China mudslides leave 127 dead, 2,000 missing

At least 127 people were killed and nearly 2,000 missing after mudslides swept away homes and destroyed roads in northwestern China as the nation battled its worst flooding in a decade.

At least one village was buried entirely and deep rivers of sludge and rocks were hampering rescue efforts in the devastated region of Gansu province, where about 45,000 people have been evacuated, the government and state media said yesterday.

Authorities have sent more than 4,500 soldiers, police, fire-fighters and medics to help in search and rescue efforts after the landslides in the remote ethnically Tibetan region, triggered by a deluge of rain late Saturday.

Premier Wen Jiabao arrived in the mountainous region on Sunday after he and President Hu Jintao urged rescuers -- some using their bare hands -- to spare no effort to save lives in the latest natural disaster to strike the country.

At least 50,000 people have been affected by floods which submerged half of Zhouqu county at one point, the official Xinhua news agency said, citing Mao Shengwu, head of the affected Gannan prefecture.

The landslides -- which struck around midnight when many people would have been debris into a river running through the county, blocking the waterway and triggering flooding in the valley, the government said.

One village was buried by the mudslides that levelled an area five kilometres (three miles) long and 500 metres (yards) wide, Xinhua said, as floodwaters reached as high as three storeys at one point.

State television broadcast images of local residents walking through streets clogged with mud and debris and pictures of buildings swept off their foundations or destroyed by the mudslides and flooding.

Other images showed buildings and vehicles partly submerged by muddy water and soldiers and local residents frantically shovelling mud as they searched for the missing.

One image showed a four-storey building

with the first three floors buried in mud.

Reports said more than 680 people had been rescued so far, many of them stranded on top of buildings where they had fled to escape the floodwaters.

So far rescuers have not been able to use heavy machinery because of the sludge, relying instead on shovels and their bare hands to search for survivors, Xinhua said.

"It's very hard to locate the people washed away by floods. It's hard to say what their chances of survival are," said He Youxin, whose rescue team had so far saved 23 people and recovered 15 bodies.

Reports said 76 people had also been injured. Torrential downpours had stopped, reports said, but the local weather bureau has forecast more rain in the coming days.

"The water of the Bailong River flowed into the county seat and many people were trapped," said Diemujiangteng, the head of

Zhouqu county. "Now the sludge has become the biggest problem to rescue operations. It's too thick to

walk or drive through." Some roads were covered with sludge as deep as two metres, Xinhua said.

More than 300 houses were buried in the landslides which destroyed roads and bridges asleep -- swept mud, houses, cars and other and tore apart buildings while telecommunications, water, electricity and transport links have been cut in parts of the region.

"Someone said the fifth floor of my residential building has been submerged. People are busy looking for their family members and friends," local resident Li Tiankui was quoted by Xinhua as saying.

Authorities have sent electricity generators, tents, instant noodles and bottled water to the region, about one third of whose residents are ethnic Tibetans, the report said.

According to government figures issued before the latest disaster, the number of people killed or missing in floods across China this year has risen to more than 2,100.

China's civil affairs ministry said Friday more than 12 million had been evacuated from their homes.

Stolen brides and life in exile from Chechnya

Over the years, large numbers of Chechens have fled Chechnya and are making lives elsewhere. Many have chosen to leave, but others have been given no choice.

As Zulikhan stepped on board, one of the guests thrust a bouquet of flowers into her arms. "For our new bride," he winked.

It was Zulikhan's first outing as a married woman. A month ago, on her way home from college in the Chechen capital Grozny, she was snatched off the street and bundled into a car by a man she barely knew.

A week later, she was Bogdan Khazhiev's wife.

Straight after the wedding he took her to Pavlodar in northern Kazakhstan and installed her in a couple of sparsely furnished rooms above his parents' flat.

And now here she was, nearly 3,100 miles (5,000km) from home, sailing down a river in Kazakhstan.

But it was an idyllic summer's day and as the boat cut through the sun-flecked water, Zulikhan seemed resigned to her fate. She sat demurely on the top deck with a group of mothers and babies.

Meanwhile Bogdan, an aspiring businessman in mirror shades, was having lunch below deck with his cousin, Sultan. The cousin explained that he too had

kidnapped his wife. "It's the law of our grandfathers," he

said. "We have to respect our Chechen traditions. In a separate cabin, the grandfathers

were sitting at a banquet table covered with plates of wild garlic and grilled meat. But the food went untouched as the oldest man began to speak. He wanted to talk about what hap-

pened 66 years ago when Stalin deported the entire Chechen people from the Caucasus to Central Asia.



The old man was just 11 at the time, but says the date of 23 February, 1944 is forever etched in his memory.

It was Red Army Day and men from each village were invited to take part.

"But when my father reached the main square there was no parade," he said.

"Instead he was surrounded by soldiers with

machine guns." Then the soldiers went from house to house to round up women, children and the elderly.

"We had very little time to collect our things," he said. "My mother was numb with shock but she managed to grab a chicken and some bread. I remember how she cried when we had to leave our cows behind."

At the station the deportees were herded into cattle wagons. Many perished over the next three weeks as they rumbled eastwards into exile.

"It was dark in there and the smell was terrible. When people died soldiers just threw the corpses out of the train.

All white candidates in Australian polls

Despite its Aboriginal roots and a large Asian population, Australia's politics are almost exclusively white with just a handful of ethnic minority candidates in this month's elections.

Australia's diversity -- from Outback townships to Sydney's Chinatown and growing numbers of South and Southeast Asians -- is poorly reflected in its leaders, who remain typically Caucasian, middle-aged and male.

Malaysian-born Senator Penny Wong is the government's lone Asian face, while the candidates of both major parties include only half a dozen of obvious Asian ancestry, from a list of more than 300. Labor's Tauto Sansbury is the only Aboriginal candidate,

highlighting the extent to which native Australians, whose history on the continent stretches back tens of thousands of years, are sidelined. "I'm doing this to try and create a lot more interest from the Aboriginal community that we have a place in politics and that

there should be more people like myself running for politics," he Australia's history is steeped in Asian immigration, from Gold Rush Chinese miners and Japanese pearl-divers of the late

1800s, to Vietnamese refugees and Chinese students given residency after the Tiananmen Square massacre. More recently, large numbers of Chinese and Indian students have settled here, along with smaller groups of Indonesian, Timorese, Sri Lankan and Afghan asylum-seekers, pushing

Australia's Asian population to about 10 percent. Liberal candidate John Nguyen exemplifies the trend, after fleeing war-torn Vietnam on a rickety boat aged five and arriving in Australia via a Malaysian refugee camp in 1980.

"I don't remember everything but I remember bits and pieces. I remember being attacked by pirates -- we were attacked seven times," he said.

Nguyen, who is standing in Melbourne's ethnically diverse seat of Chisholm, said a less monochrome government could help Australia's standing in the region, where it is often regarded as white-dominated and anti-immigration.

"I know a lot of people from Singapore, Malaysia and Hong Kong. They still talk about the Pauline Hanson episode, which is

quite unfortunate," he said. "They say Australia is a country that is not tolerant of

migrants, which is totally untrue because Australia is a country of migrants." Hanson was elected to parliament on an anti-immigration

platform in 1996, and told the lower house that Australia was in danger of being "swamped by Asians" in her maiden speech. The country also suffers from memories of the "White

Australia" policy, which restricted Asian immigration until the mid-1970s.

KSA delays BlackBerry ban to test 'solutions'

Saudi's telecoms regulator has said it postponed a ban on BlackBerry until Monday so that suggested solutions to the kingdom's security concerns offered by the Canadian maker can be tested.

The Communications and Information Technology Commission (CITC) said the 48 hours grace period, ending Monday evening, was given "to test the suggested solutions," according to a statement carried by SPA state news agency late Saturday.

The decision was also based on the "ongoing efforts by the providers of mobile services to meet the requirements of the commission's regulations."

three mobile services providers said Saturday. The Saudi-owned Al-Arabiya television said that RIM has agreed in principle to grant access to Saudi authorities to deci-

pher its messenger exchanges between users. A special server for the messenger services is to be set up in the highly security-conscious Gulf state, birthplace of al-Qaeda and its leader Osama bin Laden, according to Al-Arabiya.

The Saudi telecommunications authority announced a few days ago that it had ordered mobile providers to block key BlackBerry services as of August 6 or face a 1.3-million-dollar fine.

The regulator had said the suspension was because "the way BlackBerry services are provided currently does not meet the regulatory criteria of the commission and the licensing conditions."

Santos sworn in as Colombian president

Juan Manuel Santos has been sworn in as the new president of Colombia.

In his inaugural speech, Santos said that mending relations with neighbours Ecuador and Venezuela would be one of his government's main priorities. In response, Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez said he

would like to meet "face-to-face" with Santos. Santos also told Colombia's left-wing rebel groups the door

to dialogue was open, but they would have to renounce violence first. He promised to tackle the main problems besetting

Colombians, saying his government would aim to lower unemployment to a single digit figure, fight corruption and reduce poverty. He said the work of his predecessor in office, President

Alvaro Uribe, had paved the way for "a new dawn for Colombia". Santos, who served as Uribe's defence minister, said the

former president had inspired hope in Colombians and allowed them to move freely in their own country again.

He said it was now time the country moved from Uribe's policy of "democratic security" to one of "democratic prosperity".
