Cancellation decision under JS scanner

A parliamentary body yesterday formed a four-member sub-committee to verify whether Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission's (BTRC) step to cancel licences of five private landline operators was justified.

WORLD BANK REPORT

Madrasa teachers mostly untrained

Teachers with no formal training mostly staff the Qawmi madrasas in Bangladesh, said a World Bank (WB) report.

A staggering 82 percent of math teachers there are untrained. Around 80 percent English teachers in Qawmi madrasas are untrained while it is 44 percent in Aliyah madrasas and 19 percent in general schools, the report said.

The WB yesterday arranged a publication ceremony of the report styled "Secondary School Madrasa in Bangladesh: Incidence, quality and implication for reform" at a city hotel.

M Niaz Asadullah, lecturer of Department of Economics of Reading University and a visiting fellow of Oxford University, presented the key findings of the study at the ceremony.

The study found that although the madrasas have played a significant role in increasing student's enrolment in institutions, the quality

of higher secondary level madrasa education remains a major challenge. According to it, at secondary level nearly one out of five children attends madrasas, mostly in registered ones.

It, however, said the overall quality of secondary level education across the country is low and urged the government to focus more on the sector to improve the standard of education in Bangladesh.

The report suggested that the government engages in a dialogue with Qawmi madrasa representatives to explore options such as introducing modern subjects and forming of a regulatory body to oversee the overall improvement.

The research team administered four tests to over 9,000 grade-VIII students of 400 secondary schools and madrasas to assess their learning outcomes. They found that on an average the students answered 35 percent math questions correctly. The success rate is even poorer

CURBING PRICE HIKE

JS body unhappy at govt efforts

Expressing dissatisfaction over the government's attempts to prevent a price hike of essentials during the upcoming month of Ramadan, a parliamentary body yesterday said the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) does not have enough stock on hand.

Regarding the initiatives of the commerce ministry, the parliamentary body said there are some shortcomings in the TCB's activities to control the prices.

The House watchdog directed the TCB to ensure that the stock consisted of adequate amount of daily necessities like sugar, edible oil, lentils, and onions.

"The TCB should have at least ten times the amount of sugar and other essentials than the present stock they hold," Lutful Hai, chief of the House body told journalists after the meeting at Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban.

Hai, also a ruling AL lawmaker said TCB carries 50,000 tonnes of sugar at present and 50,000 tonnes more are being imported soon. However, during Ramadan, the cumulative demand of sugar rises to nearly 1.25 lakh tonnes, which far surpasses the current stock.

"We have asked the ministry to continue monitoring the

Robbers shoot villager dead

One from the gang beaten to death

A robber was beaten to death by a mob after a gang of robber shot a villager dead and injured 10 others at Deputy Ghona village in Banskhali upazila of Chittagong early yesterday. Local people chased a gang of 10 to 15 armed bandits, when

they were passing through the village at about 1:30am, police said. Sensing danger, the robbers opened fire on the villagers, leaving Abul Hossain, 70, critically injured. He died on the way to the local upazila health complex.

During chase and counter-chase, locals managed to catch Abu Sayed, 45, one of the bandits, and severely beat him to death.

At least 10 people were injured when the gang opened fire and threw brick chips at the villagers.

Abu Taher, 35, one of the injured villagers, was admitted to Chittagong Medical College Hospital with bullet injuries.

SM Ataur Rahman, officer-in-charge of Banskhali Police Station, said the gang might have planned to commit robbery in the adjoining areas.

Police were conducting raids in the area to nab other mem-

bers of the gang, he added.
