the dark about the venue and is still holding on to the promise of sports minister Ahad Ali Sarkar, who had told BFF president Kazi Salahuddin that they needed the venue for only 40 days preceding the event.

"The NSC has been given our annual roster and they know about our main competitions so we hope to get the venue on time," said BFF general secretary Al Musabbir Sadi.

Dhoni to wait till toss

India-SL third & final Test starts today

India's hopes of scoring a series-levelling win in the final Test against Sri Lanka from Tuesday sank as Gautam Gambhir was ruled out and with Harbhajan Singh unlikely to play.

Opener Gambhir has not recovered from a knee injury that kept him out of the drawn second Test, while bowling spearhead Harbhajan was down with a side strain and calfinjury.

"Gautam is out of the match and Harbhajan is also very doubtful," Indian captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni said after the team's pre-match training session at the P Sara Oval in Colombo on Monday.

Murali Vijay, who came in for Gambhir for the second Test and scored 58 during a first-wicket stand of 165 with Virender Sehwag, will once again open the batting.

Leg-spinner Amit Mishra is expected to replace off-spinner Harbhajan, who

Malinga and Muralidaran claimed 15 of the 20 scalps during the emphatic win in Galle, before the off-spinner bowed out of Test cricket with an unprecedented haul of 800 wickets.

"Malinga is back and strong and he had a good bowl at the nets," said Sri Lankan captain Kumar Sangakkara, adding the team will be named on Tuesday morning.

Both captains agreed the P Sara Oval pitch will be different from the featherbed prepared for the second Test at the Sinhalese Sports Club, where 1,478 runs were scored for the loss of just 17 wickets.

"There will be a bit of bounce in it," said Dhoni. "There is a bit of grass, but the surface looks hard and will have bounce and carry for the bowlers."

Sangakkara, calling it a "pretty good wicket", added: "A lot will depend on how you play on it because looks can sometimes be deceptive. But I think there will be a result."

Pakistan responded to their crushing 354 run first Test defeat by England at Trent Bridge on Sunday by recalling former captain Mohammad Yousuf and so ending the batsman's international exile. The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) also

announced leg-spinner Danish

Kaneria had been released back to English county side Essex ahead of the second Test at Edgbaston, which starts on Friday. A brief statement issued by

the PCB in Lahore said: "Danish Kaneria is released from the national team and he is now available to play for his county Essex. His services will be available for national squad if required.

"Mohammad Yousuf and Raza Hasan (a left-arm spinner) are added to the national squad with immediate effect."

Yousuf, a batsman of proven Test-class, announced his retirement from international cricket in March, having been handed an indef-

trous tour of Australia where the team failed to win a single international match. His recall came just hours after Pakistan

were bowled out for 80 - their lowest ever Test total against England - at Trent Bridge. Yousuf effectively took the spot of the

previously unreplaced Shahid Afridi, who announced his intention to quit Test cricket after captaining Pakistan to a 150-run loss against Australia at Lord's last month and was then ruled out of the

Yousuf, 35, has scored 7,431 Test runs, including 22 hundreds, at an average of

Vivian Richards's 30-year-old record for most Test runs in a calendar year with 1,788 in 11 matches, including nine hundreds, at a staggering average of 99.33.

The tournament director of the 2011 World Cup, Ratnakar Shetty, has said that the development of the stadiums was on schedule and that the governments of the host countries - India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh - were working together to ensure an "inci-

dent free" competition. Several venues in India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka are being redeveloped or constructed from scratch and Shetty was confident they would be ready before the December 31 deadline.

"We are monitoring the development of all the World Cup venues, particularly the redevelopment of stadiums. The events are properly chartered and time is of the essence for us," Shetty said. "The World Cup has been previously held in the subcontinent in 1987 and 1996, and our aim is to deliver a World Cup remembered as a memorable event for spectators to enjoy and the teams that are participating to be at full strength."

"How time flies. I still remember my first Test against Pakistan. And when the rough patches came, I found the reason to work harder. I spent all my energy trying to iron out my shortcomings.
