Airtel to sponsor India's home matches

Telecom giant Bharti Airtel was on Friday named as the sponsor for all international cricket played in India after offering to pay 700,000 dollars per match, India's cricket board said.

The three-year deal covers all Test, one-day and Twenty20 matches, and with India scheduled to play at least 50 matches in the period, the board stands to earn 35 million dollars.

"Bharti Airtel has won the series sponsorship rights for the period of 2010-2013 with a bid amount of 33.3 million rupees per Test/ODI/T20 International," board secretary N Srinivasan said in a oneline statement.

Airtel beat telecom rivals Idea Cellular and mobile phone makers Karbonn Mobile and MicroMax in an open bid that was finalised by the board's marketing com-

mittee in Mumbai on Friday. The minimum bid price set by the board was 20 million rupees (428,815 dollars) per

This is the first time sponsors have been named for home series for a fixed term. The earlier deal was held by World Sports Group, a sports agency who then sold the rights to companies on a

Airtel also sponsors the Twenty20 Champions League, an international club competition, whose second edition will be played in South Africa next month.

The Dhanmondi-based outfit is the second club, to start their preparation well before the start of the players transfer after a rejuvenated Muktijoodha Sangsad. And the club management urged the players to maintain the discipline strictly vowing to provide all sort of support necessary for a successful season.

Despite failing to retain the services of last season's goalkeeper Biplob Bhattacharjee, defenders Rajani Kantan Barman, Mohammad Sujan, Atiqur Rahman Mishu, midfielders Motiur Munna, Shahedul Alam, Zahed Parvez Chowdhury and illustrious striker Enamul Haque, the Sky Blues believe they retain enough fuel to launch a shot at this season's title.

To make up for the extensive losses, Abahani have roped in veteran striker Alfaz Ahmed, Amit Khan Shuvro, Choumin Rakhain, Shakawat Ronny, Abdullah Parvez alongside veterans like Mehdi Hasan Ujjal, Nazrul Islam, Ibnul Siraji, Pranotosh Kumar, Mohammad Robin, Abul Hossain, Zia, Shohag, Mintu and Biplob.

Claiming that Abahani have a balanced side,

manager Satyajit Das Rupu said, "We lost some key players, and at the same time we have roped in some quality players alongside the old guys and this has ultimately strengthened our side as the local players are mostly of similar quality.

"Last season three foreign players were foreigners will play in a match and I think they will make the difference and we are aiming to bring in quality players apart from last season's defender Samad Yousuf and striker Awudu Ibrahim," said Rupu adding that three Nigerian and two Ghanaian players were in the pipeline.

Alastair Cook ended the first real slump of his international career with an innings of 110 as England fought back in the third Test against Pakistan at The Oval here on Friday.

But the match was still in the balance at tea on the third

England, looking to go 3-0 up in this four-match series, were 194 for three in their second innings, a lead of 119, with Pakistan still to bat again.

Jonathan Trott was 36 not out and fellow South Africaborn batsman Kevin Pietersen 23 not out.

Left-handed opener Cook had managed just 106 runs in his eight previous Test innings, at home to Bangladesh and Pakistan.

But the selectors' decision to keep faith with him ahead of England's Ashes defence in Australia later this year was rewarded with the 25-year-old Essex batsman's 13th hundred in 59 Tests and third in seven against Pakistan.

Cook dominated a thirdwicket partnership of 116, contributing 87 runs to Trott's

Nought not out overnight, Cook started scratchily on Friday in overcast conditions that threatened to provide plenty of assistance for Pakistan's swing bowlers and was fortunate when a cut off Mohammad Asif flew between the slips.

during England's first innings 233 but Cook still pulled him for four when he dropped short in his first over on Friday. However, Ajmal struck first

ball on Friday when Anderson was caught behind for 11 to leave England 40 for two.

Poor footwork has plagued Kamran Akmal's head for four Cook for several matches but two textbook cover-driven fours off Aamer, where he got his foot to the pitch of the ball, suggested he was remedying the problem.

"Obviously winning the tournament in the Indian subcontinent in 1996 is something I rate as highly as my 800 Test wickets and reaching the final in the West Indies three years ago was also by no means a small achievement," said Murali.

National hockey players are optimistic about their Germany tour as a part of their preparation for the upcoming Asian Games as the players of the preliminary squad reported to assistant coach Barkatullah Chapal at the Bangladesh Hockey Federation yesterday.

Of the 29-member squad, some 18 players are supposed to the leave for Germany in the last week of this month to play in the German second division in different clubs.

After staying there for almost two months, the national hockey players will return home and travel to Guangzhou, China for the November 12-27 Asian Games. Before leaving the capital, they will however

start practice today as all players excepting Rajon, Limon, Ashiq and Shuvo reported and stars like Jimmy, Biplob, Chayan and Mimo confirmed their presence over the phone. "If everything goes properly in Germany, I think the players will gather valuable experi-

ence and it will help us in the Asian Games," said striker Maksudul Alam Habul, who missed the SA Games but played the Asian Games' qualifying round at home. As a part of the SA Games, the hockey players were also taken to Europe last year for different

Ali urges for victory

Azhar Ali may have been left stranded on 92 not out but he was delighted to have put Pakistan in a position where they could contemplate victory over England in the third Test here at The Oval. Ali's innings was the cornerstone of

Pakistan's 308, and by close of the second day here on Thursday they were 69 runs in front. Pakistan reduced England to six for one in

their second innings after home captain Andrew Strauss was caught in the slips by Yasir Hameed off left-arm quick Mohammad Aamer for four. Pakistan were well-placed initially thanks to resolute batting, notably a fourth-wicket stand

of 69 between recalled former captain Mohammad Yousuf, who made 56 on his return to Test cricket, and Ali. "I would love to have scored a hundred, but we are in the driving seat just now and will try to keep the pressure on England," Ali said after the

Pakistan were left with genuine hope of battling back from 2-0 down in this four-match series. Yousuf, appearing in his first international match in several months after he was handed an indefinite ban by the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) for his role in captaining the team on

their winless tour of Australia, was the epitome of unruffled calm. Pakistan had been dismissed for record low scores against England of 80 and 72 in crushing

defeats by 354 runs and nine wickets in the first and second Tests respectively. But the 35-year-old Yousuf, Pakistan's third

highest run-scorer, never looked flustered

despite having played just a handful of matches

during his international 'retirement'. He found a willing ally in Ali, 10 years his junior, who only made his debut on this tour and whose best score in four previous Tests was the 51 he made in Pakistan's dramatic threewicket win over Australia at Headingley last

month. But Ali was the first to acknowledge Yousuf's role in his near five-hour innings, which

spanned 176 balls and included 14 boundaries. "Mohammad (Yousuf) was very helpful. When I was in the middle he was guiding me, calming me down, saying: 'Just stay in and the

runs will come."' Meanwhile Pakistan captain Salman Butt said: "Azhar played wonderfully well.

"We have been talking about Pakistan's future a lot and what I've been telling you guys (the media) was finally on show," added Butt after Ali was left eight runs shy of a century when last man Mohammad Asif holed out against Graeme Swann.

Butt though was equally glad of Yousuf's contribution, which he likened to that of now retired former Pakistan captain Inzamamul Haq.

"He is the most stylish player in the modern era because when he's batting it seems there's a lot of time for the batter, no matter how quick the bowler it looks easy, like Inzamam used to be."
