6 YEARS AFTER AUG 21 ATTACK

Cops identify some masterminds

Babar to be on charge sheet; grenade source almost clear

Investigators of the August 21 grenade attack believe they will find all masterminds of the incident making a departure from the tradition of other grievous crime probes where enquiries are finished with main culprits remaining unknown.

"We have identified some of the masterminds of this attack and we are still hopeful that we would be able to find the rest," Abdul Kahar Akand, investigation officer of the attack told The Daily Star yesterday.

Today is the sixth anniversary of the carnage in which 24 were killed and over 200 others maimed. On this day in 2004, grenades were hurled at an Awami League rally on Bangabandhu Avenue in the capital. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, then opposition leader, was injured and President Zillur Rahman's wife Ivy Rahman was killed.

Kahar, special superintendent of Criminal Investigation Department, said BNP's former state minister for home affairs Lutfozzaman Babar, arrested in connection with the August 21 grenade attack, would be accused in the charge sheet of the

For the sake of investigation Kahar refused give details of his findings but he did say that they have been able to track down the source of the Arges brand grenades used in the attack.

Joj Mia spent four years behind bars for an offence he did not commit. He had been falsely implicated in the August 21 grenade attack case.

Now a free man Joj Mia also known as Jalal Ahmed faces another ordeal -- social stigma.

He could neither marry off his 19-yearold sister nor find a bride for himself

because of the bad reputation he earned in the four years.

He tried several times in vain to get married. Guardians of brides refuse to accept him after knowing about his past, said the 29-year-old man, who now lives with his elderly mother, brother Babul and sister Khorsheda Akhter at Maispur in Gazipur.

He is yet to find a job. His younger

Moments of shock

A series of deadly grenade explosions shook downtown Dhaka just as Awami League President Sheikh Hasina was wrapping her party rally at 5:22pm on this day in 2004, in front of the party's central office on Bangabandhu Avenue.

The first grenade exploded when she was urging the 25,000 ralliers to start marching protesting a recent grenade attack in Sylhet, with a call to oust the then BNP-Jamaat four-party coalition government that "encourages bomb attacks", recalled AL leader Sultan Mohammad Mansur Ahmed, who was among the wounded on that

BNP quickly held AL responsible

Within days after the deadly grenade attack on August 21 that killed 24 AL leaders and workers and injured scores more, BNP straightaway blamed Awami League (AL) leaders for the "heinous crime" and demanded their punishment.

Toxic chemicals found in fertiliser

Zinc sulphate contaminated with cadmium, lead, chromium; organic fertilisers also tainted

Scientists have found high concentration of toxic chemicals like cadmium, lead and chromium in fertilisers which may affect agriculture ecosystem and thereby human health through food chain.

The Soil Resources Development Institute (SRDI) has identified highest 40,258 ppm (parts per million) cadmium and 31,292 ppm lead in zinc sulphate. This amount is alarmingly higher as allowable level of cadmium and lead is only 10 ppm and 100 ppm respec-

Zinc sulphate is made of zinc and sulphuric

acid. The SRDI scientists suspect manufacturers use expired battery cells or waste of tin or steel factories as zinc for low cost. Zinc, cadmium and lead are basic ingredients of some kinds of batteries and tin.

ANTHRAX CONTAMINATED BEEF 38 fall sick in Sirajganj village

At least 38 people have fallen sick allegedly from anthraxcontaminated beef at Shahzadpur upazila in Sirajgan District, said the district civil surgeon's office.

The locals however said the number of infected is over 50. They said a couple of weeks ago, two cows had been slaughtered at Chithulia village of the upazila and the meat was sold at a lower price among the villagers. Within two days, people who ate the meat and processed the hides started to have blisters and the blisters soon turned into lesions. The wounds are now festering.

The infected informed the civil surgeon's office of the matter after trying traditional medicine for a few days. The civil surgeon's office immediately formed a four-member probe committee led by Md Shariful Islam.

Pre-paid meters from next May

For checking wastage, pilferage of gas, Titas will also install remote meters for 1,000 industries

Titas Gas Transmission and Distribution company is set to introduce the first batch of pre-paid gas meters at homes in Dhanmondi from May next in a bid to check gas wastage and ensure fair payment by the consumers. The company is also set to introduce 1,000 remote meters at

top industries in Tongi-Gazipur area by 2012 to stop gas pilferage through meter tampering. These 1,000 industries combined consume a significant amount of gas. A top Titas source said the company is going to install the country's first batch of pre-paid gas meters at 5,000 homes in

Dhanmondi by next May, and by 2012 it would install 1.25 lakh prepaid gas meters in the entire Dhanmondi area. The energy ministry in January had asked Titas to introduce

pre-paid meters to ensure better use of gas.

Introducing these meters will ensure financial discipline for Titas, and discourage gas wastage as the billing would depend on the usage of gas, instead of the present fixed rate of Tk 450 a month for a double burner stove.

"Typically, a family of five that does not waste gas uses gas worth Tk 300 a month," said the Titas official who had installed a meter at his home to see the actual usage.

He adds, introducing the pre-paid meters might reduce the earning of Titas from domestic customers. But introducing the remote meters at top industries was likely to increase Titas' earnings.

Unlike traditional meters that are installed and monitored at the customer's premises, the remote meter will be installed at the customer's premises but monitored from the Titas office through computer network. This means, the customers who SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

48 Bangladeshis deported from Spain

Bss, Dhaka

Forty-eight Bangladeshis who were recently detained in Spain for illegal stay there returned home yesterday under a deportation process, immigration officials said.

"A total of 48 Bangladeshis who were recently detained in Spain for illegal stay returned home today [yesterday]," ASP Zaman of Immigration Department of Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport told BSS.

A foreign ministry statement earlier said Spanish police recently detained 51 foreign nationals initially thinking all of them to be Bangladeshis.

The foreign office in Dhaka later confirmed 49 of them to be citizens of Bangladesh after verification of their documents received from Madrid.

"This was conveyed to the Spanish government and accordingly, the 49 undocumented Bangladeshi citizens are being repatriated to Bangladesh on August 20," the statement said.

It, however, said such deportation of Bangladeshi citizens was not an isolated SEE PAGE 15 COL 5

Manpower shortage cripples NHRC

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) is crippling due to manpower shortage, thanks to government decision to keep it poorly staffed.

Since its reconstitution in June this year, the commission has yet to make a single field visit to inspect the current human rights situation, let alone initiating an investigation or providing legal assistance to the victims of human

rights violation. With a workforce of only six governmentappointed staff members including the chairman, the commission only made statements to media and recommended necessary actions the allegations filed with it.

"We are carrying out peripheral activities only," Prof Mizanur Rahman Khan, the NHRC

Looking ahead, commission's hope for the future is slim in terms of its proper functioning

as the government has recently approved appointment of 28 staff members against the commission's demand for at least 65.

"We are extremely unhappy with the current situation in which we cannot work effectively. We want to give a strong message to the government that we won't continue citing manpower shortage as an obstacle to our work like others," said the NHRC chairman.

The approved 28-member workforce includes 11 administrative staff and five complaints and investigation officers, but not a
