US backs Myanmar war crimes probes

The United States supports forming an international commission to probe possible war crimes and crimes against humanity by Myanmar's military rulers, a senior administration official said on Wednesday.

The decision comes after months of fruitless diplomacy by President Barack Obama's administration, which had offered greater engagement in an effort to win democratic concessions from

Myanmar, formerly known as Burma. "The United States supports establishing an international commission of inquiry to investigate alleged war crimes and crimes against

humanity in Burma," the official said. "We will consult with a broad array of stakeholders and key players to determine how best to achieve that end."

In March, a United Nations investigator into Myanmar's human rights record called for the formation of the commission, saying the military government of the isolated Southeast Asian nation had a pattern of gross and systematic violations of fundamental freedoms of its citi-

Myanmar's now-defunct National League for Democracy, led by detained Nobel Peace laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, said in March it would: boycott the polls because of unjust election laws and imprisonment of many of its members.

Last year, Washington offered Myanmar a fresh start in trying to improve strained relations. But U.S. officials have been disappointed by the junta's refusal to budge on key sticking points involving democratic reforms as well as growing concern over its nuclear ambitions.

Nepal's central bank calls time on ex-king's face

stepped down from the throne, his face is finally to disappear from the country's banknotes, the central bank said yesterday.

Nepal replaced former king Gyanendra's face with a picture of Mount Everest on all new currency in 2007 after parliament voted to abolish the 240-year-old Hindu monarchy.

But old notes bearing the portrait of the unpopular former monarch have remained in circulation.

Central bank spokesman Gopal Kaphle said the old notes would be phased out by the end of the current Nepalese year, which falls in mid-

"We are trying to circulate clean notes. The More than two years after Nepal's last king old notes will be replaced by new notes, and we are getting rid of notes with a picture of the former monarch," Kaphle told AFP.

> Former king Gyanendra left the throne in June 2008 when the then Maoist-led government declared the country a secular republic.

Revered by supporters as a living incarnation of a Hindu god, he lost the support of many Nepalese when he seized direct rule in 2006 following Maoist protests.

The Maoists waged a 10-year insurgency against the monarchy before winning elections in 2008 and forming a government.

PAKISTAN FLOOD

'Corrupt' govt prevents overseas Pak-Muslims from donating funds

Despite millions of Pakistanis struggling to battle the devastating floods, and the government's fervent pleas to the international community to rush in more funds to help the victims, many Pakistanis living in the US have stayed away from making any kind of donations, as they believe that their money would be misappropriated by the corrupt government.

A majority of Pakistanis in the US do not trust the Gilani government, and have thereby declined to help their countrymen in need.

"The money might reach a quarter of the people who really need it. The doctor and I were discussing the flood, there is just so much corruption," The Christian Science Monitor quoted one Mussarat Khan, as saying. Fed up with the response of corrupt officials,

The slow response of the donors has worried charity organisations.

"There has been a tepid response, it is down significantly from other disasters of recent times," said Ken Berger, president of Charity Navigator, an evaluator of charities.

"There could be a host of different reasons from donor fatigue to people not feeling comfortable because of their concerns about terrorism," Berger added.

Zakat Foundation of America in Chicago, Executive Director Halil Demir also said that donations have been "very slow," with the charity not even raising 20 percent of what it raised to help the Haiti quake victims.

"This is very scary that the message is not getting through," Demir said.

Even the United Nations (UN) has expressed concern over the slow pace of international aid donations for the Pakistan floods, saying the relief being offered is not sufficient to deal with directly to relatives," said Syed Irshad Bukhari, the country's worst disaster.

UN estimates 4.6m without shelter in Pakistan

The United Nations estimates that 4.6 million survivors of Pakistan's floods are still without shelter and wants to provide six million with tents and plastic sheeting, a spokesman said Thursday.

"Roughly 4.6 million people are still without shelter,' Maurizio Giuliano, spokesman for the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in Islamabad, toldAFP.

The rough estimate includes hundreds of thousands of people who are still on the move, he said.

"In this context we have decided to increase the number of targeted beneficiaries for tents and plastic sheeting from the initial figure of two million to at least six million," he said.

Almost one million people have already received these items and the United Nations called on donors to keep up the pace of funding to reach the target.

Ex-army chief calls Lanka 'dictatorship'

Sri Lanka's ex-army chief called the government a "total dictatorship" and said yesterday that he will appeal his recent conviction by a military court, which he described as a political vendetta.

Former Gen Sarath Fonseka said the inquiry on charges he was involved in politics while still in the military was launched to persecute him for daring to challenge President Mahinda Rajapaksa in the presidential election earlier this year.

He criticized the Rajapaksa regime for harassing political opponents, saying a "lawlessness" prevails in the country while "a total dictatorship is going on."

A military court ruling last week recommended Fonseka be dishonorably discharged and stripped of his rank, pension, medals and other military honors. The president approved and carried out the dismissal on Saturday.

Fonseka led Sri Lanka's army in its victory last year against ethnic Tamil rebels, ending a quarter-century civil war that killed 80,000 to 100,000 people.

One-time allies, the president and Fonseka were both considered heroes by the Sinhalese majority for crushing the Tamil rebels.

Rajapaksa and Fonseka had a falling out months after the war ended and the general quit the army after accusing Rajapaksa of sidelining him, suspecting a military coup. Their relationship further deteriorated after Fonseka challenged Rajapaksa in the presidential election.
