# SL stack up the runs

Sri Lanka captain Kumar Sangakkara top-scored with 75 as the hosts prospered against an untidy Indian attack on the opening day of the third and final Test on Tuesday.

Former skipper Mahela Jayawardene made 56 and Thilan Samaraweera remained unbeaten on 65 as Sri Lanka, leading 1-0 in the series, piled up 293-4 by stumps at the P. Sara Oval in Colombo.

All-rounder Angelo Mathews was the other batsman at the crease on 26, having put on 52 runs so far for the fifth wicket with Samaraweera.

Sangakkara, who won his third successive toss and decided to take first strike on the even-paced wicket, missed out on a third century

in the series. The left-hander, who made 103 in the first Test and 219 and 42 not out in the second, looked set for another big

Ojha, the most successful bowler of the day with 2-78, sent down four no-balls. Seamer Ishant Sharma bowled three and Sehwag one, while Abhimanyu Mithun conceded two wides.

Sangakkara was given a reprieve on 23 when third slip Suresh Raina lunged to his right and dropped the ball that was carrying comfortably to Venkatsai Laxman at second slip. Mithun was the unlucky bowler.

Jayawardene, who put on 84 for the fourth wicket with Samaraweera, was unlucky to be given out leg-before by Australian umpire Rod Tucker in the final session.

Television replays indicated the ball from Ojha would have passed over the stumps.

Sri Lanka's assistant coach, Stuart Law, said he expected a keen tussle between bat and ball over the next four days.

"This wicket has something for everyone," the former Australian international said. "If you bat well, you score runs and we have already seen balls flying pass the edge off both seamers and spinners.

"It's going to be a test for the skills of the batsmen. I am very happy with the way things went for us and hopefully this will set us up for a big first innings total.

"The closer we get to 500, it sets up for a good victory."

Sri Lanka, batting almost the entire day in overcast conditions, lost both openers in the morning session to go to lunch on 102-2.

Tharanga Paranavitana, who also hit centuries in each of the previous two Tests, fell for eight when he edged Sharma to wicketkeeper Mahendra Singh Dhoni.

Tillakaratne Dilshan (41) added 87 for the second wicket with Sangakkara, before he was run out off what turned out to be the last ball of the

morning session. Meanwhile, Indian star Sachin Tendulkar's 169th Test made him the most-capped player in history, surpassing former Australian captain Steve Waugh's tally of 168 appearances.

India went into the decisive Test without the injured Gautam Gambhir and Harbhajan, while Raina, who hit a century on his debut in the last match, was preferred over Yuvraj Singh for the number six spot.

Fit-again fast bowler Lasith Malinga returned for Sri Lanka along with left-arm seamer Chanaka Welegedara. They replaced Dilhara Fernando and Dammika Prasad, who shared the new ball in the

second Test.

## Another record falls for Sachin

Milestone man Sachin Tendulkar on Tuesday became the most-capped Test cricketer in the world after taking field for his 169th match, the third and final of the ongoing series against Sri Lanka, at the P Sara Oval in Colombo.

The 37-year-old champion batsman, who holds almost every batting record, overtook retired former Australian captain Steve Waugh with whom he was tied at 168 matches after

the second Test at SSC. Tendulkar, who has been around for two decades now, has also played 442 one-day internationals, just a couple of

matches less than Sri Lankan Sanath Jayasuriya's record of Tendulkar has scored 13,742 runs in 168 Tests at an average of 56.08, notching up 48 hundreds and 55 half-centuries in the

process. He has 17,598 runs, including 46 centuries, in his 442 onedayers. The Mumbaikar also holds the distinction of being the first batsman to score a double hundred in ODIs.

But despite these astonishing feats, Tendulkar remains hungry for more runs and after getting his fifth Test double hundred in the second Test against Sri Lanka, the diminutive batsman urged critics to stop talking about his age.

### BCB call up 21 cricketers

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has called up twentyone cricketers for a conditioning camp that will start from today at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

The selected players have been asked to report to the national team's assistant coach Khaled Mahmud at 2:30pm at Mirpur. Most of the national cricket-

ers are now enjoying holidays after an arduous season and they will be back to business when a preparation camp with a preliminary squad will kick off for the 2011 World Cup.

"Basically the board arranged the camp for the players who were out of the national team and as well as players like Mohammad Ashraful who didn't play enough match in the last few tours," said former national captain Mahmud.

"We will mainly focus on the fitness but work on the skill as well, especially with the bowlers. Our bowling has been struggling in the last couple of series and I believe this was because of the inexperience.

"We have to work hard for a

long period of time to improve the bowling. All the bowlers are talented but they haven't had enough international experience to cope up with the pressure," he said adding that the preparation camp for the national cricketers is likely to start from August 20. BCB's cricket operations

committee chairman Enayet Hossain Siraj informed yesterday that they will take a decision on the probables after the return of coach Jamie Siddons, who is enjoying a vacation in Australia.

One of the national selectors however said that they gave the probable names more than a month back.

"We may start the camp for the World Cup with twenty-five selected cricketers. The decision will be taken after return of the national coach," said Siraj.
